Mallee Mob reunion and Book Launch ~

On Saturday 10th July members of the "Mallee Mob" gathered at the Westbrook Woolshed for their quinquennial reunion, with 2021 featuring the much-awaited book launch of Peter (Stoney) Stone's self-titled book called Stoney, from the wild 60's to outback adventures.

Stoney lived on his Uncle Ben Kuchel's farm (*Bendor*) located at Moorlands from the age of fifteen (15). It was during Stoney's early years here that he became known as a local larrikin. Getting to know many of the local folk, Stoney forged lifelong relationships with the crew now affectionately known as the Mallee Mob. Stoney, his wife Sally and daughters spent many years travelling Australia and experiencing adventures that many of us would dream of today.

Daughter Sandy Stone said "Growing up we were fully aware that our father was the main instigator and creator of numerous pranks, silly antics and crazy capers that are definitely hard to believe, bringing so much laughter and happiness to people's lives, along with his special gift of storytelling".

"We encouraged Dad that his remarkable life in all aspects, and his extensive knowledge of the Australian outback and all his adventures must be documented and not left sitting in his toolbox, This incredible life story is now a part of our family history and the book "Stoney" will live on forever." she said.

Local Daren Gurney paid tribute to Stoney and his book launch with a live performance of "Stoney the Mad Man from Moorlands" written several years ago when a member of the ever popular local band Mallee Blue.

The Mallee Mob reunion, which is held every five (5) years coincided with the book launch. Over 100 Members of the Mallee Mob came from near and far to gather, celebrate and reminisce about the old times and the good times.

Set amongst the backdrop of local mallee scrub the Westbrook Woolshed played host for every Mallee Mob Reunion. Owners Bill and Margaret Jaensch have enjoyed the many gatherings and parties held in the woolshed over the years.

The term champion can be loosely bandied around at times, but the Tailem Bend Rowing Club can proudly claim an out and out champion rower and sculler in Tania Rucioch (Nee Riggs), who growing up loved the River Murray and spent countless hours on it, honing her skills and development as an award winning athlete. Over to Tania

I don't specifically recall how my rowing career began. It was certainly due to spending a lot of time over the summer months at the rowing shed while growing up. I often hung out with Daniel Dickson and Gabby Merritt (McLoughlin) waiting around for our older siblings while they were at rowing training and Mr & Mrs Dickson and Mr McLoughlin tending to many jobs and tireless hours managing the club.

Being around the shed often and available I filled in as cox and eventually learnt to row from around the age of 11. The first regular crew I was in included Joanne Rowe, Teresa Hillard & Sharon Sacco. I enjoyed being on the water and everything changed when I first tried rowing in a scull when TBRC purchased a single scull in 1984/85?

Rowing in a scull gave me more opportunity to be on the water, but the scull was also popular with other rowers. Mum & Dad purchased a scull that they had made, to suit my small stature, by Adelaide boat builder Alan Smith, who had built a four for the club in 1986/87. I enjoyed the solitude and the peacefulness of rowing my scull, particularly early in the morning while the fog was sitting just above the water. My dad, Don Riggs, spent a number of hours following me in his tinny – I think he also enjoyed the peacefulness of the water and had also rowed himself with Bill Jeansch as their Cox.

John Abbott was instrumental to my rowing success, and the successes of many other TBRC members with his countless hours of keeping us fit, training on the water and getting us all race ready.

Friday afternoons there was no training, but it was when we would load the boat trailer ready for an early morning departure on Saturday. I was always amazed that the club's Valiant would make it through the Hills and Devil's Elbow! Races were mostly at West Lakes each weekend, but my favourites were the country long weekends at Berri/Renmark and Murray Bridge/Mannum. I usually went in style to rowing with Mum driving Mr Cattle's LTD. Mr Cattle served in the First world War Infantry and lived at the TB Hospital. He grew up rowing, so loved having the day out or long weekend away supporting the TBRC members.

The camaraderie of TBRC was amazing with lots of friendships made with so many people spanning over many years.

I coxed for a composite Murray Bridge/Tailem Bend Womens Junior crew which included Tailem Bend Rowers Wendy Zander and Leonie Andrew (now Capes). Wendy Zander also competed in Womens Senior B Lightweight Coxless Four. The Nationals were over Easter and I recall not being able to eat any chocolate as I weighed 47kg and had to get as close as possible to 45kg which involved running several times a day and not eating any Easter Eggs.

~ The Tasty Chicken History ~

My grandparents, John and Emma Murphy, moved to Tailem Bend from Laura in the mid-north of South Australia to open a butcher shop.

They arrived in 1922 and I recall my Nanna saying what a dry, hot, windy place it was compared to the green farm country in Laura. So, I assume they arrived in the summer with 6 children in tow.

The business was very successful and the family purchased an Essex car, the first in Tailem Bend. This vehicle was used to transport meat across the river. Once a week my grandfather would make the 7-mile journey to Wellington and cross the River Murray on the punt to deliver meat to the dairy farmers from Wellington to Jervois. Some of his children and their city cousins would accompany him during the school holidays.

My 99-year-old Aunt recalls taking her cousins from Adelaide on this adventure and some 90 years later her cousin mentioned eating jam sandwiches and home-made bush biscuits. My Aunty Mavis Murphy commented, "they must have been good sandwiches if she remembered them after 80+ years!!!!"

Three more children were born during their time in Tailem Bend and the business continued to thrive in those early years.

My Aunty Mavis Murphy's recollections of the shop and house are as follows....

The shop was attached to the house and had a large window across the front with a metre wide bench and the entry door was on the left. My youngest brother Ken would sit on the window bench, while our parents worked, waiting for us to return from school.

The house consisted of 3 bedrooms. There were two front rooms and a passage leading to the living room which had a large fireplace. The back of the house was a lean-to containing the kitchen and a third bedroom. A wood burning stove was used for cooking. There was a dirt floor veranda which led out to the wash house/laundry which had a wood burning copper. And of course, there was the outside dunny halfway down the back yard which was emptied by the night cart. A garage was built at the side of the house.

There was access to the shop from the back of the house. As you entered the rear of the shop there was the sausage making room with a large sausage making machine and a cellar where all the corned beef was produced and stored. There was a large underground rainwater tank under the floor at the back of the shop. A pump was attached to the tank and one of our chores was to make sure there was always a bucket of water in the kitchen for drinking and washing the dishes.

The backyard was fenced off and we had a large wood pile and horse stables. The back gate opened onto the road and led to the school. The chooks were kept near the stables. We had two horses, Queenie and a draught horse named Digger. Queenie pulled the enclosed butcher's cart to deliver meat around the town and Digger pulled the heavy dray to the slaughter yard about a mile out of Tailem Bend. Inside the shop on the right-hand side was a large icebox. The ice was placed in the top section. We would buy the large blocks of ice from Gent's near the school.

The family relocated to Adelaide in October 1936 with 9 children and the butcher business was sold. Over the years it has been a video shop, a take-away and a chicken shop (*The Tasty Chicken*). It has always been a landmark for my extended family as we travel along The Duke's Highway. As recently as this year, 2021, our son pointed out the shop and its historic relevance to his family and retold the many stories, related by his grandfather, of life at the Bend in the 1920s.

Our talented cook for July is Pauline Merritt and she is sharing her Mum's rock bun recipe.

Pauline and her husband Neville were born in Tailem Bend. Her parents, Ivy and Jeff Hughes had four children, John, Maxine, Brian and Robert. They lived in a five bedroom home behind Hughes Newsagency and Café, which was owned and operated by the family. The dining room at Hughes' Café was frequently busy particularly after football and on Elder's sale yard days. Their Dad, Jeff was devoted to the community and worked hard delivering petrol to farmers and bagging grain as well as running the Newsagency. He was a good friend to many, providing support to those he could help.

At 14 Pauline started as an apprentice hairdresser with Eve Selecki, in the shop that was at the side of the Bakery. At 19 she bought the business from Eve and moved into a shop next to the Newsagent. This shop was previously an electrical shop run by her brother John and was recently our town Butcher Shop. She had 7 apprentices over the years, the last one being Kay Millard (*nee Crouch*).

Pauline has always loved being involved in the community and has been a part of many groups and clubs over the years but the cemetery beautification has been a labour of love for her. For 19 years she has led a working group of volunteers improving Tailem Bend's Cemetery. As part of this, 130 nameless graves which had over time become flat, have been identified. This has enabled some people to find burial sites of family members that they never knew were there. Stories came from everywhere. Now only 3 remain unidentified.

Thanks must go to our Tailem Bend community for the money donated to support this work. Much has been achieved including placing green shade cloth around the fence line to stop the sand drift, lowering paths, spreading gravel, weeding and much more, with some being huge jobs.

Other improvements include the Gazebo built by Lynton Piggott and designed by Michael Halliday, and the Columbarium, designed by Pauline and Malcolm Piggott with stone work crafted by Malcolm.

All of the improvements could not have been achieved without the volunteer support, community donations and the support of the Coorong Council, the Rotary Club and the Lions Club. And of course, Pauline. Thank you for your devotion and hard work. It is certainly a credit to you and all who have helped over the years to make our cemetery one to be proud of.

Nanna's Rock Bun Recipe

- Packet of 'Fairy' margarine 250gm (other brand ok)
- ¾ cup of sugar
- 3 eggs
- 1 kilogram of mixed fruit or sultanas
- Pinch of salt
- 3 shakes of cinnamon and mixed spice
- Cap or teaspoon of vanilla essence
- Cup of milk
- 5 cups of Self raising flour (can be gluten free)
- 1. Cream margarine and sugar and add eggs, then add dry ingredients.
- 2. Lastly add flour gradually until mixture is quite dry.
- 3. Roll into little balls and bake at 170, fan forced oven for 17 minutes.
- 4. This recipe makes 60. Halve recipe for 30.
- 5. To add an extra touch prepare some sugar and cinnamon on a saucer and dip the balls into it before baking.

Pauline's Mum, Ivy loved making these rock buns every week and they were enjoyed by many. They stay fresh and they're great dunkers!

~ Tailem Bend a Covid-19 Hot-Spot ~

Residents of Tailem Bend were surprised and perhaps shocked and disappointed when on July 13th, SA Health identified our Shell Service Station, and later the Coolibah Café as Covid-19 exposure sites. A crew of three removalists from Sydney, two of whom had contracted the Delta variant travelled to McLaren Vale and then through Tailem Bend. They visited the Shell on Friday 9th July to refuel and two of them visited the café. Although they were there for only around a half an hour the exposure time was put at between 5.20pm and 7pm.

Staff and anyone who was at the Shell during these times needed to quarantine along with their household contacts for 14 days, have mandatory Covid testing on days one, five and thirteen and make themselves known to SA Health. It was later confirmed that the removalists had also visited the On the Run Service Station just out of Tailem Bend, so the same procedures were necessary there.

This left many people who were at these same sites, either as staff or customers, in mandatory isolation for 14 days. Many locals also had testing at the Tailem Covid testing clinic (adjacent to the Caltex Roadhouse) and because of the demand SA Health announced on Friday 16th July that the testing clinic would operate around the clock. On the same day SA Health also reported that 367 people were in quarantine.

An update from SA Health on 13th July confirmed that both Shell staff members and their household contacts returned negative test results. They all needed to remain in quarantine for 14 days and complete further testing requirements.

As a precaution Tailem Bend and Jervois Football Clubs cancelled their matches that were due to be played on Saturday 17th July and Tailem Bend became a little quiet as people came to terms with what was happening. Many people had not signed in at these sites making it very difficult to trace those who may have been at risk. Hopefully many will see this as a wake-up call and be more vigilant, realising the importance of signing in whether it is with the QR code or pen and paper.

Meanwhile in the city, the Modbury cluster had grown to five cases while SA Health issued new alerts for other high risk spots across Adelaide. On Tuesday morning, 20th July, our State Government announced that South Australia would go into a one week lockdown from 6pm that night as authorities raced to stop the highly infectious Delta strain spreading.

During the lockdown people can only leave home for five essential reasons. They are: to undertake essential work, shop for essential goods and services (*including takeaway*), Medical reasons (*including CovId-19 vaccination and testing*), Care and caregiving and exercise (*with people in the same household*). Schools will be closed. Children of essential workers and vulnerable children will be able to attend school, preschool or childcare. It is also necessary to wear a mask when leaving home.

Compassion, support for each other, looking after our neighbours and making sure people we know and care about are ok, are all very important during these difficult times. If you are not already vaccinated, think about it, and contact your local medical centre or doctor to arrange an appointment. Protect yourself, your family and others. Social distancing remains crucial and if you do have symptoms please get tested.

In closing I want to say thank you to all our essential workers, you know who you are. I am grateful for your dedication, caring, commitment and all you do to serve our community. Be proud of the work you do and the difference you make and know that it is appreciated. A special shout out and thank you to all the workers at our Covid Testing Clinic which is a very busy site with no doubt many challenges. The left lane of the freeway near this site has been closed today, 22nd July, to allow for the line-up of cars - and yesterday a local lady waited ten hours for a test.

Hopefully by the time you read this South Australia will no longer be in lockdown. Take care, wait, trust, pray and remember you're not stuck at home, you're safe at home.

From the Chamber

COVID-19 has again changed normal business practices and routines across the State, with the latest outbreak leading to a seven-day lockdown. The Ordinary Council meeting was held on 20 July in the afternoon before the State entered lockdown at 6:00pm. To abide by SA Health advice, Council Members were encouraged to join the meeting electronically, and the public gallery was closed to help reduce movement in the community. As is now normal practice for Coorong District Council, the meeting was livestreamed via YouTube for members of the public to access remotely.

During the meeting Members discussed how community groups could leverage grant funding and become grant-ready for upcoming projects. Council resolved to look for grant opportunities that would help resource support for community groups.

Following a survey of the community, Council agreed to update the name of the Coonalpyn pool facility to better reflect its service to the district as a whole. The pool will now be named the Coonalpyn and District Soldiers Memorial Swimming Pool, which will be more formally recognised upon completion of current building works at the pool.

Projects Update

The **Tailem Bend public toilets** upgrade is reaching completion, with the new facilities now operational on Railway Terrace.

Demolition of the old amenities has also been completed. Removal of the old building has opened up the area for landscaping, which is the final part of the project yet to be completed. This Landscaping of the area will round out the Tailem Bend public toilets upgrade project.

Financial support for SA businesses and workers has been announced as a result of the State's seven-day lockdown. The Marshall Government is offering:

Support for workers:

\$375 per week for those workers who have lost between eight and less than 20 hours work, or have lost a full day of work.

\$600 per week if a person has lost over 20 hours work.

As the anchor requests the public's help in locating those responsible for this latest raid - a robbery at a gas station -Tessa's sister appears on the screen. Tessa watches in shock as Marian pulls a black mask over her face.

The police believe Marian has joined the IRA, but Tessa knows this is impossible. They were raised to oppose Republicanism, and the violence enacted in its name. They've attended peace vigils together. And besides, Marian is vacationing by the sea. Tessa just spoke to her yesterday.

When the truth of what has happened to Marian reveals itself, Tessa will be forced to choose: between her ideals and her family. Walking an increasingly perilous road, she fears nothing more than endangering the one person she loves more fiercely than her sister: her infant son.

~ Do you remember Mrs Jones? ~

Who remembers Mrs Jones, (now Dianne Jamieson) a teacher who commenced her career at Tailem Bend Primary School in 1976 and left in 1988. Last month I had lunch at the Riverside Hotel with Di, Glenys Cocks, Neville Gotch, and Marcia Bungay (nee Davis) and and it was so good to catch up.

Di came to Tailem Bend as Di Rudiger and in 1977 married Con Jones. They lived in Tailem Bend and had 2 children Todd and Tara. Todd is now a painter and works with his father in Murray Bridge and surrounds and Tara is the deputy Principal at Loxton High School.

Neville, was Principal at Tailem from 1976 to 1996 and was Di's first and only Principal. When she left Tailem Bend School she went on to be a Principal herself at various schools. She retired in December 2020.

Di shares some of her story with us below.

What were your first impressions of Tailem Bend?

Tailem Bend was my first appointment and I was excited to be on the river in what was a fairly big school back then. I was also appointed with my friend Marcia Bungay which made the appointment even more special.

Did Neville's leadership have an impact on your career?

Neville was my first principal and he had lots of beginning teachers on staff. He encouraged us all to continue to do lots of training and development. He enabled us to get involved in many different projects. We were also a Priority Project School. I think because he encouraged us to try new things I have always been open to new opportunities. Neville always made time for the well- being of his staff and knew all the students and parents.

When did you leave Tailem Bend and where did your career take you?

I left in 1988 and was at the Regional Office in Murray Bridge as a Special Ed Advisor. I returned to Tailem in 1989 for term 1 before I won a Principal position at Kybybolite. Following this I was also Principal at Freeling, Mallala, Kapunda and Gawler's Hewett Primary School.

There were more students at Tailem School in the 70's. Can you give us some idea how many classes?

In 1976 there were 4 classes upstairs, 2 down stairs including the Kindy. 3 -4 classes in the portables and 4 or 5 classes in the open unit.

Do you have some special memories to share?

My first year was teaching a R-2 class upstairs. There were 4 classes upstairs. I remember making a 'Faraway Tree' up the stair case. I have so many memories. Competing in the Film Festival in Adelaide and winning trophies with the students. The many camps to the Riverland, to Victor Harbor, to Adelaide and lots of overnight camps to Sherlock.

I taught swimming during the Christmas holidays, cleaned the pool when I was living in the school house and even ran holiday activities in the unit.

While living in the school house I was a first responder to the fire in the early eighties and I put out a small fire by the stone building door and the bus.

What are some special memories of Tailem Bend, the school and the community?

All of the cabarets were such an important part of Tailem. We had a school netball team called the preps.

I learnt how to play tennis at Tailem and went on to play in every town I lived. The Rotary Club was strong as was the Rotaract Club which I was part of and we were involved in many community activities. The school was always such an important part of the community. Each Thursday night the school ran Bingo nights which were a huge fundraiser. We had walkathons, concerts, even Mini Deb Balls. The school fairs were huge and always lots of fun. For me it felt like the school was the centre of the town and holds such wonderful memories.

Any things you would prefer to forget?

The clash between the Railway Union and the Teachers Union was interesting.While the fire was devastating it also led to lots of physical improvements in the school.

Do you have any special plans for your retirement?

To spend lots of time with grandchildren. I am also doing some writing courses and hopefully one day may get a book published.

Best wishes Di, enjoy your life after school and I look forward to reading your book.

When asked how long he is going for he is unsure, " it could be 3 weeks or 3 years, I hope to be away for at least 3 months but there are many things that could put a halt to the journey, in a perfect world I would like to get to Yarrawonga in 18 months & then return but a lot will depend on water levels, if the boat lasts & how my finances are going".

He plans to try & live off grid as much as he can but admits his fishing skills will need to improve drastically hence the abundance of cans of braised steak & onions stored onboard.

At the Council meeting held on 29 June 2021, Coorong District Council endorsed a three month trial to alter the operational hours at the Meningie and Tailem Bend Waste Transfer Stations. The trial will commence on Wednesday, 14 July 2021 and conclude on Sunday, 10 October 2021.

The revised operating hours for the four Waste Transfer Stations are as follows:

Tailem Bend Waste Depot

(Granites Road – 4km north of Tailem Bend post office) Wednesday and Sunday 10:30am – 3:00pm (4.5hrs)

Coonalpyn Waste Depot

(Tauragat Well Road – 3.5km north-east of Coonalpyn post office) Wednesday and Sunday 11:00am – 3:00pm (4hrs)

Tintinara Waste Transfer Station

(Dump Road – 2.5km south-east of Tintinara post office) Wednesday and Sunday 11:00am – 3:00pm (4hrs)

Meningie Waste Transfer Station

(Yarindale Road – 1 km south-east of Meningie post office) Wednesday and Sunday 10:30am – 3:00pm (4.5hrs)

Coorong District Council collected data regarding attendance times at each of its Waste Transfer Stations during March-April 2021. Based on this data, it was identified that a significant proportion of attendances occurred in the first three hours of operation.

As such, it was determined that a reduction in operational hours at Tailem Bend and Meningie would have very little impact on the service provided to Waste Transfer Station users.

Coorong District Council will continue to record attendance numbers during the trial period, and invites constructive feedback from residents in order to formalise a position in October 2021.
