The Changing Face of Tailem Bend #79

Jeanette Kozikowski

Jeanette is a Tailem Bend person through and through and has a marvellous story to tell us about her life and her family's contribution to our community - as a Railway Family and Tailem Bend in general.

I need at least 2 editions to do justice to her narrative. I am sure the images will jog a few pleasant memories. Here we go!

Mrs Kozi retires:

Hello, my name is Jeanette Kozikowski (nee Thompson) also known as Mrs Kozi. I retired in April 2018, having worked at Tailem Bend Primary School for 32 years. My family came to Tailem Bend in 1955, when I was three years old. This was the same year that my husband, Michael, was born in the old Tailem Bend Hospital. My father was a Ganger in the Railways and we lived in a railway cottage on Princes Highway.

The school will always hold a special place in my heart, as I was a student there for all of my primary years, as were our children, Rick, Melanie and Judd and our grandchildren, Nate and Callee. Our granddaughter Zali, also attended Tailem Bend Primary School for two years and although our grandson, Dyami lived in Tailem Bend, he was too young at the time to attend school but did attend kindy here.

When I was a student at Tailem Bend Primary, many things were different. Before the administration building was built, the road, now Murray Street and formerly Wadham Street,

continued on to Russell Street. This was a public thoroughfare, dividing the junior primary classes from the rest of the school. Where the bike shed is now, was the junior primary lunch shed. Before the swimming pool was built, there was a Council Depot in that area which was moved around 1960. There were two tennis courts on the oval, along the top end of Russell Street. The Principal's office was the room at the bottom of the stairs, the sick bay under the stairwell, and the secretary had a desk and chair in the passageway at the bottom of the stairs. The staffroom was the room on the right at the top of the stairs and the Library was upstairs in what is now called the Buzz Box. My year 7 classroom was where the Library is now.

I remember our daily bottled milk, wood fires in class and the challenge of mastering cursive writing using a pen with a nib and the ink well on the desk. A year seven student rang the bell at break times and to start and end the day. I remember the three student drummers leading us as we marched to various outdoor assemblies.

I went to Murray Bridge High School, travelling by train from Wurtun siding each day. The bus was introduced soon after I left school. I was 14 when I started my first job, working at the BP Roadhouse opposite the golf course, for Faye and Alister Thompson. I was still at high school, so I worked all day Sunday and in the school holidays.

In 1969, I started my nursing training at Tailem Bend Hospital, which was then called the Lower Murray District Hospital. Dr Gooden and Dr Hoare were the general practitioners at the time and the hospital was very busy. It had a maternity section, operating theatre, as well as general wards.

The learning curve was huge, as I joined the nursing team doing something that I had always known I would do. I enjoyed assisting with births, caring for the babies, scrubbing for theatre and the general nursing care of the young and old. There was something new to learn most days and I found it very rewarding.

After two years I transferred to the Royal Adelaide Hospital but returned home after a few months and registered as an enrolled nurse at Tailem Bend, preferring the country life!

When Michael and I married we moved to Murray Bridge, but returned to Tailem Bend in 1980, five years later, to open a Deli in the building that was Persello's Baker Shop. After three years we decided to move 'Kozi's Deli' into the main street. We set up in what was once Zacney's Deli, next to the old chemist in the first block of the main street which is now part of the truck car park of the Shell Roadhouse. These shops were demolished when the new roadhouse was built. In 1985 we sold the Deli to Peter and Zelda McAlister, who moved this business to a shop next to the Newsagent when the new roadhouse was built.

After the sale of our deli, it was always my intention to return to nursing and I was waiting for a position to become available. In the meantime, I applied for one of the positions advertised at the soon to be established School Community Library. And, so my work journey with the school started in April 1986 and the Community Library opened in July. Neville Gotch was the Principal at this time and Greta Bolt who had also been my Year 2 teacher, was the Librarian. Glenys Cocks and Michelle Cheso were also part of the Community Library team.

There was a lot of preparation to do, advertising and introducing the new facility to the community. We typed hundreds of catalogue cards for all of the books and other items that arrived for community borrowing. As part of my role, I worked in the library after hours; Saturday mornings from 9am-12 midday, until 6pm on Mondays and Fridays and from 6pm-8pm on Wednesday evenings.

I remember our book mending back then was quite a feat to master! We would use an electric drill to drill holes into the spine of the book and sew the spine firmly to restore the book to almost new condition. Glenys taught me this and I was so proud of this new skill that I had acquired.

Mr Le was suitably impressed with Peter's teaching skills and gave both he and the children full marks for their performances. No-one was kept in, after school!

The official group then explored many of the more than 100 historic buildings which Peter has laboriously assembled over many decades, to form what is now the largest pioneer village in Australia.

The luncheon which followed, was prepared by Tailem Bend Friends of the Hospital (FOTH) who, as always, didn't disappoint. Also included, was a "thank you" for their loyalty - Peter's band of volunteers, who assist him in maintaining the sprawling property.

Peter expressed his delight at The Governor and Mrs Le's attendance at his 'Town' and the Governor responded with warm-hearted and highly complimentary comments about Peter's lifetime achievement in creating for posterity, such a significant historical exhibit.

Guests attending were rewarded with a future invitation to visit Government House, Adelaide.



Losing a leg in a shocking Auger accident, Trevor and his wife Norma, splashed out purchasing a top of the range Caravan and embarking on the adventure of their lives.

"We think it's the right time to move on, with so much opportunity on Tailem's door step at present and with the park moving towards becoming a Cabin Park, and not so much a Caravan Park, it should make a good investment for the next operators."

"We've made the park stress free and we've always had an easy-going approach to running the park."


The meeting closed at 10.30 a.m.

If you refer to page 16 of the full document (or page 3 of the summary document) – you'll see there's a chart which breaks down exactly how our budget will be spent this current financial year. This may offer you some clarity.

Each year, as part of developing the ABP, our Elected Members must consider and balance community sentiment, economic priorities, and a range of other business and operational requirements and services which Council must deliver (including legislative requirements). For the coming financial year, a decision has been made to focus on roads — this has been driven by both our Elected Members and has been the general sentiment outlined by our community during consultation on the plan earlier this year. Extra budget has been allocated towards roads — predominantly unsealed, and for maintenance and renewal. I have also outlined details of this in the recent community newsletter here: http://www.coorong.sa.gov.au/webdata/resources/files/Coorong_Connect_July_WEB.pdf.

There are a range of ways we will look to fund this – this includes various savings measures from other Council portfolios, postponing other planned projects and also from rate income. Where possible, we will also seek external government funding for some sections of road infrastructure and other projects around the Council area – however, it should be noted that both the State and Federal Government's have heavily withdrawn road funding levels to all Councils across the State in recent years. Further, we incur more than \$350,000 in State Government costs each year as part of our annual budget process.

As part of setting our annual budget, we also consider the long term financial implications for Council, and as such, have this year - reviewed our Long Term Financial Plan for 2018-2029. If we continue to increase road expenditure to the level we have set in 2018-19, we expect that Council's debt levels will be lifted to a maximum level of \$11.8 million over a 10 year period to finance this. Carrying and managing debt is one part of managing Council's long term finances sustainably — this is the case for most local government organisations nationally. We are delivering both short and long term budgets, which will ensure that vital services and infrastructure maintenance, renewal and development can be afforded by the community over the long-term.

Council will not be borrowing \$20million – this is wrong.

No one took ownership of the bottle of 'honour'

(PICTURED BELOW) and it disappeared from sight. Many, many years later, around the 1990's, Bill Jaensch, a local lad from way back, was delivering bales of empties to Murray Bridge Recycling when the proprietor holding a bottle in hand approached Bill and asked if this particular bottle be of interest to him. Well, like the Phoenix rising from the ashes, here was the hallowed longneck bottle with the lad's names engraved upon. Bill was eager to take ownership and took the bottle home and placed it in his cellar for safe keeping.

Once again the bottle remained unsighted, until 2012 when the Tailem Bend Progress Association held a Cabaret to celebrate the Town's 125th Anniversary.

Prior to the night of the Cabaret, the band was asked to play some older style music to accommodate dances like the Barn Dance and the Military Two Step, adding fun to the evening, with lucky spots on the dance floor for the dancers. Margaret Jaensch, remembering the old bottle, suggested a 'spin the bottle' rather than lucky spots. This was eagerly approved upon, with Bill taking on the roll of official Bottle Spinner...and yes, he used the longneck which was by now, considered part of the history of the town and the young and not so young, lads of the day.

The bottle has continued to spin around the dance floor of the Tailem Bend Town Hall at fundraising Cabarets for the Tailem Bend Progress Association, Tailem Bend RSL, Tailem Bend Football Club and more recently at the oh, so popular, TBPA Christmas Parade Cabaret.

RECIPE

SPRING GARDENING TIPS TEMPERATE ZONE

Fertilise - Now's the time to fertilise because everything starts to grow again after the winter slow-down. A lot of garden plants start their main growing period in spring, so by fertilising now you'll encourage vigorous new growth, better flower blossoms, stronger pest and disease resistance and generally much healthier plants! Don't forget about your pot plants. Spring's a good time to fertilise and add water retaining agents to help these plants in summer too. Lawns also need feeding in spring, so choose a high nitrogen slow-release fertiliser to green up your tired winter lawns. If you're a rose fiend, Sudden Impact for Roses is a handy choice – once you've applied it should be watered in well.

Weed and Mulch - It's time to mulch all you garden beds before the sun starts to evaporate moisture in the soil. Not only does mulching conserve soil moisture, it insulates the soil against the summer heat, helps suppress weeds and can also aid in providing nutrients to your soil if you use an organic mulch. But arguably the most rewarding reason to mulch is how great your beds look when you've finished! Keep an eye out for weeds springing up in the warmer weather too.

The Vegie Patch - Spring's the time to get your summer crops in, but it's good to wait until the frost lifts (particularly if you're in the Adelaide Hills). Planting in October can be a good idea because the soil has started to heat up a bit. Pumpkin, zucchini, corn, beans and cucumbers are among the summer vegies you can sow. Spring's also a good time to start a new herb patch!

<u>Pest Watch</u> - Spring's also the time to check for pesky pests on new growth. Aphids start to get active around now, feeding on all your lovely new shoots so keep an eye on the little buggers. Don't jump straight for the pesticides. Be patient and the lady bird larvae and parasitic wasps will keep them under control. While you're waiting for the numbers of predators to build up, you can manually remove them with a bit of a shake of the bush or a steady water stream from you hose. Going straight for pesticides will kill the beneficial predators as well as the aphids, which will mean you'll need to be continually spraying.

Maintenance - It's time to tidy up bits of the garden that haven't coped well during the winter months. A good pruning can bring back some vigour to your neglected plants. It's time to cut down/dead head all flowering winter plants. Give your unruly hedges a prune. Divide your herbaceous clump-forming plants as new growth resumes and spread to new parts of the garden.

Pearl Barley Tabbouleh

A staple in Lebanon, tabbouleh is traditionally made with parsley, mint, onion, tomato, burghul (cracked wheat, partially cooked, sometimes referred to as bulgar wheat) lemon juice and olive oil. Freshly made it is fragrant, tasty and very good for your health. Parsley is excellent for your overall well being. It aids digestion, reducing indigestion, bloating and flatulence, is used for treating diabetes, high blood pressure, Urinary Tract Infections (UTI's), kidney stones and osteoarthritis, to name a few. It grows like crazy (anyone can grow this hardy herb), freezes well and can be added to anything or simply scattered over a finished dish. We like to use it in salads, like this recent adaptation of the tabbouleh (tabbouli) salad made with pearl barley.

- 1 cup of pearl barley
- 1 bunch flat leaf parsley, finely chopped
- 1 handful of mint, finely chopped
- 1 tomato, diced
- 2 small Lebanese cucumbers, diced
- 2 spring onions sliced thinly
- 1 lemon, juiced
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- salt and pepper to season
- sumac to season (lemon flavoured spice, optional)

In a medium pot of boiling water, place the pearl barley.

Rapidly simmer until pearl barley is cooked.

Drain and allow barley to cool.

In a medium bowl place all ingredients together and mix

until well com-

bined.

Taste and adjust seasonings needed.

As simple that!



Tailem Bend Solar Project

In February 2018, approximately one hundred Coorong District Council residents attended a Community Information Session in the Tailem Bend Town Hall, hosted by Vena Energy (formerly Equis Energy), developers of the Tailem Bend Solar Project. Construction on the 127 MW project began in April 2018 and is already well-advanced.

To date, the project site has seen the successful establishment of project infrastructure; completion of civil construction work, including roads and security fencing; and the delivery to site of tens of thousands of posts, of which 25 percent have been installed, (PICTURED BELOW) these will support the solar panel mounting systems. In addition, key infrastructure components have started to arrive on site, and substation construction has begun. The work completed to date has taken more than 52,000 man hours by 129 people!

Thus far, the Tailem Bend Solar Project has employed 105 South Australians, with 46 percent of the construction team, residents of the Tailem Bend and Murray Bridge region. The construction team will continue to grow as construction continues, with around 180 employees expected to be onsite by the end of August 2018. The Tailem Bend Solar Project is expected to be completed in February 2019 and fully operational and delivering power by April 2019.

SA Snow Venture 2018

CROSS COUNTRY SKIING FOR 10 DAYS IN THE BREATH-TAKING BOGONG HIGH PLAINS

Friday the 13th of July, I was privileged to join 23 Venturers from South Australia along with ten enthusiastic leaders on the journey to the Bogong Rover Chalet, in Victoria. We travelled a total of 960kms to Mt Beauty where we spent the night. The next morning, we were up at dawn with our hiking packs that contained everything we required for the next nine days, including clothes, sleeping bag, toiletries, 2 L water, scroggin, as well as fresh meat and vegetables, that was allocated for the week. Our destination that morning was the Bogong Rover Chalet, where we would spend the next eight days touring on cross country skis in the Bogong High Plains.

The 11km journey from Falls Creek to the Chalet was on cross country skis with our heavy packs and we set out over the Rocky Valley Dam wall, towards Watchbed Creek, onto Langford Gap and finally onto the Langford West Aqueduct. The Chalet is located South from Falls Creek and surrounded by magnificent, snow covered mountains with no signs of civilisation in sight. It was founded by Bill Waters in 1940 before the area was known as a National Park. This was one of the first huts to be built in the area and it has stood the test of time and with further extensions, has evolved from a small hut to a whopping great big "hut" with all the mod cons you would need.

During the week we learnt new cross country skills, experienced skiing in 80km winds, made fresh tacks on tours around the many mountains, skied to Mt Cope hut, Wallace's Hut, Mt Cope, Langford West Campground and skied more of the Aqueduct.

Friday, the group went to Wallace's Hut for first time Snow Venturers to be invested into the Alpine Venture Unit. The Unit is associated with the Chalet and to qualify for this membership, you must be an invested Venturer and have completed one week at the Bogong Chalet Winter Party. During this time, three fellow Venturers were awarded the highest achievement in Venturers - the Nationally recognised and acknowledged Queen Scout. Later that day, we had the exhilarating Winter Olympics that consisted of skiing tug o' war, ski relays, snowball accuracy and transporting a patient on an emergency sled.

Saturday, our trip back to Falls Creek was due. We were split into three groups and allocated a time to leave the Chalet and commence the 11km ski back. It was a very early start - some groups left at 3:30 in the morning and the majority of the ski out, was spent under the stunning stars and the beautiful sunrise.

We arrived at Falls Creek that morning at 9 o'clock, exhausted, and spent the rest of the day travelling to Kerang to spend the night. Sunday, we arrived back in South Australia and reunited with our families.

Snow Venturer has inspired me to further explore the Bogong High Plains while snow camping and I can't wait to go back next year as a Rover and in the future, a Leader. This trip wouldn't have run so successfully without the amazing work from our party leader, Greg Roberts, party adviser Mark Schammer, engineer Bob North and quarter master John Litvan, who all volunteered their time to make this trip one to remember.





To the Editor.

Don't Derail the Entrance Wall Train.

I read with interest Malcolm Piggott's letter to the editor in the August edition of Tailem Topics which was entitled Entrance Wall to Tailem Bend. In his letter he outlined the history behind the erection of this wall and the reason for the particular RX locomotive outline to be represented on the wall.

Those who have resided in the Coorong District Council area for any length of time, and have either lived or worked in rural surrounding areas of Tailem Bend, will understand the historical significance of this Entrance Wall to Tailem Bend. We live in an area of limestone and our past history has very heavily relied upon the rail transport system.

Hence the significance of the limestone 'Entrance Wall to Tailem Bend' upon which is the cut out of the RX type locomotive. Why would we be even considering changing this to depict something which is considered to be more modern in its shape and advertising profile? If the existing structure was that of a large dray, as was pulled by the working horses on the farms years ago, would we be requesting it be replaced by a modern racing car, just because it might appeal to the current tourist population?

Sadly, over the years some of our most significantly used rail transport tracks have been closed with consequent impact on our main highways. If you speak with older residents living in the smaller townships of the Coorong District, particularly in the Mallee Ward area along the Sherlock, Buccleugh line out to Peake and then south through Parks Ward area of

Yumali, Ki Ki, Coonalpyn and Tintinara, those persons will remember how vital it was to have the railway operational so that they could receive supplies from Tailem Bend and more importantly transport for their wool and wheat.

We have adopted the township entrance motto of "River, Rail, Road and Racing" but I ask, "have we sufficiently promoted the major historical significance which both agriculture and railways played in the early development of the area?" I believe that somewhere in that slogan, a reference to agriculture should also have been made. After all, the rail services and farming were integral to the opening up of the land and the livelihood of the District.

Apart from the insensitivity of taking down a structure that was erected by persons still resident in our township, let's not be so hasty to change the historical talking points. It seems we embrace the statue of a rhinoceros in a prominent position, advertising a venue outside of the Coorong District, but are willing to see an emblem of historical significance taken down, which was constructed with thought and generosity by local community members and enjoyed over the years by many who have passed through Tailem Bend. Rather, we should be thinking of ways of enhancing the tourist experience by spending money in developing points of interest in the historical aspects of the town and surrounding smaller townships.

I sincerely hope that we do not see the RX Locomotive on the entrance wall to Tailem Bend 'derailed'!






