The Changing Face of Tailem Bend #103

Carolyn Goodall

In 1987 Carolyn Goodall was a Year 12 student at the Coomandook area school and presented a fascinating project named: Working with Older People. Her Auntie Joyce Medlow made this publication available to share with my readers. (With permission from Carolyn) It really captures a charming connection between Grand Daughter and Grandma, and remember we are going back to 1987. Over to Carolyn.

My Grandma was born on July 10th 1910 in Adelaide, the 5th in a family of 12, 8 girls and 4 boys that included a set of twins, a boy and a girl. They lived on the farm where Mr. and Mrs. Leak live now at Yumali, at the time it was called Lynwood Estate.

The family lived and worked on a 3,000 acre farm with cows, sheep and horses, everyone worked from dawn to dark on the land, even the young children. The ones who went to work as hard as they could early in the morning and after school.

Grandma learnt to milk a cow when she was 4 and a half years old, she would get up with the others and would milk just as many cows as the rest of the family, usually the cows were quiet and they didn't need bales to milk them.

After the milking was done it had to be separated twice a day morning and night. A lot of the milk was fed to the calves and the pigs. The cream was sent away by train to Tailem Bend 3 days a week.

For the first few years the cream, mail etc. had to be taken to the Coomandook station as there wasn't a station at Yumali. To go to Coomandook it was nine miles and usually someone would ride a horse in and take the things with them. If there was no transport available they would walk to Coomandook, and it would have been a very long way. Later on the cream and mail went from Yumali station which was a lot closer.

Everyone helped with the washing, they would use homemade soap and clean the clothes on wash boards. There was no electricity then and to iron clothes they used a few different types or irons, the box iron was an early type, it was an iron with an empty shell and a plate on the bottom and a handle on the top. A fire was always going in the house and so a few coals from the fire and put in the iron. Then the iron would be moved back and forth in the air to make the coals light up.

They also had kerosene irons and ones that run on an engine.

Schooling

Grandma was 10 and a half when she first went to school and 15 and a half when she left. Families who lived on farms only sent their children to school for a short time. The first school house was on someone's property, then the school was at Yumali and it was called the Roby School. The first two grades Grandma did in one and a half years because she started in the middle of the year.

There were over 30 kids in the whole school and that was from year 1-7, and the same teacher taught all the different ages in the one room.

Grandma and her brothers and sisters had to walk four and a half miles to school and back each day and they had to milk cows, separate the milk and feed the calves before and after school. It would have been hard to manage when so very young.

The teacher had to walk one and a half miles to and from school evert day carrying all the students books.

It was just as hard for the teacher as it was for the children. In winter they had to walk to school in the rain and dry their clothes there. In the summer it was much the same in the heat. There was no school buses to drop them off at home, no doubt it would keep the kids and the teacher fit.

Farming

All cultivating, harvesting and hay cutting was done with horses and simple machinery, each year they cut hay and built a haystack. To harvest the wheat crop they had a harvester which had 6 horses in front, then behind that they had a 5ft stripper with 8 horses, and behind that were 2 8ft strippers which had 5 horses each, that added up to 19 horses in all with four drivers just to harvest a wheat crop. Of course lots of horses were needed on the farm for many jobs, so colts had to be broken in now and then to keep up the numbers.

Activities and Outings

The family didn't go to many places because it was not always possible, so the children would make their own fun. Every year they would go to the Sunday school picnic, it was a big event of the year and everyone young and old would come from miles around. Some of the picnics were held at Mr. Ballard's place and Mr. Legallez's place called "Flowery Plains". Other times were held at the KiOne Ki old ruins.

Children as well as adults enjoyed lots of fun competing in running races, sack races and much more, the lunches were wrapped in paper with lots of sandwiches for everyone, it really was an enjoyable time. Grandma's family travelled to and from the picnics in a wagon with 6 horses. Also someone would bring a horse and dray with a tank of water for people to use.

In 1923 when Grandma was 13 years old the family went to Adelaide, it was Grandmas first time and it would have taken almost a day to get there by horse and cart. They went to the Adelaide Show, it wasn't all that big then but there were show bags and lots of free things to sample. For some holidays they would go down on the river on a homemade boat built by an Uncle on the Port River and transferred to Murray Bridge Via the river and then on to Wellington. One time Grandma was driving the boat and steered it into willows, it took a long time to untangle the propeller from the willow roots.

My Grandpa came to Ki Ki from Adelaide in 1925 and lived out on a farm, they met and got married in 1936 in the Tailem Bend Church and spent their honeymoon in Victor Harbour. First born was Donald, then came Rex (Carolyn's Dad) and Barry and then the youngest Joyce.

Carolyn went on to say how she thought she knew a lot about her Grandma but didn't really know anything compared to what she gained spending so much time with her doing this project.

Well done Carolyn and Joyce Medlow.

HARVESTING BUSHFIRE PREVENTION

Harvesting during dangerous conditions can quickly start a fire. You can help keep everyone safe by following a few simple rules:

- Ensure you have a shovel or a rake and portable water sprayer at hand.
- Have a fully operational farm fire-fighting unit with at least 250 litres of water in the paddock being harvested.
- Check all machinery is in good working order and free of crop residue.
- Make sure all engine exhausts are in good condition and prevented from coming into contact with flammable material.
- Have immediate access to a UHF CB radio or mobile phone.
- Have a four metre clearance around the crop you will be harvesting.
- Have a four metre clearance around and above stationary engines used to auger grain and a person remains present during the operation.
- When the Grassland Fire Danger Index exceeds 35, suspend all harvesting activities.

POWER TOOL BUSHFIRE PREVENTION

The use of angle grinders, welders and other cutting tools can quickly start a bushfire. You can help keep everyone safe by following a few simple rules:

- If a Total Fire Ban Day has been declared in your district, you must not use a cutting tool in the open, so check the CFS website to establish which district you are in and whether a Total Fire Ban applies.
- If no Total Fire Ban Day has been declared, please ensure:
- 1. The space immediately around and above the tool is clear of all flammable material to a distance of at least Four metres.
- 2. That you have water or an appropriate extinguisher and a shovel or rake at hand.
- 3. That the cutting tool is not left unattended while it is turned on.

CAMPFIRE BUSHFIRE PREVENTION

Campfires can quickly get out of control and start a bushfire. You can help keep everyone safe by following a few simple rules:

- Check with your council to see what fuel you can burn, as some councils only allow the burning of charcoal.
- No fires, including barbecues and campfires, are permitted in forest reserves between November 30 and April 30 each year or on Total Fire Ban Days. Gas barbecues may be permitted under certain conditions. For enquiries, contact the relevant Forestry Reserve office.
- Strict regulations apply in National Parks and Wildlife Reserves. For further information, contact the relevant Park Office. No fires are permitted on Total Fire Ban Days in these locations.
- Before you light a campfire, check the Fire Danger Rating and for Total Fire Bans on the CFS website www.cfs.sa.gov.au.
- If a Total Fire Ban Day has been declared in your district you must not have a campfire, bonfire or light a fire for warmth or comfort.
- If no Total Fire Ban Day has been declared, please ensure:
- 1. The fire is contained in a 30 cm deep trench and is no more than one square metre in size.
- 2. The space immediately around and above the fire is clear of all flammable material to a distance of at least four metres.
- 3. A responsible person is in attendance at all times with water or an appropriate extinguisher on hand.
- 4. The fire is completely out before you leave it.
- Above ground fires such as chimineas, fire drums, braziers are only permitted with the appropriate permits.

Dear Traveller

South Australia Police (SAPOL) and the South Australian Country Fire Service (SA CFS) want you to be safe during your holidays, particularly during the fire danger season (FDS) which generally runs from November till April.

Bushfires can quickly impact on your holiday travel route or location.

During the bushfire season, restrictions are applied to having campfires and BBQs and these are escalated whenever a total fire ban day is declared.

We encourage you to visit the CFS website www.cfs.sa.gov.au where you will find a range of useful resources including:

- A list of activities that you can and cannot do during the fire danger season and how a total fire ban day declaration impacts on these.
- What items to pack in your emergency kit (including a battery or wind up radio).
- Where your nearest bushfire safer places and bushfire last resort refuges are located.

Whilst on your holiday, it is advisable to:

- Check the CFS website daily for updates on local fire danger ratings and total fire ban day declarations.
- · Consider modifying your plans on high risk bushfire days, visit locations in low bushfire risk areas.
- · Keep family and friends updated with your current whereabouts and intended travel plans.

In the event of a bushfire occurring near you:

- Visit the CFS website www.cfs.gov.au for bushfire warnings and important information.
- Tune into your local ABC radio, FIFEaa radio, sky news television and ABC news 24 for regular updates.
- Contact the bushfire information hotline on 1800 362 361 (TTY 133 677).
- Visit the SA police website www.police.sa.gov.au fore state wide traffic and incident updates.

You can also obtain a copy of the CFS bushfire traveller safety and outback bushfire safety brochures by contacting the CFS community engagement team on (08) 82129858.

During your travels report any suspicious, negligent and/or reckless behaviour this fire danger season to SAPOL on 131 444 or in an emergency call triple zero – 000.

During his 25 years of racing Reg produced his favourite race horse, Galway King to win at the Tailem Bend Racecourse, at the lucrative odds of 100/1. Galway King went onto win in the city (*Morphetville*), giving young jockey, John Stocker, his first success as ride.

Wonder Mac, no doubt best horse Reg ever trained. Racing being a racing affair in Croucher household. Son, John riding many winners for his father, whilst wife Kathy carried out chores as strapper. Reg worked night shift at a nearby flour mill, thus giving him more time training. Reg was also secretary, Trainers Association for sometime.

Reg sadly passed away 1984.







Pangarinda Botanic Garden

Over the past month Melaleucas have taken over as they add their colours to the garden.

Melaleuca pentagona is one that adds the wow factor with its foliage hidden under a cover of pink to purplish globular flowers.

Melaleuca fulgens a small compact to a straggly shrub, with large lateral spikes of flowers varying from scarlet, pink to apricot. There is also a cream Melaleuca fulgens subsp. corrugata not seen in cultivation, found growing in the ranges on the SA, NT, WA Border.

Melaleuca fulgens is tolerant to most soils, dry conditions and frosts once established.

Our Rainbow Bee Eaters started their nest building not long after arriving from their migration south from Papua New Guinea. Seeing nests being dug close to where pairs had nests in past years. Both birds help dig, their up to one metre long narrow tunnel with a wider nest chamber at the end. As these colourful birds fly in and out of their tunnel they act like a piston, pumping in fresh air and stale air out.

These active little birds require a huge diet of bees, wasp, and insects hence their returning yearly to Pangarinda with its continuous flowering vegetation.

It was devastating to volunteers to see a number of the nests had been dug out by foxes, as the female usually stops in the nest once built at night. Other years we have seen the odd ones dug out. Foxes start at the tunnel entrance then dig the area where the young would be.

Have read where weld mesh has been placed over the nest area to prevent the foxes digging. We have placed a piece over a nest to trial, hopefully it works.

You then run out of water, as you go to refill and take a quick look back as it crosses the road. The sad shiver of a distressing feeling knowing the farmers and their assets are in the path of the fire.

The devastated look on farmers as they give directions, can't talk and are shaking, is hard as you reassured them. Hearing of the injured over the radio was gut wrenching and knowing him makes it somewhat difficult to stay focused. These guys are the legends in my eyes.

A great effort by all, great community of people with big hearts. People come from a long way to help, I thank them.

To all that have lost from the fire, our thoughts are with you. Stay strong, stay positive, give us a call if I can help.


