An insight into the formation of TB Auto Club

Tailem Bend Auto Club formed in February 2013, after Greg Black advertised that there was a possibility that there would be a car club of some sort forming in Tailem Bend if there was enough interest. The first meeting had interest from 9 people.

Greg is member 001, someone had to be, and he continued to promote the club in any way possible. Greg was elected the TBAC President at the meeting in February 2013 when the club first got started. He was assisted by Lynton Piggott, Mark Liebich and Randy Mcloughlin after that first meeting. Greg continued in the role of President until the AGM of 2017, but he didn't step away from the executive role completely; he took on the role of Treasurer which he then held until the AGM of 2020.

Initially meetings were held at Greg and Julie's house until a suitable venue could be agreed upon. There was much work to be done to set up the club, firstly a suitable name then a constitution so the club could be an incorporated body and apply for a bank account. Greg organised all of this and got the relevant forms printed so that the club could move forward and attract more members.

The Club took 2 years to gain the Club permitted Registration Documents with many hours put in by Greg as President to achieve this, while he was getting his own Triumph out on the road to participate in the early activities that were organised.

The club has grown quite substantially since the inaugural meeting and membership is now approaching 400 members, so with this rapid growth there are now more members helping with the rapidly growing mountain of paperwork this generates.

The Changing Face of Tailem Bend #105

This month we look at the memories of Doreen Lutz Her time in Tailem Bend.

I arrived in Tailem Bend on 23rd April, 1970 having flown from England via London (wet), New York (wet), Los Angeles (sunny), Hawaii (Dark and Humid), Fiji (dark), Sydney (too tired to care), and Adelaide.

I had come as a primary school teacher and was appointed to a position at Tailem Bend Primary School and began teaching on Monday 27th April. The staff at that time included: Colin Dyster (head), Mrs Dyster, Greta Bolt, Paul and Margaret Rayner, Dean and Kendra Kessell, Dorothy Dinham, Bohdan Cybulka, Peter Phillips, Eileen Schultz, and others whose names I have forgotten. The cleaners were Dianne and Harry Frundt.

The school consisted of a two-storey stone building, two transportable classroom buildings with the library in one of the upstairs rooms. The Open Unit was first used in 1971. It was intended as an area of spaces in which subjects were offered and students could move around and learn which ones they wanted. A single portable classroom was placed where the playground is now. That was used by Dean Kessell and later converted into a dental unit. The administration block was built later. Until then the staff room was on the upper level of the old building.

There was also a Catholic Primary School. At that time Tailem Bend was a busy railway and farming community.

If memory serves me, there was:

Bolton's Hardware: (Hardware on one side and work clothing on the other). Three banks: State Bank, SA Savings Bank, and Commercial Bank. A chemist, Hughes' Newsagency, Post Office, two or three delis, a greengrocer's, two shoe shops: Hill's and Slocome's? Two bakeries: Mik's and Persello's. Three grocers; Northcott's, Bolton's (opposite the Tasty Chicken), Eudunda Farmers, and also, Sheila Hill's small shop on the road to Karoonda.

There were three butcher shops: McMorron's, Stan Hill's and Jack Phillip's. Eudunda Farmers was a mini department store selling haberdashery, carpets, clothing, groceries and so much more. They also had a grocery delivery service. Bill Bristow would visit each customer to get their shopping list then deliver the order.

There was a weekly livestock market which sold more than just animals. The main highway through Tailem Bend was single laned. Each side of the highway there was a wide expanse of just dirt. It was in the late 1970's that the Princes Highway became a dual carriage way, and later still before the access roads were paved.

The Changing Face of Tailem Bend #105

I had arrived in Tailem Bend by the local train service from Adelaide. The Blue Bird ran each day between Mt Gambier and Adelaide. The Overland ran each day also. I remember catching the train at Adelaide station thinking it would be about an hour and a half to make the journey. I knew nothing about the Adelaide Hills. It took nearer to three hours.

Not long after I had arrived in Tailem Bend, I bought my first car from Peter Squires.

Heynen Motors had a thriving business selling and repairing cars and Chamberlain farm machinery. The used cars stood in an area of land on the corner of North Tce and Railway Tce, where the Shell truck park is now. There was a row of shops there which included Nottage's Chemist shop and a deli. Keith Carslake had a car repair business and sold used vehicles. I only taught at Tailem Bend Primary School for one year. I met and married Don Lutz, who had built a house in the town, had a hobby farm at the end of Blacketts Rd, and drove a truck, in a quarry at Reynella, all week.

In 1971 we were married in Trinity Lutheran Church on Seymour St. In 1974 we bought a farm on Westbrook Rd where we lived until 2017. Previous owners of the farm were Bevis Bradtke, Vern Leinert and Jim Enright. We picked up our fertiliser from the railway, wheeling each bag from the rail truck to our farm truck, using a sack-truck. Now fertiliser is delivered in bulk by semi-trailers.

Most farmers delivered their grain to the Barley and Wheat Boards at the silo. There would be long lines of trucks waiting for the silo to open. Often farmers would leave their truck at the front of the queue and return in time for the opening of the silo. That way they could deliver two loads of grain before they began reaping for the day. Now grain is put into paddock bins for semi-trailers to pick up and deliver to the silo.

We sold sheep at the Tailem Bend market, then at Murray Bridge market when Tailem closed, and our wool through Tony Gabriel who visited the farms.

There have been many changes in the number of businesses in Tailem Bend. Eudunda Farmers expanded its floor space and began selling more groceries on the left-hand side of the store, with those metal 'gates' (as now) to allow customers to buy and pay for groceries in that area, separate from the other 'departments'. Unfortunately, they did not operate their business for long after the expansion.

The Savings Bank rebuilt its façade; the Commercial Bank became Elders Real Estate; Elders store is now the pizza shop. The State Bank building is now Kozi's music. The row of shops on the east side of the railway, which included Persello's bakery and McMorron's butcher shop, have all become private residences, and many shops no longer operate. The town hall has undergone a couple of changes since I have lived in the area. Hill's shoe and butcher shops were demolished to build the Council's new office block. I came as a 'Ten-pound Pom' looking for a change from my city life. I did not realise that there would be such a large change when I accepted a position to teach at Tailem Bend. It has been a good change.

Tailem Bend has still preserved its personality as a community which looks for ways to overcome obstacles and I would not like to live anywhere else.

Thanks Doreen next month we stay with your family, remarkably interesting stories from your Husband Don and his life in Tailem Bend. See you then!

World Wetlands Day 2021

World Wetlands Day 2021 celebrations held at Murrundi Reserve Wellington.

The newly constructed bird hide in the Murrundi Reserve was officially opened on Saturday 30th of January 2021. The event was timed to coincide with World Wetlands Day celebrations worldwide and was coordinated by Jacqui Wilson who is the Community Engagement Officer of the Goolwa to Wellington Local Action Planning Association Inc.

There were 35 people in attendance and an explanation was provided by Bob Radford on how the current WPA is involved in maintaining the Reserve followed by Peter Crowley who gave an explanation of the WPA involvement since the projects inception - much of which was the brainchild of his late parents. Peter articulated his talk in a combination of Ngarrindjeri and English languages that was well received.

Addresses were then given by experts in attendance on frogs (with different frog species being displayed), turtle and bat populations outlining their endangerment with some people present taking the opportunity to record their sounds for research etc. and then additionally an address on bird life in the area was given.

Following these presentations, the gathering took a very pleasant walk along the pathway that runs from north to south through the Reserve and were shown old middens, turtle nests that had been destroyed by foxes, numerous birds and during this walk, many questions were put forward and answered by the experts.

1898 Geelong Victoria. Stella Truehart is all alone in the world.



Will sudden bloodshed prevent the resolution of the mystery and stand in the way of her feelings for Bendigo?



I have two 1991 Ford KH2 Laser, one is a Royal Blue Standard 1.8 cc twin cam, five speed manual and the other is a British Green 1.8 cc twin cam turbo all-wheel drive and both have travelled about 230,000 kms each. With the help of club member, Colin Rohde, I hope to transplant the turbo and the all-wheel over to the Royal Blue Laser in the near future.

The Ford Laser is a compact car, originally a subcompact car in the first three generations, which was sold by Ford in Asia, Oceania, and parts of South America, and Africa. It has generally been available as a sedan or hatchback, although convertible, wagon and pick-up versions have also been available in different markets.

The sedan, and briefly station wagon, versions were badged Ford Meteor in Australia between 1981 and 1987. The Ford Laser was a restyled version of the Familia/323 models produced by Mazda in Japan from 1980 onwards. Ford had acquired a 25% stake in Mazda in 1979.

This was most notably evident during the 1980s with multiple turbocharged variants, unique bodyshells such as the cabriolet, and full-time 4WD models all available years before their debuts in other markets (and in some cases, never making it offshore at all). The third generation BG series of 1989 to 1994 went on to be the most popular Laser sold in Japan, with the new "coupé" (lift back) version an instant success. Again, a DOHC turbo model with full-time 4WD was offered as a companion car to the Mazda Familia GT-X, now producing 180 PS (132 kW; 178 hp) from an increased displacement of 1.8 litres. In Australia, this model was released in March 1990 as the KF series and updated in October 1991 with the KH facelift. Local production of the Laser in Australia ceased in 4 September 1994 when Ford closed its plant at Homebush, New South Wales, and imported the new KJ model from Japan.

Pangarinda Botanic Garden

Pangarinda Botanic Garden has become the cream scene, with the local Eucalypts covered in creamy, white flowers, along with a number of Eucalypts from other areas. A few large erect cream flowers of Banksia sceptrum are still to be seen, while the creamy-green flowers of both Banksia speciosa and baxteri are beginning to flower.

Melaleuca lanceolata a widespread plant found growing from south Western Australia across to South Queensland, common on the limestone soils of the Murray Mallee, is another plant at Pangarinda that is hiding its dense, dark green foliage with large white to cream-coloured, cylindrical flowers. All the above plants are insects attracting, especially for bees, the main food source for the Rainbow Bee Eaters.

During the first week of February the constant highpitched chittering from the increasing number of Rainbow Bee Eaters, wheeling and swooping around the tree tops chasing bees and insects for their young. Young joining parents sitting on limbs waiting for the food to be delivered.

There was excitement one week, the next week quiet and we realise our visitors have left, all but two. They were the unfortunate having their holes dug out by a fox and having to start again, still waiting for their young to be mature enough to take the long flight north.





When questioned regarding Tailem Bend's ambitious Sporting Hub project he showed enthusiasm that it would achieve success.

What is your most treasured possession? What would you like to pass on to other members of your family? What would you take with you if your home was threatened?

Most people have something which is important to them. When we are faced with the sudden loss of our home by fire, flood or other disaster, we are confronted by the realisation that all our possessions are lost. Often I hear those who have had their homes destroyed mourn the loss of photographs and heirlooms.

Photographs are usually of people and events which are important to us. Their memories remain. Heirlooms are the tangible connections to our ancestors and are irreplaceable. Survivors then say, "At least we are alive and safe. Possessions can be replaced. We can start again."

Unfortunately, possessions have become important to us to show how clever we are to have the job which can allow us to buy this, go on holiday there. We focus ourselves on being able to own these 'things'. Alternatively we can become disillusioned by our inability to, 'succeed and possess these things', that we give up and have no hope.

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus says, "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy, and thieves break in and steal." We can be so obsessed with gathering 'possessions' around us, that we worry about their safety, building up walls, barriers and electronic security.

These possessions possess us. They are not enjoyed with pleasure, and if they disappear what has life been about? Jesus tells us, "But store up for yourselves treasure in heaven......, for where your treasure is there your heart will be also."

Instead of worrying about how others measure our success by what we own, we should be showing people our possession of hope in eternal life. That eternal life through Christ is our goal. Not a goal to be the wealthiest person on the planet. We cannot take our possessions with us when we die. The Egyptian Pharoahs did not manage to do so! However, we can take our faith and enter into heaven through Christ.

(Read Matthew chapter 19 verses 16-30)

A wealthy young man approached Jesus and asked, "Teacher, what good things must I do to get eternal life?" He had obeyed the Commandments, so asked, "What do I still lack?" Jesus replied, "If you want to be perfect, go, sell your possessions and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven."

Are we willing to give up our ownership of possessions in order to look after the poor? We are rich in our security, through Christ, of an eternal life in heaven. We should share this wealth with those who are poor without it.
