Boaties Question Logic - from page one

As Tailem Bend begins revving up for tourism, local and passing boaties have questioned the logic behind the rules relating to the refurbished boardwalk at Dickson Reserve, near the town's Jervois Ferry Crossing.

Whilst travelling on the ferry, a local resident made a remark about what he thought was an illegal mooring on the refurbished boardwalk at Dickson Reserve - he was of the opinion that it was illegal to moor within 100 meters of any South Australian ferry and that warning signs were to be erected presently, at this particular site.

Upon investigating his comments, we received the following from Tom Dougherty, Media Officer, Media, Engagement and Communications, Department of Planning, Transport and Infrastructure.

'There are no restrictions in the Harbours and Navigation Act 1993 regulations for minimum mooring distance from a ferry.

However, mariners are encouraged to navigate with care near ferry crossings and obey the signals of the ferry master. The Department has no requirements for the proposed gate, provided there are no obstructions to navigation and it is safe for other river users.'

Since posting this concern via Face Book early in the month, we received an image from a concerned local that illustrates what looks like, an almost permanent mooring well within 100 meters of the Mannum Ferry - given the above response from Tom Dougherty, this seems perfectly legal.

Upon approaching what we thought at the time, was an illegal mooring, we met Randel Dixon from Adelaide. (Please refer to his email on page 29 of this issue).

Randel was quick to express his concerns about local government and private water front owners being so negative to passing river travellers - he mentioned that travelling the Murray in Victoria was, by far, much friendlier than in South Australia, with moorings aplenty.

Randel remarked on the time it took Tailem Bend to fix it's river front boardwalk and expressed his frustration that once fixed, there were no bollards or mooring poles provided - he said the high fence was not conducive to mooring and impossible to climb over. Continued page 28.

## The Changing Face of Tailem Bend #62

This month I will continue a little bit more on a Child's view of Tailem Bend, compiled by children of the Primary School in 1985, after talks by local knowledgeable identities.

One such article is based on farmers and how they worked the land many years ago. This is how it went.

\*In the old days you had to do all the farming with horses, you had to rise about 5am to feed the horses and groom them. You worked all morning until lunch, giving the horses a rest while you had lunch, after that you worked until tea time. Finally you put the horses into the stables and gave them a feed of hay.

After you had your own tea you would let the horses out into the paddocks at about 9pm, the next day you would start all over again.

Out in the paddock you had to do all your own stone picking as well.

The wives only went shopping once a week if they were lucky, all the meat, butter etc had to be kept cold the best way possible. They couldn't just put them in the refrigerator because they weren't even heard of in those days.

They had to use a Coolgardie safe which had wet towels or bags hung down the sides to keep the meat cool. If they were lucky they had a cellar and that worked just as well, you could even set a jelly in it.

Milking was all done by hand and you probably would have had 20 – 50 cows, if you had 20 it would have taken you two hours to milk them, twice a day.



People grew wheat and barley, and when they harvested the grain they took it to the wheat stacks by horse and cart.

People had to be independent because they had to make their own bread, butter and soap. There was no electricity so you had to read or play cards by a lantern.\*

Well done by the children, I wonder if there are still a few around who recollect these projects.

I am sure there are still many retired farming families around who fondly remember those days.

I know two modern day farmer friends of mine, David and Scotty, wouldn't know what a horse in harness looked like, nor would they have ever carted by truck bagged grain to the wheat stacks, unload onto an escalator that took the bags to the men lumpers as they were known, who carefully built the stacks.

The grain industry has certainly experienced massive changes, the wheat stacks were replaced with silo's that dominated the skyline, they still do, but Bunkers are all the go and proof of that is here in Tailem Bend, where giant extensions are taking place.

Following stories from the Primary School, I just happened to come across a few along the same lines, of history from St. Joseph's Catholic School.

This time I am going to tell you about Tailem Bend. The station yard is separated from the goods yard by a much used road. The goods yard is lit up by flood lights, there is a loco and a gantry also a punt that connects us with Jervois. Tailem Bend is on the Murray and is only 15 miles from Murray Bridge. I have just started to collect foreign stamps. A friend and myself dressed up for a frolic and I won a prize. Your club mate, John Clancy. (John's father was a station master at Tailem Bend).\*

I love this one!!!

\*Dear Felicity (1951)

Since I last wrote we played the Primary School at football and beat them by 2 points; the scores were Tailem Bend Convent 5 goals to Tailem Bend Primary 4 goals 4 behinds. The Inspector is coming on Wednesday and is giving us our geography and history exam. We are having a break up concert on Thursday and we are saying a piece of poetry called "Bad Sir Brian Botany". I am going to the Adelaide Show. Your club mate, Ron Miller.\*

I remember being in the footy team, it was the Grand Final (Bad Luck Travis) Lui Brion from Jervois was captain, not so sure about the Poetry!!!.

I have included a photo of the old swimming pool, it jogged my memory and I am sure it will a lot of others too, it's hard to know what year we are looking at. The cement wall was not always there, to the left where a few are standing was a shallow pool for beginners and separated from the real deep water by posts, there are still a few posts visible by the lawn area.

Another photo was taken when water was on both sides of the wall. Very shallow and eventually went stagnant and drained.

The main photo was taken from the wharf where the ferry is now, the Rowing Club shed is shown on the left, the Ferry Master's house is partly noticeable between that and what is now the old Ferry landing.

They were fun days but a few conditions existed for fledgling swimmers, first you proved your swimming ability, then before you ventured out into the "Big River" you swam what was called 'The Landing', a stretch of water that started at the wharf and extended to where the posts are in the picture. Once well into your teenage years, the challenge was to swim across the river and return with a sprig of willow as proof you touched the other side.

I can assure you, once reaching the willows and turning back, the wharf looked a 100ks away! There was a spring board on the wharf with a bag draped over the end in an attempt to prevent slipping, also two towers, the largest of them didn't last long. Many of the brave would dive off an unused telegraph pole.

## **NBN Update**

It is now more than 18 months since Wireless NBN was installed at my place and more than 12 months since the NBN was removed from my place. It would have been removed earlier but I had a lot of trouble convincing my supplier that I did not want NBN in the configuration as it was installed. The issues (at the time) involved the combination of the telephone service with the wireless NBN and the risk of power failure .

I knew 18 Months ago that for Wireless NBN, the optimum configuration was to have the Internet supplied wirelessly and the Telephone supplied via the existing copper cable. When I connected the original NBN, I was told that it was unavailable but now it is common knowledge and readily available.

All this in the past, there is now a new raft of issues.

Recently I have received many calls for assistance, usually the issue is "my Telephone's not working" or "my Internet is not working". With the current installation of NBN in Tailem Bend, many (if not all) residents are being connected to NBN without their knowledge. Usually this involves the delivery of a parcel (via Australia Post) containing a new router and sometimes other equipment. But there are never instructions about what to do with the contents of the parcel or when to install the supplied equipment.

I usually become involved at this point, having to connect the new router and connect the house telephone to the new router. Unfortunately this is at the customer's expense.

Today I had three such calls.

But the worst example I have had, happened early this week. My customer was informed that they were now connected to the NBN and that their current router was compatible with the NBN service, but they would need to configure it for NBN. I attended the property to configure the router. After a call to the service provider who in turn contacted NBN who advised that the router was not in fact compatible with NBN, the customer was to have a new router shipped to them. The end result was that the customer was without the Internet for three days and had to pay me for two service calls.

In summary, the NBN in Tailem Bend is providing the Internet at a marginal improvement along with a degraded telephone service combined with pathetic communication and support.

## Healthly Happenings - Sheepdog Trials

Mental Health and Sleep (

Within the Australian population it is estimated that almost half will experience a mental illness in their lifetime. 1 in 4 people experience anxiety while 1 in 6 experience clinical depression. Surprisingly 80% of people are experiencing acute insomnia.

When we sleep there is a three stage transitioning process that occurs, these include awake and alert (prior to going to sleep), non-rapid eye movement sleep (NREM) and rapid eye movement sleep (REM). Quite often people can have more REM sleep time which means that their brain is actually quite active and not resting. Even if they feel they are sleeping all night, it may not be restorative or good quality sleep. When we are stressed, the elevation of cortisol (major stress hormone) will also contribute to increased REM.

Insomnia or poor quality sleep can play a huge role in determining the individuals we are today, as sleep disturbance is often at the heart of mental health issues.

Sleep is classed as an involuntary active rhythmic neural process that maintains a variety of bodily functions. These include memory processing, learning, immune function, mental relaxation and hormone regulation.

It is really important to recognise that the sleep cycle has a major contribution to the recuperation of our mind, body and soul. A combination of nutritional and herbal preparations can be used to support adrenal health, mood, behaviour and sleep. If you find you are experiencing anxiety, low mood, agitation, concentration/memory issues or fatigue, it may be time to look at the quality of sleep you are getting.

#### These habits separate the fit from the flabby.

Many people ask me how to guickly and easily get fit. While I know they are hoping for a simple answer, the reality is that getting and staying fit is a lifestyle, not a quick fix.

So what do fit people do in their "healthy lifestyle"? Take a peek of the following Habits of Highly Fit People...

#### Fit Habit #1: They Don't Buy Junk

Fit people know that if they keep junk food in the house they will eat it sooner or later. So they don't buy any. Even buying junk food for your kids or spouse is not advised since 1) you'll likely eat some of it eventually, and 2) your loved ones shouldn't be eating that junk either. ## This Month in the Garden

It is still a little warm this time of year, but there are several vegetables you could plant into your patch this March. Try cabbage, Asian greens, lettuce, rocket, silverbeet, spring onions, spinach, carrots, celery, and pumpkins. Herbs also make a great addition, try parsley, basil, coriander (try a slow bolting variety if the weather's still pretty warm), rosemary, marjoram and thyme. You could give mint and lemon balm a go as well, but be careful to contain them, as they can take over!

Flowering plants are always popular, so try cornflower, calendula, dianthus, pansies, viola, snapdragons, stock, nasturtium, verbena and marigolds. These particular varieties are great at attracting pollinators and beneficial insects to your patch, and they certainly brighten it up, as well.

Consider a green manure crop to add some life and love to an overworked patch. At this time of year, try faba bean, field pea, oats and wheat. These will improve your soil incredibly, and for a bit of forward planning, you'll find it well worth the effort!

Top up the layer of mulch on your vegie patch, herb gardens and ornamental beds, it's especially important for weed suppression at this time of year. A hot tip is to mulch after watering the patch, to a depth of about 7cm. Keep mulch clear of plant stems, especially young seedlings. Choose 'low environmental impact' mulch - one that will enrich your soil as it breaks down.

Plants feel the need for a feed at this time of year. A seaweed tea or low environmental



impact liquid fertiliser is perfect, especially for seedlings planted this month. Apply to the soil early in the morning and in the dose listed on the packet.

Weeding is an awesome job to do at this time of year. Cut down the competition between your tasty treats and these space invaders, and tidy up your patch. It may sound tedious, but it's incredibly rewarding!

Water smarter this time of year. Water first thing in the morning, and instead of a quick spray, a nice long soak a couple of times a week, is far more beneficial!

You may find your situation varies from say, someone living in the city. This can be due to microclimates created in your garden, closeness to the coast or bush, extremes in weather - which we continue to have as we enter Autumn (Mother Nature likes to keep us on our toes) and your particular garden type, so let common sense prevail and make adjustments, accordingly.

Remeber to visit your local nursery or garden centre for all your gardening needs, tips and advice.

### **A Vision Becomes A Reality - Sports Carnival**

Ten years in the making and a vision becomes a reality.

ANZAC DAY 2006 - What started out as a conversation over a few beers in Darwin, between two serving brothers from Murray Bridge, became a reality in their home town in 2016.

Joe Di Santo recalls the birth of the ANZAC Sports Carnival and how he hopes it will grow.

"Charlie and I were enjoying a few beers and watching Rugby League on TV, our beloved St. George was playing in the ANZAC Clash. Before the game, we witnessed a moving ceremony featuring Australian Defence Force personnel. Afterwards, I said to Charlie something along the lines of 'all sports should acknowledge our Military History, not just ANZAC Day' and he agreed. I kept thinking about that moment for years, but didn't know how, when or if I'd ever approach it".

A current serving member and former exchange student, Joe heard his former High School in Murray Bridge had teamed up with the local RSL to create a Scholarship to send two of its students to the Western Front on a 21-day study tour in 2018.

Surprised to discover Australian Military history was inadequately being taught in our schools, Joe felt, that as a community we are unintentionally and potentially depriving future generations of our history and culture.



"Murray Bridge is a sporting town, sport plays an important role in everyday life and the ADF is the same. It too has a rich history. For example, Cricket was once used as a tactic on the front lines of Gallipoli, and the National Soccer Team 'The Socceroos' in 1967, were sent to Vietnam by the Australian Government to play in the ironically named "Friendship Games". Combining the values of the Region with the ADF, is the perfect way the RSL can honour its history, its local serving members and engage and educate the wider community".

What was a pipe dream soon became a massive workload for Joe, any spare moment he had he dedicated to getting the Carnival established while juggling family, military and work commitments. It came with its challenges; selling the concept, winter sports were in their off season making communication difficult, it clashed with the Masters Games and the RSL also had numerous events happening at the same time. "

Despite the challenges, within four months the RSL assembled 10 disciplines of sport to participate in the Inaugural Carnival, 11 Perpetual Shields were named after significant events, campaigns or battles involving Australian Service Personnel and six Medallions were issued to honour local past/present RSL Serving Members, strongly affiliated with the applicable sport.

"I am proud of our achievements in the timeframe we had. Within the next 10 years, I envision that other RSL's will host their own Sports Carnivals, name their own Shields and honour their members. Ultimately I'd love to see Carnivals happening all over Australia"

The Inaugural Carnival of 2016, raised over \$4,000 towards the Student Scholarships, this year the Carnival will feature an additional two sports and three Perpetual Shields and they are aiming to raise \$20,000 for the student scholarships.

Between Saturday March 18 and Sunday April 23 there will be a total of 12 Sports competing for the 14 Perpetual Shields and six Medallions issued to players judged best in field. To donate, or for more information, contact the Murray Bridge RSL on 8532 1314, or Joe on 0488 532 596.

### THE NATIONAL DISABILITY INSURANCE SCHEME (NDIS)



The NDIS is rolling out for adults in this area later in 2017. It is time to become informed and prepared. People not currently receiving services may be eligible. People with psychosocial disability may be eligible.

Not everyone will meet access criteria. Speak with health care professions and/or service providers. Contact the NDIS or check out the website.

The NDIS is about providing choice for people with disabilities, to live the life they want with appropriate individualised support.

**The NDIS** is being introduced in stages, because it's a big change and it is important to get it right and make it sustainable. Existing service users and new participants will enter the scheme progressively. The NDIS is expected to cover all of South Australia and all age groups by July 2018, ultimately providing support to about 32,000 people with disability.

From 1 February 2016, children aged between 0 to 14 years of age across South Australia will continue to enter the NDIS.

From 1 January 2017, young people aged between 15 and 17 years of age across South Australia will begin to enter the NDIS.

From 1 July 2017, adults aged 18 to 64 years of age will begin to enter the NDIS based on where they live.

When the NDIS commences in a region, people currently receiving supports through South Australian Government specialist disability services will be moving first.

#### **Murray and Mallee**

The NDIS will become available for adults aged 18 to 64 years in the Murray and Mallee region from 1 October 2017. A person may meet the access requirements to become a participant of the NDIS up to 6 months prior to this date.

Thursday's Canine Column

Hello Everyone,

We are back for another month and are going to talk about healthy dog habits. Getting into a daily routine with your dog is important to maintain optimum health of both the body and the mind.

Teach your dog to sit for something they want, this is the simplest and most effective habit to teach. This is where your dog offers a behaviour in return for you offering a reward. (we see the treats tin and we sit, sit sit!) Our PA likes that we want to please her by showing good manners rather than being "commanded" (yeah right Ally, we are good furbabies....oh no I used the f word!!).

Don't encourage your dog to beg. Create a feeding routine for their scheduled feedtime, but give them the opportunity to get food for showing good behaviour and remember to deduct food treats given from total food offered for their daily intake so they don't end up as "fatties".

Commit to exercise each day as part of your daily routine and also as a substitute for food treats (throw the ball in the yard for 5 minutes instead of a smacko). People are always watching their weight, learning the benefits of exercise on their minds and bodies and this also applies to us as well, although we put our paw down to wearing lycra (Ally, lycra is that tight fitting stuff that some humans just shouldn't go wear!). Exercise, aka walkies, also allows for interaction with other people, dogs and smells.

After contacting the Coorong District Council Tailem Topics received a prompt reply from David Mosel, Director Infrastructure and Assets and his full response can be read opposite.

David outlines the cost of the boardwalk refurbishment and states, "That the boardwalk is immediately adjacent to the Tailem Bend Ferry and completely within the 100 meter 'safety zone' of the ferry." He also states, "Further enquiries with the Department of Planning, Transport & Infrastructure, as to whether Council can elect to allow mooring within the ferry zone, Marine Safety have said that they would object to this on the basis that "it is likely that the vessel moored thereon may cause visibility of oncoming river traffic to be obscured for the ferry operator, and similarly the view of the ferry obstructed for boat operators travelling in the area."

It seems that the report from Marine Safety seems to be at odds with the official response we received from Tom Dougherty of the Department of Planning, Transport and Infrastructure and highlights the frustrations of dealing with policy and interpretations of acts.

David also writes, that the Coorong District Council is working on plans for the Dickson Reserve area and has engaged an outside consultant to produce a Masterplan of options after engaging stakeholders, including representatives kev of the Tailem Bend Rowing Club, commercial pleasure boat operators and representatives from the Department of Planning, Transport & Infrastructure and Department of Environment. Water & Natural Resources - we hope that in the interest of potential tourism in our region, that in preparing the said Masterplan, the consultant will receive a much clearer indication of what can and can't be done on our river front.

First drafts of the master plan have been received by Council and will be released for community consultation and engagement in the near future.

Letter from David Mosel, Director Infrastructure and Assets:

*Thank you for your email and queries in relation to the refurbished boardwalk structure at Dickson Reserve.

The area had been fenced off from public access for in excess of 6 years due to the area being affected by riverbank slumping, and deemed unsafe, with unsightly security fencing preventing all access.

The stabilisation of the bank, and refurbishment of the boardwalk was seen as a priority as a first stage in the upgrading of the reserve. The costs of the bank stabilisation works was \$38,000 and the refurbishment of the boardwalk in hardwood was \$120,000. The boardwalk is immediately adjacent to the Tailem Bend Ferry and completely within the 100 meter 'safety zone' of the ferry.

In response to community feedback, and in recognition that vessels have historically moored to the structure, Council have made further enquiries with the Department of Planning, Transport & Infrastructure as to whether Council can elect to allow mooring within the ferry zone. Marine Safety have said that they would object to this on the basis that "it is likely that the vessel moored thereon may cause visibility of oncoming river traffic to be obscured for the ferry operator, and similarly the view of the ferry obstructed for boat operators travelling in the area.".

Council has been working on plans for the activation and revitalisation of the Dickson Reserve area, and has engaged GHD Woodhead to produce Masterplan options for consideration. As part of this master planning process, council have engaged with key stakeholders, including representatives of the Tailem Bend Rowing Club, commercial pleasure boat operators and representatives from the Department of Planning, Transport & Infrastructure and Department of Environment, Water & Natural Resources. Some of the key aims of this process are;

- To increase the amenity value of the reserve
- To improve the facilities and accessibility for the rowing club
- To provide mooring facilities for small pleasure boats, houseboats and commercial boat operators

• To link the reserve in with the Princes Highway and to provide easier parking facilities to encourage more people to stop in Tailem Bend.

The first drafts of the master plan have been received by Council and will be released for Community consultation and engagement in the near future. These plans include areas outside of the 100 meter safety zone for pleasure boats and houseboats to tie up, together with a purpose built landing structure for the use of commercial boat operators.

Dear Editor,

As boat owners and tourists, we are sick to death of the over regulated river banks along the Murray River in SA. We have been informed that Victorians don't own up to the River's banks, so that would explain why Victoria is a far friendlier place for boaties - you can park most anywhere. As for traversing the Murray River in SA, all we see mostly is 'Private - Keep Off.' Really? Does it hurt if we tie up for 24 hours to rest - we don't bother anyone.

It's also questionable that those who build jetties into the river in SA even have title to them - I am yet to fully investigate, but early advice indicates the Department of Marine and Harbours have to approve all jetties and anyone can legally tie up to them.

As for the council controlled areas, some are welcoming and others are down-right hostile to any boats visiting. Cruising the Mighty Murray in a boat like mine (that some liken to a Winnebago on water), we continually have breaks during our leisurely trips, buying meals, drinks, general stores and where necessary fuel/gas, as well as general purchases at shops and tourist areas. We spend good tourist dollars, but because we are not in a caravan or an RV, we are not welcomed in many places. For example, Tailem Bend took forever to fix their deteriorated pier, it's right next to a pretty grassed park and there are no bollards or mooring poles to be seen, so we have to tie to trees. We waited ages for the council to sort out the dilapidated pier and now having done so, what have they done? They have put a high steel fence around it so it is very difficult to moor next to it and climb off the vessel. In fact one has to be an acrobat to get on and off it! Why could it not have been designed with lower railings and easier access to the pylons to tie up? What was this designed to do? Who was it meant to cater for? Certainly not tourists arriving by boat.

The Wellington Hotel welcomes boaties. We can stay there for many days at a time and hence we spend considerable money at the hotel and surrounding businesses like the Service Station and the Court House Cafe. Murray Bridge is hassle-free, Avoca Dell has a lovely park near Murray Bridge, while Mannum only lets you stay 24 hours! (Why? The longer we're there, the more we spend in town). Younghusband is a great little spot to moor and provides a shop full of boaties needs - as for all the privately held land on the river bank, we have only found one couple who do not mind us berthing on their frontage - what a breath of fresh air, they are!

Come on Tailem Bend - make us feel welcome!

"Dad hasn't raced for years and it was so good seeing him acting like a kid on Christmas morning," Nathan said. "We had so much fun, Dad even got third overall in his class."

Positioned second to last in all his handicap races, Bruce had to go like a bat out of hell to make up ground on slower riders in his highly contested Group G race class.

Pangarinda Botanic Garden

Recent heavy rains and cooler weather have a few plants confused. Kangaroo Paws are one of these, with flowering stems amongst the dead stems, making the decision to cut off the old flowers difficult for volunteers.

Calostemma purpureum - Garland lily is another to appear early. One of the few bulbous plants found in Australia. April onwards, they usually start to send up a stem to 40cm with up to twelve wine-red or pink small trumpet flowers.

Both these colour forms have appeared in the last week. Flowers will die and green strap-like leaves follow. They are flowering in Stage A.





A lovely stand of the pink form will also be seen along the road to Meningie on the west side of road just before Pink Lake, with the wine-red growing naturally on rocky hills along the old highway nearing Callington.

Calostemma luteum - an all yellow flower native to NSW-SA border into Qld, is flowering on the sandy ridge between Stage A & B.

Melaleuca elliptica - its lovely large, dark red lateral spikes, flowering for a lengthy period from November to March, one worth growing in our area.

Pangarinda Botanic Garden is open all year round, so why not treat yourself to a picnic in Autumn and enjoy the wonderful sights, sounds and smells of this wondrous environment. Don't forget to bring your camera to capture the many bird species that call Pangarinda, home.
