The Old Tailem Bend Ferry

As both the town of Tailem Bend and the settlement at Jervois developed, there was an increased need for a river crossing in the region.

The old Tailem Bend Ferry was built in 1924 and was one of the last timber jetties to be built. The early landing was used until the mid-1960s when the current crossing was constructed. The old ferry was protected as a State Heritage place in 1993 and since then has slowly been deteriorating.

If that landing could speak it could tell tales how it once carried across camels, flocks of sheep, all types of vehicles plus some walkons.

With no weight or size restrictions some of the trucks that it carried, would have had the wooden planks and pylons creaking and shaking.

Harold Patrick (HP) CONNOLLY Continued.

Senior Citizens

Dad was the founding member of the Senior Citizens Club and was the Club's first secretary. He would hold this position from 1968-73 as well as taking on the dual roles of President/Secretary from 1972-1973.

Dad understood that seniors after retirement needed to meet and connect with other seniors, who had common interests, in a group setting. It was a place for the elderly to relax and enjoy the fellowship of others. As the numbers grew, so to was the need to extend the club rooms to provide much needed space for the Club members. He unashamedly lobbied the powers that be to support these improvements. Quite often, the discussions would get caught up in policies and regulations, but Dad always brought the discussions back to the people, and what impact their decisions would have on the Tailem Bend community. His dreams of a better functioning club rooms were realised in the early 70s. On Dad's passing the club members honoured him with a commemorative stone honouring his achievements.

Football & Cricket

As well as being an enthusiastic supporter of the Tailem Bend Football Club, HP took great satisfaction from participating in the overall administration of the sport. He served several positions of the TBFC and was Publicity Officer for the River Murray Football League for many years. The photos of the Tailem Bend football club teams from (1940s-72), which are an integral part of the collective photographic memory of the football club, were all taken by HP. When the TBFC club rooms were officially opened, Dad was given the honour to unveil a plaque to mark the club's new beginning. TBFC Club president (Gerald Smart) said at the time, "HP was the "perfect" person to open the new amenities in recognition of his outstanding service to the TBFC".

A cricket enthusiast, he was Chairman of the Tailem Bend cricket club in 1935. He also took an active part in the game as a player and Club association umpire. He was also the local scribe and reported on the games played in the district. In his later years he rarely missed a cricket match in which the local team played.

He loved attending Shield and Test matches at the Adelaide Oval. Mostly he went by train but on one occasion brother Terry and myself took him to a one day game at the Adelaide Oval, it was an exciting finish that SA won by a couple of runs. There was so much drama going on that Terry and I jumped the picket fence, kicked a few imaginary goals then mingled with the players and the crowd.

Once we had finished having a few *"kicks"* we returned to where we had been sitting, but no Dad. We looked everywhere and were becoming somewhat concerned, however we eventually found him in the grandstand sitting alongside the legendary Don Bradman.

We apologised to Dad for leaving him so abruptly, but all he said was "if you had have stayed with me, I would have introduced you to Mr Bradman". An, opportunity lost for the both of us!

Photography

He was an ardent photographer and many of the early black and white photos documented the towns history.

His photos of Tailem Bend showing landmarks, streets, sporting events, and many other topics of interest including, historical events, trains and railway sites and town identities captured the spirit and character of the town.

In conversation with Luisa Gazzola, she remembered that Dad was the photographer in 1961 at the wedding of Teresa Gazzola and Olindo Marcolin, which was held at the Tailem Bend Catholic Church.

Journalism

In the midst of his many activities he found time as a part time Tailem Bend correspondent to report stories on Tailem Bend activities for the Standard/Advertiser/ The News.

Many people will recall his letters to the "editor" and the clear, far sighted thinking with which he addressed many of the issues facing country communities. He recognised the unequal treatment women had received through time. He believed women's unpaid work in the home and the care of their children made them economically vulnerable. Discrimination on the basis of gender and race was also offensive to him.

Dad was a keen gardener with a passion for growing Dahlia's, his garden bed was enormous taking up all one side of the house. Every bulb while in hibernation was named after every member of the family and beyond. Again the Catholic Church benefited with a brilliant display of flowers when available.

Dad never spoke much about his sporting achievements but there is an old, battered trophy cup with the inscription, "Cameron Cup 2 mile wheel race won by H.P. Connolly 1913". I believe it was somewhere from Gawler to Adelaide.

Dad never drove a car which made him a familiar figure walking down the main Street with kit bag in hand, and his faithful dog skip trailing close behind. Many conversations were had during these daily walks. First stop Number 4 cabin (Hurtle Green), then Vic Roffey Railway Tce, and the business shops of the main street. These conversations revolved around anything from sport, politics and the every day life of the Tailem Bend community.

On the 19th of August 1973, Our Father passed away after a battle with cancer. He was buried at the Tailem Bend cemetery with his wife Nora. The local St John Ambulance Brigade, the Elderly Citizens Club and the school children from St Joseph's convent formed guards of honour outside the church and at the cemetery. RMFL players, umpires and officials held a minute's silence in honour of HP's service to district football at the Mypolonga v Border Downs semi-final at the Mypolonga oval. The "Standard" paper recognised his contribution to the community by reporting - Tailem Bend has lost its "unofficial mayor" with the death of Mr Harold Patrick Connolly.

From an early age Dad knew that giving back to the place you call home helps to unite the community and bridge some of the social, economic, and political gaps. Nothing was too much trouble for Dad when it came to helping his community and he expected nothing in return.

He would be immensely proud of how far the town has progressed. R I P.

JOHN ERNEST SPRY & HEATHER SPRY

John Spry was born in Adelaide in 1923 to very young parents and John was named after his father, grandfather and great-grandfather before him.

His great-grandfather, John Pugsley Spry (1st) arrived in South Australia aged 8 aboard the "Himalaya" in 1849 with his parents Thomas and Ann (*nee Pugsley*) and his younger brother William Pugsley from Devon in England.

John Pugsley Spry (1st) married Mary Facon Sharpe at Middleton where their families were both farmers. They had children, the second of whom was a son named John Pugsley Spry (2nd) who married and had a son called John Duncan Spry, who married and in turn had a son named John Ernest Spry.

John Duncan Spry retired and moved to Wellington in the late sixties or early 1970s having bought the property adjacent to Murrundi Reserve. John Duncan Spry lived there until he died in August 1984 and local residents at the time couldn't mistake his property because he had obtained some large letters from the Jervois Cheese Factory (after having undergone a facelift) and arranged them into the word "SPRY" on his front gate.

Mr Spry bequeathed half of this property to his grandson John Hedley Spry (*the author*) and the other half to his step grand-daughter Dawn (*his second wife having predeceased him*). John Hedley Spry took out a loan and purchased the other half and kept the property in the family as a holiday home for more than five years until he married and sold it to his parents, John Ernest and Heather Spry who consequently moved from their family home in Hawthorndene to Wellington in 1989.

Heather Spry had been given 12 gum tree seedlings which she planted along the river bank in what is now "Murrundi Reserve". Shortly afterward, the National Heritage Trust was donating money to the restoration of wetlands and so Heather (having caught the tree-planting bug) was encouraged by a church going friend from Tailem Bend (who also had a passion for tree planting) to join the National Heritage Trust.

Heather subsequently applied for a grant which she duly received and this then enabled them to arrange for the local Council to fence off the reserve and install gates. John and Heather then began their tree planting in earnest, whilst at the same time renovating their dwelling to become much more habitable. The original dwelling has now been removed and replaced with the existing structure.

Some of the first trees were planted along the Wellington/ Jervois Road and John Spry assisted the then President of the Wellington Progress Association to water them which then led to the installation of a dripper type water reticulation system. The Head Gardener from the Local Council then asked if the Wellington Progress Association would be prepared to assist in the development of the Reserve because getting Council labour to do it was not cost effective.

Subsequent grants were secured from the National Heritage Trust and Bushcare Australia leading to the removal of willows from the river bank funded by the Council. Removal of reeds and substantial earth works to re-establish a flow of water through the wetlands, planting and irrigating thousands of trees and shrubs indigenous to the area over a period of at least 12 years, led to a return of many native bird species and a reminder of the beauty of the natural native landscape that was to be enjoyed for many years to come.

Recent criticism of Murrundi Reserve being "dull" or "drab" is evidence that the critics have obviously taken no notice of the before pictures as it was a barren limestone paddock and home to a plethora of bamboo and three corner jacks. John Hedley Spry is extremely happy that Murrundi Reserve has now been transformed into something resembling its pre-European arrival state thanks to the mighty efforts of his parents John and Heather Spry.





Pangarinda Botanic Gardens

The Last Hours

When the Black Death enters England through the port in Dorsetshire in June 1348, no one knows what manner of sickness it is-or how it spreads and kills so quickly. The Church cites God as the cause, and fear grips the people as they come to believe that the plague is a punishment for wickedness.

But Lady Anne of Devilish has her own ideas. Educated by nuns, Anne is a rarity among women, being both literate and knowledgeable. With her brutal husband absent from the manor when news of this pestilence reaches her, she looks for more sensible ways to protect her people than daily confessions of sin. She decides to bring her serfs inside the safety of the moat that surrounds her manor house, then refuses entry to anyone else, even her husband.


The President: Chris Taylor

Chris did his schooling in Blacktown in Sydney, then joined the Royal Airforce in 1970 as an apprentice *(A-Fit P)* aircraft fitter propulsion *(engine technician)* at Halton *(known as a Halton Brat).*

Once qualified he worked on the VC10 and Bristol Britannia transport fleets, and 11 Squadron's English Electric Lightning (*Rolls Royce Avon Engines*) fighterinterceptor aircraft. He then went out to the Sultanate of Oman to work on the SEPECAT Jaguar attack aircraft, the BAC Strikemaster training and light attack jet aircraft, the Shorts Skyvan short haul freight twin prop aircraft, and the Hawker Hunter (*used as advanced jet fighter trainers*). He then moved to Rolls Royce to work in their Research and Development department working with the Olympus 593 (*Concorde*) engines, RB199 engines (*Panavia Tornado*), and Pegasus engines (*Harrier Jump Jet*).

Chris joined the UK Police Force in 1980 retiring to emigrate to New South Wales in 2007. It's fair to say Chris has spent the majority of his working life in uniform.

He is highly qualified in Judo, 4th Dan British Judo Assoc (*BJF*), 4th Dan Australian Judo Federation (*AJF*), and 4th Dan International Judo Federation (*IJF*). He is a Level 3 Coach (the highest at the time of qualification) with the BJF & AJF, and was rewarded in 2008 for his services to the sport with an Honorary Life Membership of the BJF (bestowed on only a few).

Chris was also a highly regarded and skilled trainer for the police force in control and restraint, and in selfdefence.

1 John 4:1 - 1 John 5:15

Friendship is a powerful force in our lives. When you think of your best friend you think of somebody who has shared meaningful, trustworthy & intimate time with you. Through friendship, God invites us to know Him and to make Him known.

John carries a wonderful revelation of friendship with God because he was arguably Jesus' closest friend. John sat beside Jesus at The Last Supper. And from the cross, Jesus looked upon His devastated mother entrusting her to John's care. John had been impacted by the love of Jesus and his letter makes this very clear. He explains that we are God's children. He affirms how much Jesus loves us. Then he commissions us from this place of experiencing God's love to love one another. Love is so central & so constant to his writing here that he references it 40 times. So what does it really mean to follow Jesus? We live in a day when following somebody is easy, just requiring the click of a button. After you follow them you can then decide if you want to pay attention to what they have to say or ignore them all together. This is not the same idea as following Jesus. We can all relate to being a mess before we came to follow Jesus. The amazing thing is that God completely disagreed with our way of thinking and the lifestyle it created. Yet even though He disagreed with us the Bible makes it clear that through grace His kindness leads us to repentance.

God demonstrated that we don't have to agree with people to be kind to them. Jesus said we would be known by our love for others, not our strong beliefs. Unfortunately the common recognition for Christians tend to be how strongly they believe rather than how much they truly love.

God is not trying to draw people into OUR BELIEFS. He's drawing them into HIS LOVE. When we get more interested in winning arguments than we are in loving people we are no longer like Jesus.

God's plan is not for us to introduce people to our faith. His plan is for us to introduce people to His love! One of the greatest problems of the modern day church is that we've worked hard to introduce people to what they should do instead of who they should know.

Fear often takes the backseat to love and this is the essence of God's transforming power of love in our lives that fear no longer has a hold on us in troubled times. By the time 1 John was written, there were second and third generation Christians. Some believers had grown half-hearted in their commitment to Jesus. A primary focus of John's letter is to show how people can truly know if they are Christians in communion with God through Jesus. John met Jesus, received Jesus' love, and spent the rest of his life walking with Jesus. His relationship with Jesus utterly, and eternally transformed him. This is the true Christian life. Are you abandoned and surrendered to the purposes of God as revealed in Christ? Jesus loves us and Jesus loves the church. His desire is to rescue humanity and draw every human being into his family. Together we become more loving, serving and giving, leaving our world a better place!
