

### The Changing Face of Tailem Bend #72

Tailem Bend over the years, has a record of struggling to employ resident Doctors or when employment has been successful, keeping them for any real length of time.

I am not making comparisons to Dr Phil Gooden, as that would be impossible to do - he served our community for over 35 years and no one else has come anywhere near that - and never will.

I'll quote from a clipping I came across, lamenting the plight of Doctors' non availability, many years ago. In the mid 1980's, concern was mounting about the lack of after-hours medical service;

\*\* Town Medico for the past 35 years, Dr Phil Gooden, said there was a problem in getting a doctor to join the practice, he said no-one had replied to advertisements in medical journals or associated publications. Speaking to a journalist at the time, he added that we have a town with a declining population and he couldn't falsify anything by saying the practice was expanding that might attract some-one to apply.

Dr Gooden, who was nearing 60 years of age, said he had to slow his pace, although he was still available from 9am to 9pm every day, except Sundays.

The only help he had was from a doctor who attended the practice two days a week and on one of those days, Dr Gooden consulted at Coonalpyn.

That concern had become especially noticeable during the past three or four months. He said that an increasing number of people needing hospitalisation, were going to Murray Bridge (History repeating itself ????)

A local businessman suggested that the lack of suitable housing in Tailem Bend might be the reason for a doctor not wanting to relocate to the town, especially one who is used to a better class of accommodation in the metropolitan area. Dr Gooden denied this, saying he believed suitable accommodation for a doctor was available in Tailem Bend (Good onya Doc.)

Apart from his medical profession, Dr Gooden was dedicated to his community in many ways, even taking on the role as chairman of the Taberefta Board from 1977 to 1979.

The Lions Club is also a strong minded community organisation and wrote to the Council about the lack of services available from a doctor outside of normal hours. The reply was that it was outside of Council powers to do anything to help. The Lions Club tried, but the answer would be taken as being logical.

Dr Gooden eventually got his wish to retire following a commitment by Dr Patrick O'Neill, <u>PICTURED BELOW</u> <u>RIGHT -</u> who had spent a couple of weeks working in the town before taking over the practice.

Dr Gooden said he had spent 37 glorious years in the town, but was looking forward to retirement.

Hospital Board chairman Bert Welllman, paid tribute to Dr Gooden. for what he said, had been many years of service and dedication to people the of Tailem Bend and surrounding districts.\*\*

### The Changing Face of Tailem Bend #72

I am still in the 1980's and I would like to revive memories of a stalwart of volunteering who spent most of his life serving the Hospital, St Luke's Anglican Church and elsewhere where help was needed; His name is John Robert McFee, but most of that era would remember and recognise him simply as 'Fee'. **<u>PICTURED RIGHT</u>** - Fee was born in Victoria and while there, rode as a light weight jockey in many races. After suffering a slight stroke at an early age, he moved to Tailem Bend in the late 1940's and lived with his brother Alec.

He started working as a gardener for Dr Cornish and continued working for all the Doctors, including Dr Gooden. He was appointed handyman and gardener at the old hospital (near the oval) and moved in as a live in worker. He was kept busy because of the need to stoke the boiler which provided hot water and heating for the hospital during the night.

During these years, Fee worked for his keep and it wasn't until he transferred to the new hospital, that he was paid a regular wage.

A familiar figure around the town on his large tricycle, he did all the hospital shopping and carried the goods on the back of his trike. When the new hospital was built, the board of management built a special room in the complex for Fee, in recognition of the services he gave. He was allowed to live in this room, with facilities of shower room and toilet for the remaining days of his life. After his retirement, he became a very active member of the Senior Citizens Club, with a love for indoor bowls.

Another great love was his Anglican Church - he was the official bell ringer, tended the garden, mowed the lawn and carried out tasks of many descriptions. In later years he was given the honour or ringing the bell one more time, when it was remounted in its new position. He spent long hours as the doorkeeper at debutante balls and dances in the town





Institute. He also found himself sitting on a bag of saw dust, as it was pulled around the dance floor, to add a bit more sheen for a better dancing surface.

Fee will always be remembered by those of us who knew him, as a genuine Tailem Bend identity, who gave all he had for his community and asked for nothing in return.

Next month we start to look at the arrival of migrants who left their war torn homelands to make their homes here and raise families in Tailem Bend.


### **Climbing Cactus!**

The purpose of the SA Tree Watch website is to allow local people to assess the health of trees they are concerned about and add this information to an interactive map and database. Information is collated through an online "Citizen Science" Survey containing diagnostic tools and information which can be found at www.satreewatch.com.auThe website is designed to function well on mobile devices, including mobile phones and tablets.You can enter data you collect in the field directly to the website, or you can download the field guide for reference and then enter the information into the website. ### LETTER TO THE EDITOR - 8/12/17

Firstly, I would like to address the letter to the editor in relation to Taberefta, as I stated on 5MU, this candidate is uninformed and it is clearly highlighted throughout their letter to the editor where they have made allegations that are simply incorrect and nothing more than inflammatory. Responding further to any of the mis-truths of this candidate would be of no benefit and I will instead state the facts.

Myself, Trish and the Board of Management have been working hand in glove with the Office of the Ageing (OFTA) and have been guided strictly on their advice. Through my office and Trish contacting OFTA, it was found that Taberefta had been operating in a non-compliant manner since its inception. As the Chair, with the support of board members and Trish, we have been working hard to ensure appropriate changes are made to guarantee the village is operating in accordance with not only one act, but three.

Taberefta is accountable to three acts, the Retirement Villages Act, the Associations Act and the Residential Tenancies Act.

For six months the Board of Management has been repealing it's constitution to apply appropriate standards of governance and compliance, so given the 6 month review, I do not consider these changes to be rushed through. Additionally, it must also be highlighted that it is the boards responsibility to alter the associations constitution, not the residents.

The Board of Management has endeavoured to keep residents informed and since August, we have distributed several letters informing the renters in Taberefta of the changes applicable to them. In respect to the changes made to the Association AGM and the Residents AGM, as soon as we were informed of this issue by OFTA, residents were notified as soon as possible.

Additionally, the information we were distributing was also reiterated and confirmed by a letter to residents from OFTA.

Trish and myself are always open to speaking with residents and receiving their feedback and concerns. OFTA as the regulator are also available to speak with residents if they wish.

I must also take this opportunity to sincerely thank the volunteers who have worked tirelessly over many years (some even decades) offering their time to Taberefta. Their contributions have not gone unnoticed and we are forever grateful for their support and dedication to the community.

Regretfully, the decision was made to no longer allow volunteers to conduct works at Taberefta. This was as a result of bullying and intimidation by several residents, we do not feel it is appropriate to have our great volunteers ridiculed for their hard work. This bullying and intimidation has also extended across all facets of the village and this will be a matter the board will continue to address as we proceed further.

I came on this board, not because of my capacity as the Local State Member, but because I grew up with many of the people involved in this village and it has certainly not come without its challenges. I knew many of these residents when I was a young boy and I am here to ensure all residents can retire peacefully and happily in Taberefta, which is a retirement village that offers independent living arrangements for people over 55.

### **Taberefta - Homes for the Aged**

"KEPT IN THE DARK" - November 17, 2017

SA-BEST candidate for the seat of Hammond, Kelly Gladigau, has slammed the board of the Tailem Bend Homes for the Aged Inc. (TABEREFTA) retirement village and its newly-appointed administrator, for failing to properly consult with distressed elderly residents about sudden changes to make the home compliant with existing laws.

Kelly says she has received complaints from worried residents and family members about "secret and retrospective" changes to the facility's constitution, occupancy agreements and administration that are currently being rushed through by the board, headed by its chairman and local Liberal MP, Adrian Pederick.

"It is quite upsetting and confusing for them. Some have even had complicated legal documents stuffed into their letterboxes," Kelly said. "They are in their eighties and have medical conditions and they simply do not understand what is going on here because it hasn't been properly explained to them."

She said three worried residents, who rent their units, and had previously signed agreements, which promised them lifetime occupancy, are now being presented with new leases backdated several years so they comply with the Residential Tenancies Act, which only allows leases for a maximum of five years."

"Something is not right here. I've never seen anything like it, the management needs to explain why this has happened, and why they are seeking to renege on the original agreement," Kelly said.

TABEREFTA was built in the mid-1970s through donations from the local community to provide low-cost accommodation for the elderly in the district.

After nearly four decades being run by volunteers and the residents, an investigation by Office of the Ageing found the administration of the not-for-profit organisation had been non-compliant with three different laws and regulations covering occupancy, tenancy agreements and financial reporting.

The organisation's scheduled annual general meeting in October was cancelled and has now been rescheduled for November 20, where a new board drawn independently from the village is expected to be appointed.

But residents with lifetime occupancy have been told that they are excluded from nominating as board members and will no longer have any say in the running of the village. The three residents who rent their units are barred altogether from attending the AGM.

In addition the residents have been told they will not be able to have family members as their proxies at the meeting.

"I cannot understand why Mr. Pederick, an experienced politician who has held the chairman's job for some time, and his board took so long to realise there was a serious problem here," Kelly said. "I am assured that the new village administrator has their interests and welfare at heart however much more needs to be done to inform all the residents. "Those in authority in nursing homes and retirement villages must take the time to sit down with residents and their families to fully explain situations and what is happening, and ease any concerns they might have."

"Sometimes, elderly people can find changes to their living arrangements quite daunting and confronting. In this case it has been very distressing. TABEREFTA is a wonderful facility and SA-BEST will work hard to maintain that legacy, and if need be we will consider pushing amendments to the act to strengthen the rights of residents," Kelly said.

I have lived at Taberefta for 14 years and I am happy to be living here, as my husband has a severe form of Arthritis and his mobility is restricted.

Our decision to come to Taberefta, was made when my husband could no longer do home maintenance as his condition worsened. Living here meant we did not have to worry about doing the maintenance ourselves, and anything that needed to be repaired, would be fixed.

My husband and I are grateful to those local people who worked so hard by holding money raising ventures to start this village. We are also aware of those in the community who came up with the idea, such as Dr Gooden and others on the Hospital Board, who had the foresight to see a need for our ageing community.

It was through all the hard work of the community that the first six single units were built. I understand that there were some problems after this, that involved legal proceedings, but here we are today, with 24 units in total, 18 of which are two bedroom units.

This has all be accomplished through the hard work of those on the Board, who are all volunteers and have always done the best they could with the knowledge they had. There are some board members who have dedicated their time to the board for over 20 years. For this, I am sure, every resident in the village is truly grateful.

The only one thing that can be frustrating is the division between residents who pay a premium to live here and those that are renting. It makes for a two class system, which is not perfect. However our Residents Committee tries very hard to make this division unnoticeable, by including all residents to take part in any social activities held. To me, there is no difference between how

one came to be resident in а the village - if a person lives in the village, they are a resident. We hold Happy Hour every Friday from 5pm to 7pm. A sausage sizzle is held one fortnight and the on next fortnight, we Pizza have a night.

Things have changed in the village since I have lived here, the Retirement Villages Act 1987, went



through a review in 2006, and the Retirement Villages Act 2016, will come into effect next year. This demonstrates how slowly the wheels turn in this area.

Change is not always something easy to cope with when we get older, so as long as the Board keep doing their best to consult with the Residents to allay their fears, make the transitions more understandable, and keep the running of the village open and transparent, life should continue to go smoothly.

Dear resident,

The Department for Health and Ageing through Office for the Ageing (OFTA) is responsible for the administration of the *Retirement Villages Act 1987* (the Act) and the *Retirement Villages Regulations 2006* (the Regulations). This is the legislation that governs retirement villages in South Australia.

The Office for the Ageing has received a number of queries in relation to the obligations of TABAREFTA in complying with the requirements of the legislation. We are aware that there is a significant amount of misinformation and confusion circulating in the village and I would like to set the record straight and provide you with information about the

involvement of this Office and actions that we have instructed TABEREFTA take.

Our office has undertaken a program of information sessions targeted at operators of retirement villages to prepare them for the commencement of new legislation on 1 January

2018. As a result of these sessions, the village administrator contacted our office seeking advice on the annual meeting requirements and other matters.

It has become apparent that TABEREFTA has, over the years, confused and combined the requirements of the Retirement Villages Act and the Associations Incorporation Act. Our Office is assisting the Board of Management of TABEREFTA to identify areas of non compliance with the RV Act and assist them in remedying these breaches. Many past practices will have to change, and this may be uncomfortable for some residents, as governance moves onto a more professional footing.

The annual meeting of residents will occur on 20 November. This meeting was delayed at our direction. The aim of this meeting under the RV Act is to provide residents with transparent and easy to understand information about how the funds which they contribute to are expended in the village. The meeting provides residents with an opportunity to ask questions about how their service charges are spent and any increases in these charges. Minutes of this meeting must be distributed to residents within 14 days of the meeting. Where a vote is required, there is only one vote per residence not per person and the RV Act does not allow for proxy voting.

I am aware that some residents within the village are renting their units. The RV Act does not allow for permanent tenure for renters and prohibits a lease of greater than 5 years without Ministerial approval. The new legislation further clarifies that a person who has such a lease does not become a resident of the village and must be subject to the

Residential Tenancies Act.

As the Regulator we will assist TABAREFTA to be prepared and become compliant with both the current and incoming legislation. We will be in attendance at the annual meeting on 20 November, and will be available to answer questions if needed after the meeting.





### **Community Pet Page**

#### Advance notice to changes to be introduced 1 July 2018

From 1 July 2018, it will be compulsory for:

- All dogs and cats over a certain age to be microchipped.
- All new generations of dogs and cats (born after July 2018) to be desexed exemptions apply for working dogs, registered breeders etc.

While the new desexing requirement only affects dogs and cats born after **1 July 2018**, all dogs and cats **must be microchipped** by this date. Discount microchipping days will be offered at the Meningie Vet.

#### New rules for Breeders and Sellers

From **1 July 2018**, breeders and sellers who breed dogs and cats for sale must register with the Dog and Cat Management Board as a breeder.

Breeders and sellers must now adhere to new industry standards and guidelines, which stipulate the minimum welfare conditions that must be met to comply with the state's animal welfare laws.

### Early registration for dog and cat breeders now available online

South Australians can now begin the process of registering as a dog or cat breeder via the Dog and Cat Management Board's website, before registration becomes compulsory on 1 July 2018.

The requirement to register as a breeder is designed to bring greater accountability to the dog and cat trade, and force unscrupulous puppy and kitten farmers into the light.

The new "pre-registry" has been launched in response to growing interest from dog and cat owners keen to comply with new laws.

#### Background

Breeder registration is just one of the state's new dog and cat management laws, including tougher fines for dog attacks, compulsory microchipping and mandatory desexing for all dogs and cats born after 1 July 2018 (subject to exemption).

The new breeder registration requirement applies to anyone who breeds a dog or cat, not just pedigree breeds.

Once registered with the Board, breeders will be issued with a breeder registration number (BRN) that must appear in all advertisements for sale or trade.

When in effect from 1 July 2018, it will be illegal for most people to advertise, sell or trade a dog or cat without disclosing the breeder registration number.

Breeders can now lodge their name and email address with the Board, and will be notified when official registration commences shortly prior to 1 July 2018.

#### DACO – a new way to register your dog

From **1 July 2018**, dog registrations, along with the way you manage your pet dog or cat's microchip, health and breeder information, will be simplified with the introduction of a new website.

Dogs and Cats Online (DACO) will be the central point for all your dog and cat management payments and information, **replacing all individual council systems** and private microchip databases currently in place.

Not only will DACO simplify your dog management needs, but it will streamline the process for councils, vets and animal welfare agencies too, giving these organisations instant access to information from around the state. This will help them reunite you and your lost dog quicker.

Council plays a vital role in dog management in your community. They are responsible for collection and return of stray dogs, investigating complaints of barking dogs and dog attacks. For this reason, councils will now have greater powers under the revised laws, including increases in some explations and penalties.

#### Letter to the Editor,

In response to Don Wood (Letter to the Editor, 'To All Ratepayers', December 2017) who requested to be corrected if he was wrong. Well Mr Wood, I suggest you do more research before making such huge assumptions. Adrian Pederick is first and foremost a ratepayer in the Coorong District Council (CDC) area and therefore fully entitled to ask questions about a subject on which he is passionate and that subject is roads. The ratepayers group have been lucky to have Mr Pederick attend most ratepayer meetings at Tailem Bend, Meningie, Tintinara and Peake to offer comments about the condition of the roads he personally uses and which he has seen degrade alarmingly over time.

CDC already has a total allocation of \$4,345,860 in the "Roads to Recovery grant funding program", with \$948,854 coming in to the assets pool for 2016/17 alone. The CDC has declared total grant funding of \$7,327,000 in it's 2016/17 annual report with \$5,854,000 coming from the Commonwealth government and \$1,125,000 coming from the State government.

CDC's own Roads Asset Management Plan (RAMP 2012-2022) stated that \$3,055,000 was needed for capital and maintenance expenditure for roads in 2016/17 rising to \$3,302,000 for 2017/18 (page 76/90). So it's not as though the modelling hasn't been done for the expected cost and maintenance profile, it has.

In the same RAMP document (page 30/90), when asked to rank the importance of seven Council asset and infrastructure services, the residents presented their views regarding the services delivered by Council in terms of priority. At the top of the list with an importance score of 9.26 (on a scale of 1 [least important] to 10 [most important]) were roads, followed by 9.06 for the provision & maintenance of facilities for aged, disabled & special needs groups.

The 2016/17 Annual Report contains the 2016 Financial Statements. In it CDC declares \$8,436,000 income from general rates. Add that to the \$7,327,000 in grants funding, that gives a total income of \$15,763,000. The total income for the previous year was \$14,399,000. A \$1,364,000 increase in one year! Yet the modelling for road expenditure only increased by \$247,000 for this year.

Employee costs 2017 \$4,317,000 down \$9,000 from 2016 \$4,326,000 but contractor costs up \$458,000 from \$2,253,000 to \$2,711,000.

Employee costs represent 27%, and contractor costs 17% of the total income (44%), with RAMP road budgets only representing 20% of the total income. Except we can't see from the financial statements exactly what "has" been spent on roads as it's not explicitly listed under the expenses list. It's hidden in contractor costs, employee costs, maybe even in maintenance costs. It's certainly not in "road making materials" which totals \$2,000 for 2017 and \$0 for 2016! So exactly what has been spent on roads is a complete guess. But it certainly doesn't look to me or anyone else that \$3.3m has been spent on the CDC's road network.

So, Mr Wood, I put it to you that Mr Pederick is well within his rights to ask council as many times as he wants just how much of his rates are being spent on roads. We don't need Mr Pederick to ask for yet more grant funding for council to waste, we need him to ask what precisely council are spending their vast amounts of ratepayers and grant funding money on. Because one thing is for sure, we are the ratepayers, and we are already paying more than enough and getting precious little in return and we are entitled to answers no matter who asks the questions.


