



# The Tailem Bend Water Tower - Saved From Paint



A concerned group of Residents heard about plans for the Coorong District Council and SA Water to paint the Tailem Bend Water Tower, as a follow on from all the painted Silos in the State. There was very little Public consultation regarding the project, most Residents had not heard of the proposal and were not happy. In talking to people around the town, there seemed to be many who did not want the Tower painted, feeling it is a piece of Tailem Bend's Heritage Architecture and they like the Tower as is.

There was big concern about people's safety and the position of the Tower, as the highway is always busy with cars, caravans, motor-homes, motorbikes and trucks - particularly on long weekends, MSP Events and through the Grain Harvesting Season. The Tower is across the road from a very busy T-junction with many existing hazards and with the added distraction of people looking at the Water Tower and taking photos, would only add to the chaos. The group also feels that the options for parking in the area around the Water Tower are very limited, with one side of the Tower being the TB Hospital Emergency Entrance/Exit, the other side, a busy Hotel carpark and then, across the highway, one of the busiest 'Coles Express' in the State.

A Petition was circulated to save the Tailem Bend Water Tower from being painted. On the first round of the petition 406 signatures were collected and presented to Council, a second petition was circulated, as many people had missed the first - this second petition attracted another 131 signatures. A Poll was also run on the CRAG Facebook page: of the 109 people who took the time to vote: 89 voted NO, 15 YES and five wanted it lit up. These numbers were hard for the Council to ignore.

Don Green and I held a 10-minute Deputation, outlining the Residents' concerns, at the regular Council meeting on Tuesday, May 21 and we presented the signed petitions. The Council were impressed with the detail in our information and Power Point presentation and decided to have their discussion on the Night and vote on whether to cancel the project or not. The Council voted as follows: Voting FOR the motion, were Councillors Arthur, Bland, Hill, Qualmann, Rowntree, Simmons and Taylor, Voting AGAINST the motion was Councillor Jaensch. The Mayor declared the motion CARRIED.

While some people will be upset with the decision, the fact is; the people have spoken and the Council have listened, let's hope in future they will have proper public consultation with us, the Ratepayers, before spending precious manpower and Ratepayer money on such projects.

# The Changing Face of Tailem Bend #87

#### Anne Howell

Anne a quiet achiever has always been an outstanding contributor to her community - be it in the field of sport or many different roles as a volunteer. In conversation with her she certainly spoke with passion and humility about her achievements, so we will start with a love for and much success with the sports of tennis, golf and whatever she put her hand to....Anne is also an outstanding community minded person.

Anne commences: \*\*I was born in Uraidla in the Adelaide Hills on 11<sup>th</sup> May 1942, the day after my Mother's 35thBirthday, I am the 10<sup>th</sup> child of Bert and Elsie Eastham.

I arrived in Tailem Bend in 1967 with my late husband John and three children, Cary, Robert and Carol, who all played tennis for Railways Institute Tennis Club at various times, when they were juniors and going on to became senior players.

I always wanted to play tennis and was given an old Oliver Blue Bird racquet from my eldest brother-in-law Teddy Young, who was a coach. I took this old racquet to school with me at Colonel Light Gardens Primary. With about 12 other children we hit up and down the court without a net, so you can imagine how many hits we got (not many).

I left school in Grade V11 to go to work to bring in money to feed the family, as Dad had had a very bad accident off his bike on South Road - too many street lights in those days. That meant there was no money available for Tennis lessons, so I found work at Coles in Rundle Street, which enabled me to put a racquet on lay-by at John Martin's, just across the laneway.

I soon paid it off and had an Oliver White Clipper and when we had Sunday School Picnics, I would take it along and have a game.

I was so glad when I arrived in Tailem Bend and was asked to play tennis for the club and I have been there ever since. I started playing No 4 in D grade, but over the years made it in to the top grades.

We used to have afternoon tea in every town where we played, making for a great social atmosphere. I have held many administration positions and enjoyed every one of them.





In the season 1975/76 the club won A - B - C and D Premierships in the Lower Murray Association, the following season we started with 5 senior teams and 3 junior teams. Our coaches were Bert Langley, Kaye and Danny Hunt and myself. The juniors were great with eight players in each team and two reserves. Practice was held Tuesday afternoons after school and on Thursday afternoon 42 learners were in attendance.

During the tennis season we had a Fancy Dress day, we organised a Tournament and played in our outfits and of course had lots of fun. Also, as a fundraiser for the club, we put together father and sons and one mother and son - the purpose was to collect recycled paper. We used the Railways Institute trailer to collect a huge hessian bag, fill it with paper and load it into a "M" van, at the railway station.

Wednesdays was Ladies Day, also we had visiting clubs from all around for a Tournament and in return, we visited their clubs when they had a fundraising day. This was all done through volunteering and was how country people raised their funds and had a good time doing it. Places we visited were Jabuk, Ki - Ki , Peake, Wynarka, Cooke Plains, Coomandook and Murray Bridge. Fay Green and myself were called by the Swansson boys the "Mighty Midgets" because no matter what combination of boys they produced, they couldn't beat us.!!!! Good Fun.

Anne also has a very imposing record of achievements with the Tailem Bend Golf Club, of which she has been awarded life membership.


She joined the club in 1972 but could only stay for a few weeks, as her son, Robert, was not well and her priority was by his side, until his health improved. Then it was time to rejoin the club in 1974, it was the start of an outstanding career of loyalty that still exists to this day.

Anne now shares with us her memories of an outstanding career built around administration, success with the Clubs and a whole lot of fun and companionship.

Geraldine Dickson was my first coach along with Ailene Deleelew and Lee Phillips, Geraldine laughed a lot but also worked very hard and taught us a lot. My coach had patience with me and I did enjoy those early days with her. So much so, that we were part of a Ladies Foursome - an event we won several times.

We played on scrapes in those days, but eventually, due to a lot of dedication and hard work by our menfolk, we progressed to Greens, which was a huge improvement to our club.

In club competitions I have had 2 holes in one - the first was at the Nairne club on the 16<sup>th</sup> hole, the other at Tailem Bend on the 12<sup>th</sup> hole, they were quite a bit apart, the first in the 80's, the second one in 2013. I had the thrill of seeing the first one drop in, but the second disappeared behind a skinny tree. The Ladies Day always started at 11am and finished in time to pick the kids up from school, we only played during the winter in those days.

Over 43 years I have worked out on the course and in the club house, I have seen 3 extensions to the clubhouse and having greens instead of scrapes was a marked improvement.

For her extensive community service, Anne was awarded Citizen of the Year in 1997, something that was extremely popular and moved her deeply, especially when she was described as "a Lady who put her all into everything she does". Well done Anne and Congratulations.


If you'd like a meal, we serve from 6:30 - 7:30, choice of three mains and a dessert for only \$15, takeaway available.

So what brought them back for a second stint, thirty years after they first owned the pub? A good opportunity and great people.

Passing through town on the way to visit Frank's mother in Naracoorte, Frank felt the need to quench his thirst and take a trip down memory lane, but was shocked to find the hotel had been closed for weeks.

Still seeking that elusive beer, Frank was thrilled to find the front bar over at the Riverside Hotel was full of old mates and familiar faces.

'Nobody believed that we were just passing through,' Frank laughs. 'All they said was, '*We know what you're really up to, you're here to look at the Tailem Bend Hotel*'. Maybe they knew something we didn't, but that was that as far as we were concerned. We weren't looking to buy a hotel. Until we dropped in again on our way back to Adelaide!'

# **Community Passenger Network**

#### MEDICAL BUS AND COMMUNITY PASSENGER TRANSPORT

Helping the Region's transport disadvantaged - some vulnerable, others with a disability, young and old, the Murray Mallee Community Passenger Network's Transport Sub-Committee, met for the first time at the Tailem Bend Community Centre on Monday, May 13, 2019.

Offering a Medical Bus and a Community Transport service to Adelaide, both are vital links for people needing to attend appointments - neither are free services, but when considering the convenience, cost of parking and the cost of running a vehicle, both services offer exceptional affordable value.

The Medical Bus is air-conditioned, has wheelchair access and operates between Keith and Adelaide, Monday to Friday (excluding Public Holidays)

Appointments need to be between 11:00am and 2:00pm, finishing by 2:30pm to catch the bus home - a carer or travel companion may be able to travel for free.

The Community Passenger Network provides an accredited volunteer driver, where no other appropriate transport is available. This service also operates Monday to Friday (excluding Public Holidays – weekend emergencies will be considered) for eligible people living within the District Council areas of the Coorong, Karoonda East Murray and the Southern Mallee.

Each comfortable, late model sedan is air-conditioned and carers or travel companions may be able to travel for free.

The Community Passenger Network is subject to vehicle and volunteer driver availability; thus, the service is always looking to increase its volunteer driver base.

# **Jervois History Through Art Project**

The Jervois History Through Art project, aims to tell the story of Jervois through murals painted on suitable dairies, sheds, walls, fences and perhaps, sometime in the future, a very prominent local water tower!

Peter Phillips commented "The idea started with Jenny suggesting murals could be painted on some of the old dairies between Jervois and Wellington". The idea was followed up with other locals and was soon realised, the idea has broader interest and community support. Since last year, a small group of enthusiastic locals have been researching the history of Jervois, assembling facts, figures and photographs.

Following a community meeting held at the Jervois Bowling Club on the 6th February 2019, an official committee has been formed to further develop the project ideas.

The goals of the Jervois History through Art project are:

- To create pride in our local community.
- To recognise and preserve the history of Jervois, including its first settlers, Ngarrindjeri stories, multicultural diversity of the early settlers, the dairy industry, social and sporting clubs over the past 100 years.
- To secure an "artist in residence" through Council-generated and other funding, to paint a number of designated murals each year over the coming years.

With the assistance of the Rural City of Murray Bridge (RCMB) council a draft plan for the Jervois History Art project has been developed along with a priority list of murals for painting. The intention is to also develop future staged plans such as interactive history displays, fibreglass cow sculptures and a memorial wall to tell our story to all who visit Jervois.


By working with the RCMB, funding has been granted for the first mural to appear on the exterior wall of the Jervois Bowling Club. A community consultation session was held with the artist early in May to discuss the theme of 'milk transport' in Jervois. The rich history including the 'Union' river milk boat, the old trucks loading milk cans and the first bulk milk tank pick up in 1960, were just some of the wonderful stories shared during the session.

The first mural is due to commence in May, with an official project launch planned for June.

Who would have ever thought that a conversation about a giant vegetable could help to save someone's life? But it seems to be the case in the Coorong district.

The Tailem Bend Giant Pumpkin Competition first began in 2017 to raise awareness and support for suicide prevention in the Coorong District Council area.

The battle of giant pumpkins aims to start a conversation about mental health and suicide prevention in local rural communities, and all proceeds raised from the program go towards the Coorong Suicide Prevention Network– known locally as 'Conversations Matter'.

The initiative is certainly growing awareness and also growing in public popularity, with this year's competition entrants ranging from three years of age to the more experienced 76-year-old.

Coorong District Council Mayor Paul Simmons says it was great to see this competition encouraging a social connection between community members of all ages and backgrounds – after all, anyone can have a go at growing a giant pumpkin with the free seed packs distributed locally.

"The competition is something that anyone can be part of and opens up an opportunity for those who need it. The actual growing of the pumpkins is really just a catalyst for creating connections amongst local people who are looking for some common ground to help start conversations," Mayor Simmons says.

"Rural communities have a higher risk of mental illness, specifically rural men, which is why our Council continues to back great programs like this.

"The drought has taken a toll on local farmers, businesses and families, and creating positive community outlets and events can make a big difference to their lives.

"It often only needs to be a small gesture or a few words that can help people suffering from mental health issues, and this competition is just one of the initiatives that the Conversations Matter volunteer group can be proud of."

Event organisers revealed that no weigh-in event occurred this year, instead there was a 'weigh-in period' held over 15-18 April, in which over 10 pumpkins of all different shapes, sizes and colours were weighed.

Coonalpyn local, Craig Lutze, won this year's competition with a pumpkin weighing in at a whopping 62 kilograms.

The Pitt family of Moorlands, reign as giant pumpkin growing record-holders, with their heaviest pumpkin weighing 64.4kg back in the inaugural year (2017).

Council will continue to promote programs associated with suicide prevention and mental health via its social media platforms, so stay tuned to the Coorong District Council Facebook page for more details in the future.

Henny's on the Terrace is John's opportunity to "settle down" in Tailem Bend, where he has owned a house for the part 5 years. He will be assisted by son Christopher and long-time work associate Malcolm producing a team who will, in John's words "provide Tailem Bend with great food and coffee, service with a smile and a warm family atmosphere in which to dine." "We have introduced what has proved to be a very popular brand of coffee, sourced from a one-man coffee-processing business located at Mannum and uses ultra high-quality coffee beans.


