

Brief History of the Easter Egg cont..

Did you know that the tradition of painting hard-boiled eggs during springtime pre-dates Christianity.

For thousands of years, Iranians and others have decorated eggs on Nowruz, the Iranian New Year that falls on the spring equinox.

Some claim that the Easter egg has pagan roots. Even the word Easter is said to have to come to us from the "Norsemen's Eostur, Eastar, Ostara and Ostar, and the pagan goddess Eostre, all of which involve the season of the growing sun and new birth".

For Christians, the Easter egg is symbolic of the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Painting Easter eggs is an especially beloved tradition in the Orthodox and Eastern Catholic churches where the eggs are dyed red to represent the blood of Jesus Christ that was shed on the cross.



The hard shell of the egg represents the sealed Tomb of Christ, and cracking the shell represents Jesus' resurrection from the dead.

The Changing Face of Tailem Bend #63

Fay Brook (quite often known as the Ferry Master's daughter) has many great memories of the rich history of Tailem Bend. She has shared many beautiful stories of growing up on the river right alongside the Ferry, after her father moved the family from Loxton for work, in 1941.

Fay has a meticulously kept folder containing the history of Tailem and the heritage trails that were planned from Tailem Bend to Cooke Plains and also to Wellington.

This time though, we will touch on her times with the Scouting movement, in her own words.

**The Tailem Bend Scout Group was formed in 1927 and was the first club to register with the South Australian Scout Group and paid a pepper corn rental. I joined the Cub Scout Group in 1964 and was a leader until it disbanded in 1981.

I was known as 'Akela' (big wolf)— the names were taken from Rudyard Kipling's 'Jungle Book', other leaders were titled 'Bagheera' (black panther), 'Baloo' (bear), 'Kaa' (snake) and Shere Khan (tiger).

The Scout Hall now known as the Lions Den is on property that was named 'Arrowe Park' and the Hall 'Wangamee'. Cubs began at the age of 8 years, Scouts 12 years and Senior Scouts 16 years.

I had four sons who went from Cub Pack up to Senior Scouts. I did my training at 'Woodhouse' a S.A. Scout Association property in the Adelaide hills over a long period of weekends, until I was awarded my 'Wood Badge', lanyard and woggle.



Cubs were held on a Tuesday night from 7pm to 8.30pm and Scouts on a Friday night, we had many Father and Son nights at the Hall where the boys entertained their Fathers with favourite songs such as 'Found a Peanut' and 'Ging Gang Goolie'.

We did family camps at Hall's Gap and Noonameena in Victoria and camped at a site near Meningie. Near Cadell upstream from Renmark, was a big family camping ground where we had tents and caravans, even the kitchen sink - on the banks of the River Murray.

There was a speed boat and Bagpipes, families that went on this excursion will remember when reading this, what fun we had at this camp site.

The group owned three large canoes, which we paddled from Tailem Bend to Wellington to 'Skip' Rhue's home for a B-B-Q with a speed boat following.

A state wide event was held during the September holidays called 'Bobs for Jobs', the cub scouts would go out into the community to earn money for different jobs people would assign them to do, they wore a badge on their uniforms, cubs with navy shirts, pants and green scarfs. Scouts wore Khaki clothing.**

Well Fay certainly had a long and dedicated time with the Scout organisation that was particularly strong in Tailem for many years.

The United Evangelical Lutheran Church of Australia situated on the corner of East Terrace and Seymour Street, is quite often a point of interest in Tailem Bend. Fay also had the history of that neatly tucked away in a

folder.

At a meeting in the beginning of December 1910 it was made known to the St John's people, by E and B Jaensch, that their father JA Jaensch had procured an allotment for a church in Tailem Bend.

B Jaensch, P Neumann and W Obst were appointed trustees.

In 1912 a building committee (of E and B Jaensch) was appointed. The small group ac-

cepted the responsibility for the building costs. Supervised by the committee, the church was erected and ready for dedication on December 28th 1912.

No record of the builders or the pastors taking part in the dedication has been found, the total cost of the church, the debt and how long it took to liquidate is all unknown.

As a result, the Lutheran Church now had a visible presence in the town of Tailem Bend, and in the 1920's, the Trinity congregation also worshiped in St John's for a number of years. St John's was finally sold in the 1970's and was purchased by the Tailem Bend Scout Group as the meeting place for the Senior Scout Group until they


disbanded in the late 1970's.

The Granite's Table Tennis Club used the church as their home ground for many years. It was sold again, this time to the Tailem Bend Hospital Board, as there were two blocks of land with it on which they built a home for the local doctor.

St John's certainly has some character within in it and it will always be part of the heritage of Tailem Bend.


NBN Update - Pt 2

In days gone by when we were using DialUp for our internet and later when everybody advanced to ADSL, there was one thing in common. Everyone was receiving their internet via the copper telephone line which was owned by Telstra. It did not matter who your Internet Service Provider (ISP) was, the delivery method was via Telstra infrastructure.

If Telstra was your ISP and you had troubles with your internet service which was related to the copper cable, there was no problem, ring Telstra and because they provided the service and the copper cable, they fixed it.

Problems arose if you used any other ISP (other than Telstra) and you had internet issues with the copper cable, you could not ring Telstra. (This did not relate to your telephone service)

Your only option was to call your ISP and they had to contact Telstra to fix your copper cable. This caused long delays, lack of information and general frustration because as a user you had no way of communicating with the repairer and even worse, if the ISP blamed Telstra or vice versa.



After hours appointments available

During this ADSL installation period, many people asked me for my opinion of which ISP to use. My answer was always Telstra, simply because it made trouble shooting and repairing simpler, having the ISP and the owner of the copper being the same person (entity).

Well now we have gone backward. It is not possible to have an internet service supported by one entity.

NBN now provide internet service to the house, node (or wireless) and somebody else (not NBN) will be the ISP. If the NBN service is to the Node then a third entity becomes involved, Telstra. As a result, this has made trouble shooting and repairs even worse.

This was made evident several weeks ago, when a customer called me regarding his internet not working. I visited the house and installed the Telstra parcel that had been delivered (see last month's comments). Over the next few days, my customer mentioned that his internet and phone was down often for long periods (hours).

I contacted Telstra (on my customer's behalf) and Telstra advised me that NBN told them (Telstra) that the service was stable. The problems still existed.

I rang Telstra several more times, eventually I was able to talk to a Telstra person who was very helpful and I was told that their equipment had recorded periods of outage to this customer from NBN.

This action caused NBN to look closer at their service and fix it. I actually received a phone call from an NBN technician to advise me that they had found a problem and were fixing it.

So as a result, the support for your Internet via NBN has deteriorated since all services have at least two entities involved.

The other aspect of the NBN based landline internet to your house, is that your house phone will no longer work if the power fails.

So is technology advancing or going backwards?

Four members attended the Afternoon Tea put on by the hospital in recognition of all the organisations who have so generously donated towards the hospital over the last 12



Healthly Happenings - Golf Opening Day


CANDIDA

Candida albicans is one of the most common types of unfriendly organisms. We all have candida growing in our body but when there is overgrowth it may cause a wide variety of symptoms. Donna Gates from the "Body Ecology Diet" suggests that candida overgrowth has been linked to many symptoms including food allergies, digestive disorders, PMS, skin rashes, chronic constipation, recurring headaches, vaginitis or thrush, chemical and environmental sensitivities and even mental fuzziness.

The use of antibiotics, contraceptive hormones and hormone replacement therapy can all lead to candida overgrowth because they can cause an imbalance to our body's inner ecology. Another factor that contributes to candida overgrowth is our diet. This is because as a society we tend to eat high-sugar, acid-forming, low mineral foods that encourage our unfriendly bacteria to thrive. In my naturopathic clinic live blood analysis is used to easily identify candida overgrowth.

Some helpful foods that assist in promoting friendly bacteria include: plain yoghurt or Kefir, brown rice, sprouts, parsley, cabbage, sea vegetables, spirulina and essential fatty acids from fish, flaxseed and olive oil. Sugar in all forms allows candida to thrive and therefore should be avoided. I often recommend my clients follow an acid/alkaline balanced diet and limit their fruit to one piece a day. Avoid acidic fruits including oranges, limes, pineapple, grapefruit, tomatoes and all dried fruits. It is also beneficial to avoid yeast especially in breads and alternatively choose sour dough or breads made from spelt flour or rye.

Many people ask me how to quickly and easily get fit. While I know they are hoping for a simple answer, the reality is that getting and staying fit is a lifestyle, not a quick fix.

So what do fit people do in their "healthy lifestyle"? Take a peek at the following Habits of Highly Fit People...

Fit Habit #3: They Stop When Full

Fit people stop eating when they feel full. Sound simple? It is, but how many times have you stuffed yourself simply to clear your plate? Or how many times have you eaten another piece of cake despite being stuffed?

The next time you feel full, take it as a sign to stop eating. Yes, even if your plate isn't empty.

This Month in the Garden

Top time to plant in this part of the world, especially now that it is cooling down a bit! Why not try cabbage, Asian greens, lettuce, rocket, tatsoi, spring onions, spinach, carrots, celery, cauliflower, French beans, leek, onions, radish, turnips and swedes.

It's time to get happy with herbs, so try some parsley, basil, coriander (try a slow bolting variety if it's still pretty warm in your area), rosemary, marjoram and thyme. You could give mint and lemon balm a go as well, but be careful to contain them as they can take over!

Why not try some lovely flowering stuff in your patch as well, like: cornflower, calendula, dianthus, pansies, viola, snapdragons, stock, nasturtium, verbena and marigolds. These guys are great at attracting pollinators and beneficial insects to your patch, and they look great as well.

Consider a green manure crop to add some life and love to an overworked patch. At this time of year try faba bean, field pea, oats or wheat. This will improve your soil incredibly and for a bit of forward planning, you'll find it well worth the effort!

Top up mulch on your vegie patch, herb gardens and ornamental beds, it is especially important for weed suppression at this time of year. A hot tip is to mulch after watering the patch, to a depth of about 7cm. Keep mulch clear of plant stems... especially young seedlings. Choose a low environmental impact mulch, one that will enrich your soil as it breaks down.


Plants feel the need for a feed at this time of year, too. A seaweed tea or low environmental

impact liquid fertiliser is perfect, especially for seedlings planted this month. Apply to the soil early in the morning, and in the concentrations mentioned on the packet.

Weeding is another job to do this time of year. It will decrease the competition between your edibles and these rotten invaders, plus it's a great way to see your way clear in getting your patch ready for the Autumn/Winter plantings.

Water smarter too, at this time of year. First thing in the morning is best, with a couple of deep waterings a couple of times a week, if needed - always check soil moisture before watering don't waste precious water if Mother Nature has already done the hard work for you!

Remember to visit your local nursery or garden centre for all your gardening needs, tips and advice.

SOCIAL INCLUSION

With the roll-out of the NDIS, Social Inclusion of people with a disability is not just a catch-phrase – it is something to be put into practice by everyone.

Okay – so we all know about making public buildings accessible to wheelchairs, not parking in designated parking bays and that there is anti-





discrimination legislation. But what does it really mean?

Social Inclusion means that people with disabilities can live ordinary lives.

PUBLIC FACILITIES

Does your venue, business or community facility have accessible toilets? Of course! But is there room for a large motorised wheelchair to turn around? Is there room for a carer (or two) to assist?

Is there a hospital-style bed so that an older child, adolescent or adult can be attended to? A lifter? Probably not.

When new facilities are being designed (e.g. the proposed Station re-vamp) the layout needs to be carefully considered to go beyond assumptions and be a model of good practice, with advice from experts.

COMMUNICATION

Some people with a disability that impacts speech use Alternative or Augmentative Communication (AAC). This may be low-tech, like [hand] sign language or charts with pictures, symbols or words that can be pointed to. AAC may be high-tech, like Proloquo2go (an iPad App) that can be personalised and speaks for the person.

Don't assume that because someone can't use verbal communication that they can't understand what you say. They can! Talk with them as you would talk with anyone else. Watch and learn – using AAC is a skill – and be open to diverse communication.

Social Inclusion is the hallmark of a mature and caring community. We can all contribute to making life ordinary.

Thursday's Canine Column

Hello Everyone,

Its boy wonder (well Thursday and Ally) we decided to put ur heads together and suly our two leggered faily and friends with some answers to some frequently asked questions so here gaws (that's goes Ally.

Why do we sniff bums when we meet? (No not you humans) Basically we consider it the polite thing to do when meeting other dogs. We are able to tell by the pheromones (thank you PA). This procedure helps us to learn a little about each other. We find it to be a natural instinct.

Why do we turn around a few times before sitting down? This goes back to our oldies (correction, ancestors!) Canines before us slept in grass and dirt (not a comfy bed like we use) so they flattened the grass sofetned the dirt for a cofortable resting place and well the habbit has remained with us throughout generations.

Why do we wag our tails? Our tails show a variety of emotions. The most now reason is the "happy" tail wag. reasons for our "humping" legs or objects and it doesn't matter if we are male or female, desexed, a certain breed. Humping serves as a stress release in a stressful or overstimulating environment. Another reason (believe it or not) is that you humans actually teach us that it is a goodbehaviour by laughing mixed with the high pitched happy sounding tones humans make when we show this mannerism. For this reason this is why dogs tend to hump children. We enjoy the response and to us this is a good way to get attention. To discourage our humping activities re-direct out attention to other activities such as fetch or walks (which the whole family could be involved!)

Why do we bury our bones? 

PREVENTING CRIME

VFHICLE SECURITY

To help prevent thieves targeting your vehicle and property, consider implementing these security tips:

- Lock your vehicle doors and close all windows.
- Install an alarm or immobiliser and activate it every time you leave your vehicle.
- At night park your vehicle in a well-lit area.
- Park off the road and if possible in a locked garage.
- Use secure car parking facilities where available.
- Remove all valuables from your vehicle. If you can't, then conceal them in the boot before arriving at your destination.
- Avoid leaving your property in the glove box or centre console this is the first place thieves look.
- Mark or engrave your property with your driver's licence number prefixed by the letter 'S' for South Australia.
- Record the make, model and serial number of electronic equipment, such as GPS devices, laptops and mobile phones.
- Remove registration papers from your vehicle to prevent thieves identifying your home and easily disposing of your vehicle.
- Do not place hand bags, wallets or other valuable items on the passenger seat where they could be easily grabbed.
- Remove your keys from the ignition even if you are gone for a short time.
- At home, don't leave your keys on the kitchen bench or where they can be easily seen by thieves. Keep them in a safe place out of view.
- Mark key tags with your phone number. Never include your name and address.
- Do not hide a spare set of keys on or in your vehicle.



Positive Changes to Grant Structure - CDC

Community groups and organisations in the Coorong District Council area will have improved opportunities to thrive under new changes to Council's grants policy.

Council has made changes to the framework for allocating funding out of their Community Events, Grants and Donations Policy which will see two rounds a year, with a \$15,000 total allocation per round.

Three categories of funding can be applied for – community grants, arts and culture grants and recreation and sports small grants.

"Redefining the categories allows Council to better target the allocation of funds through separate guidelines which will attract a wider selection of community groups,' Council's Director Community and Corporate Nat Traeger said.

Council has also introduced a Festivals and Events grant totalling \$10,000 a year to support community events and festivals, with up to \$1,000 in funding available for community events and up to \$2,000 for regional events.

'A regional event is defined as an event attracting more than 1,000 people with the potential to attract visitors from outside the region and result in substantial and measurable outcomes.'

Mrs Traeger said annual funding requests will be accepted under the Festivals and Events grant stream. Council has introduced an additional 'Quick Response' Grant of up to \$1,000, subject to the availability of funds, to support organisations that wish to commit to time sensitive projects.

"We are hoping that more community groups take advantage of these grants which will help improve and enhance the quality of life within our region," Mrs Traeger said.

"Guidelines to underpin the introduction of the categories within the community grants, as well as the festival and events and quick response grants have been drafted."

An announcement of the opening of the first grant round for 2017 will be made soon.




BURSTALL Emma - The Cornish Guest House
