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Mighty Murray Paddle

Glynis Taylor a 60 year old woman, elected member of the Coorong District Council, wife, mother & self-confessed adrenaline junkie has taken to the mighty Murray in a kayak, in an attempt to raise awareness and money for research into prostate cancer.

Glynis has personally experienced the tragedy of the disease, losing her stepfather in 2005 followed closely by her mother to aggressive pancreatic cancer, her uncle to brain cancer and her beloved grandmother to stomach cancer. She states, "Cancer in all of its forms is the true scourge of humanity. To advance research into effective treatments, and one day to hopefully find cures, research bodies need our help with funding. To provide extensive treatment options and care facilities, providers need our help with funding. Help me to help THEM to shape a better future for all of us."

Starting out on the 1st of February 2022 Glynis dropped her kayak into the water at the Hume Dam NSW commencing her solo trip of 2200 klms of snaking river! The trip is expected to last 6-8 weeks. This is a solo paddle to the Murray mouth in Goolwa.

Two weeks in, Glynis reports that with "the river being so high, the banks so damaged and with fallen trees and mud this is an extreme endurance marathon, not a fun run". She is carrying a satellite connected emergency personal locator beacon & her husband is tracking her via other means. "This is not a journey for the untrained or the unfit. At 60 years of age, I have trained for over a year to be able to complete this challenge and yet it is still pushing me to my limits".

By the 21st of February, with 1175kms to go. Glynis reports that "The river isn't getting any easier after nearly 1000+ klms and the landing locations are just as challenging". However, she is still on schedule. Her body is the worst for wear. Her bottom lip is chapped, cracked and bleeding. Her heel has the remnants of a blister that will not heal. Her left wrist is burned and scabbed. Plus, now, an old injury from a motorbike accident, (her unhealed left collarbone) is grinding and sending shooting pain to her left hand. She says "As long as I don't hold the paddle shaft tight, there's no pain (!!!!!)" We're glad you still have a sense of humour Glynis!

On the 22nd, Glynis should make it to Robinvale Riverside where she has a cabin with a real bed and shower waiting for her for one night. "Putting up and taking down the tent, air bed, sleeping bag and packing, unpacking and stowing

everything on the kayak is laborious and repetitive. To have a "night off" is a true treat"

Glynis has been tortured relentlessly by mosquitos and has suffered sunburn through her safety garments. She must keep a keen eye out for floating debris that threaten to damage or capsize her. She has been blogging her adventure and has quite a good following of supporters known and unfamiliar to her, all giving words of support in what can only be described as a "lonely adventure" Glynis counts paddle strokes to occupy a wandering mind. She is determined to finish what she started and to raise the muchneeded funds she set out to raise.

A quote she remembers brings home just how important cancer awareness is.

"Only when those most precious are no more, do you realise how significant their presence in your life was, but by then it's too late to tell them. You only have one life, make everyday count, if not for yourself, for someone else".

From the Above Standard to the Tailem Topics

Sometime in the early nineties the Progress Association and Development Association became one. I had become involved at an age quite younger than the average member after campaigning against a Toxic Waste Dump which had been touted for the area.

One night, in a meeting at the Community Centre, I was asked to put something together on a regular basis to contribute to Meningie's publication, The Lakelander, as I recall by Leonie Hutson. I was pretty naïve to the dangers of opening my mouth and passionately declared, *"why put something in theirs, why not have our own"?* I deserved the swift seconding of my apparent motion and the meeting ended with me bewildered at how I would go about the action I'd just been allocated.

Thankfully a young, energetic and early Apple desktop owner had just answered his calling to Tailem Bend as the Lutheran Pastor and came to my rescue. Pastor Paul Smith and I created the content of the first edition of the **"Above Standard"** in the study of the Manse on Seymour Street. The content of the first edition was what I'd gleaned from shop front notices and the centre of the A5 booklet was an event calendar.

After Paul's assistance laying out the first couple of editions, I went on to lay it out myself on an Amstrad 512k computer with dual 5¼ floppy drives in my spare room. I would literally need to cut (*with scissors*) and paste (*with tape*) ads and articles on the master copy.

The master pages were taken to Murray Bridge, where Bridge Print double side photocopied them at the cheapest price I could find. Each month I had to raise enough money from ads to pay for the photocopying which was 7.5 cents per double sided page. As more pages were needed and circulation increased, I had to sell more ads, which was the newsletter's sole funding source.

To fund the first edition, I literally started at one end of the street (*Smedley's Ripper Nappy*) and ended at the other (*Griffith's Four Square*) trying to explain the vision and selling ads for \$5, a full page for \$20.



I think people just gave me money to go away.

The newsletter was very well received and very quickly contributions *(including ads with cash inside)* flowed into the box which had been placed at Geraldine and Peter Dickson's main street store. Some of the stuff submitted, but never published, would make your hair curl!

For the first few editions I delivered 700 copies myself in the dead of night to letter boxes across Tailem Bend with left over copies going into Dickson's and the Post Office.

Archive photos of the town from the library soon became popular cover art, often the quality suffered terribly in the copying process.

Thankfully committee members chipped in to assist with letter box deliveries. For those first few years in its initial very amateur form I raised the funds, collected content, typed it up, laid it out, took it into Murray Bridge to be copied and distributed it by myself. It was time consuming, and I often copped a lot of abuse from people passionate about their **"paper".**

It was very pleasing when the TBDDA, by then much stronger, took a much more active interest, renaming the publication to it's familiar, Tailem Topics and arranging for its professional printing.

From those humble beginnings the town was now able to have the quality of publication it deserved, and it was time for a new editor.

Education for the area and Migrants

Education was of great importance to mid-19th century South Australians. It had to do with the idea of British education and bringing what was dear to the British society of Queen Victoria's reign.

Even by the 1870's the moral side of education continued to be stressed as one of the most important sections of school life. By May 1856 full plans and specifications were submitted for a schoolhouse to be erected at Wellington. These included all materials for the walls and roofing and also for the interior fittings including a 'water closet'.

The school at Wellington was opened on January 12th 1857, a celebratory tea was held with approximately 60 people in attendance. Mr. H Gardner who was to be the teacher wrote advising that there would be at least 30 children in the classes, he left the school a year later. His position was taken over by Mrs. Edith Shaw, the board however was not happy with her or her Gender, and decided that because of the remoteness of the school, every effort should be made to gain a male teacher. This did not happen as Mrs. Shaw continued to teach there until at least 1861. Annie Carter took over in 1863 remaining until 1870.

The children of Tailem Bend travelled by horse and cart, or walked, to attend the school at Wellington.

After the main south line was completed in the mid 1880's children travelled to Cooke Plains by train. This school closed soon after because of the decline in students.

In 1902 a provincial was started at Tailem Bend on the site of Eudunda Farmers *(Now Foodland)* with 20 students being enrolled. In 1911 a school was opened on the site of the present school consisting of one large room, now part of the library. The room accommodated 84 students. A second room was added in 1921 because the number of students had risen to 140. In 1927 a *"Pavilion Room"* which

was supposed to be temporary was added. The two-story building was included in 1928.

Four portable buildings were erected across the road in approximately 1950 – 51 to cope with the increase of children attending the school. The area where the administration office now stands was a roadway named Wadham St. Two of these buildings were burnt to the ground. The school then went through a comprehensive modernisation which included an open space unit, a dental clinic, swimming pool and an "Early learning childhood centre.

After the arrival of the Sisters of St. Joseph, a second school was opened on January 28th, 1941 by the Catholic Education Office. Classes were originally held in the front room of the convent and also the Church. In 1954 what had been the Railway Hostel was purchased by the Church and became the school. Improvements were made with a tuck shop, toilet block, library, new carpet and furniture were installed, also a tennis court. The building is now the Church Hall and Office, with a section used by St. Vincent De Paul second-hand shop. A change of pace takes us to some history of Tailem Bend

CWA. The Branch was formed in April 1938. The following was written by a senior member Sal Hanns. Sal's first memories of the C.W.A were meetings being held in the Girl Guides Hall at the back of the town hall at Tailem Bend. After that to the Rechabite Hall, which is now the RSL Hall, for meetings. Handicrafts were at the football oval in the Show ground Hall.

Money was raised by catering for wedding receptions and various functions, busy days were held making pasties at homes of Win Skinner's (*Geraldine's Mum*) and Lil Hattam's. Trips to Jaensch's were very enjoyable picking, cutting and drying reeds to make into baskets, picnic lunches were enjoyed too.

In later years a lot of fun was had by all at the Christmas Parties put on by members who provided items, singing and sketches for the elderly ladies of Tailem Bend, each visitor received a gift made by C.W.A. members.

Over the years the local branch supported with donations of money the Friends of the Hospital, the Community Gym and then with the sale of the building the Murray Mallee Transport Scheme and the Tailem Bend Hospital. (*As it was named then*). The branch also donated to the State Baby Parcels. They celebrated the year of Women's Suffrage in the Town Hall in July 1994 and put a display in the United store window in remembrance of 50 years since World War 2 ended in 1945.

Many handicraft days were held with many different crafts being taught.

Several members came home from Group Conferences having gained the most points for the outstanding article of the day, and also won the cup of the day several times. The Tailem Bend Branch closed after 63 years service, from the sale of the club rooms building. The Murray Mallee Transport Scheme received \$45,000, and the Tailem Bend Hospital \$8,000 plus various CWA projects.

Tailem Bend went through a massive change when the first influx of migrants arrived in the late 1940's to 1950's. Many came from worn torn countries Germany, Poland, Latvia, England, Holland, Austria and many other countries. A lot were employed in the SA Railways here in Tailem. The early accommodation the railways supplied for the men were tents, and then a Hostel, after that the railways built cottages.

Many who had left family behind were able to bring them here as cottages were being built for their needs. Their wives brought with them their own culture and European food. They were social people who loved entertaining and set up many activities. They organised a soccer team which was very popular and successful. They also organised Cabaret's which had a set-up of tables and chairs where men and women mixed together. This was a big change for our men population, who were used to socialising at the bar of the local Hotel.

The adjustment soon flourished and cabarets are now a vital entertainment. And sausages and Chops were soon overtaken as our main menu.

Peake Memorial Hall Celebrates 60 Years

On Sunday, 7th. November, 2021, between 2pm and 5pm, approximately 55 people gathered at the Peake Hall to reminisce, rekindle friendships and recall memories of the past 60 years since the hall was built.

Locals were joined by previous residents of Peake who travelled from Goolwa, Victor Harbor, Port Elliot, Adelaide, Port Clinton, Murray Bridge, Lameroo, Karoonda and Tailem Bend. Coorong District Council was also represented by local councillor, Brenton Qualmann, and Mayor, Paul Simmons.

Memorabillia on display created interest for those attending and afternoon tea was enjoyed by all. Mr. Glen Arney, an original member of the Peake Memorial Hall Board of Management, when the hall was opened, cut the 60th. Anniversary cake and addressed those in attendance, recalling all the hard work locals put into raising funds for the new building.

In the mid 1930s, Peake residents realised that the old hall, built in 1910, was inadequate for the growing needs of the district, so first moves were made to build a new hall, encouraged greatly by Mr Shepley, who owned the local shop at that time. Several years of droughts prevented good yields and returns for cropping projects but, at the cost of \$18,400, the new hall was fully paid for on opening day, on 13th. November, 1961.

Since its' opening the hall has been used for many activities including dances, strawberry fetes, cabarets, wedding receptions, anniversaries, luncheons, birthdays, reunions, meetings, church services, netball and football functions and funerals.

Coorong community groups can now apply for up to \$5,000 in funding to help deliver projects and events through the latest round of Coorong District Council's Community Grants program.

Murray River Spawn Success

Fish monitoring undertaken throughout November and December has shown a major breeding response from native fish in the River Murray with the largest numbers of golden perch (callop) larvae recorded in the last eight years.

The Department for Environment and Water's (*DEW*) Manager Environmental Water, Tony Herbert said recent high flows in the system as well as the delivery of water for the environment has benefited native fish breeding.

"Improved flows in the system have likely contributed to the breeding success, creating conditions conducive to the spawning of callop and silver perch, and the survival of their eggs and larvae," Tony said.

"Widespread rain in the catchment has resulted in good spring flows to South Australia this year and these have been enhanced by adding environmental water to the natural events, boosting the outcomes for native fish."

Associate Professor Qifeng Ye, Inland Waters Principal Scientist with the Department of Primary Industries and Regions' (*PIRSA*) South Australian Research and Development Institute (*SARDI*), said species like callop and silver perch are cued to spawn by elevated spring flows and then eggs and larvae drift downstream with the flow.

"For long-lived fish like callop, these breeding events are really important as they do not occur every year," Dr Ye said.

"They really thrive in these higher flow conditions so these results are a great example of why flows at the right time of year are so important to support spawning and survival of a new generation of fish."



"The monitoring is undertaken by scientists from SARDI inland waters research team, who found increased numbers of eggs and larvae across multiple sites in the lower River Murray."

"Future monitoring will confirm whether larvae survive and recruit into the lower Murray population."

Monitoring in the South Australian Murray is collaboratively supported by DEW, PIRSA, the Commonwealth Environmental Water Office *(CEWH)* and the Murray-Darling Basin Authority.

Water for the environment has been delivered to the river courtesy of CEWH and The Living Murray Program.

Breeding Success for Coorong Black Swans

In further evidence of improved conditions in the Lower Lakes and Coorong, researchers and the community have observed a significant increase in the local black swan population thanks largely to increased River Murray flows.

Locals have reported hundreds of cygnets in the area during an extended breeding season from winter through to summer.

Program Leader Coorong, Lower Lakes and Murray Mouth with the Department for Environment and Water, Adrienne Rumbelow explained that over the last eight months, large volumes of freshwater from the River Murray, supplemented with water for the environment, has helped to raise water levels in both the Lower Lakes and Coorong.

"Black swans feed primarily on water plants in the Lower Lakes and Coorong and the raised water levels have led to increased growth of water plants such as Ruppia tuberosa and other similar aquatic species," Adrienne said.

"In turn, this has increased the available plant food for waterbirds like black swans – contributing to the larger numbers of cygnets in the area."

Sally Grundy from Mundoo Island Station said she'd witnessed an incredible resurgence of black swan numbers in the Coorong estuary over summer.

"I've not witnessed these numbers of swans in years and it's been truly amazing to see the number of cygnets hatched throughout the season," Sally said.

"I saw our first cygnets in August last year and more are still hatching now. Some of the clutches have as many as seven cygnets and the majority have survived and now developing their adult plumage."

"A seven-month breeding season for swans in the Coorong is extraordinary and super exciting and it's a good indication that the freshwater flows are having a beneficial impact on the environment."

Adrienne said the local Ngarrindjeri people support actions to facilitate waterbird breeding.



Rick Hartman, Yarluwar Ruwe Project Coordinator from the Ngarrindjeri Aboriginal Corporation said the increased numbers of Kungari *(black swan)* cygnets in the Lower Lakes and Coorong is very pleasing to see.

"Water birds such as the Kungari are important to Ngarrindjeri, not only because they are a Ngartji (totemic species) but the Kungari eggs are a food source for people and are a significant part of Ngarrindjeri culture," Rick said.

"It shows how Ruwe (Country) can respond with some additional water. This is a place of creation, where the fresh and saltwater mix and our Ngartjis need these waters to heal to enable their breeding."

Complementing local resident observations, researchers from The University of Adelaide have recently completed the annual summer waterbird census, with results due later in the year.

Monitoring associated with this project was delivered by The Living Murray, a joint initiative funded by the New South Wales, Victorian, South Australian and Commonwealth Governments, coordinated by the Murray–Darling Basin Authority.

Making it Easier to Work in SA and Victoria

Tradies and licensed professionals will find it easier than ever to work in South Australia and Victoria.

The Morrison Government, with the South Australian and Victorian governments, removed the need for licensed workers to apply and pay for an additional licence to work in South Australia or Victoria.

Member for Barker Tony Pasin said this is part of the Government's Automatic Mutual Recognition Scheme which is cutting red tape businesses and licensed workers including tradies, real estate agents, teachers and lawyers.

"We're saving individuals and businesses time, money and paperwork, so workers can work where the work is," Mr Pasin said.

"By removing the need for tradies to get another licence when they move across the South Australian and Victorian border, we're making it easier and cheaper for them to do work on both sides of the border." "As business and consumer demands change, the Scheme also makes it easier and quicker for businesses to hire and mobilise employees."

South Australia and Victoria are the first states to remove temporary occupational exemptions from 1 February 2022 on certain trade licences made under the Scheme.

The Scheme is currently in place in New South Wales, Victoria, South Australia, Tasmania, the Australian Capital Territory and the Northern Territory, with Western Australia working to join from 1 July 2022.

The Scheme is anticipated to add over \$2.4 billion to the Australian economy over the next 10 years, and benefit more than 168,000 people each year.

Rare Desert Mallee Blooms

A very interesting small mallee is Giles' Mallee, Eucalyptus rameliana, collected by explorer Giles in 1876 and thought to be extinct until collected in 1991 by Dean Nicolle.

Dean is owner of Currency Creek Arboretum where he has growing over 800 species of Eucalyptus. He has open days twice a year for the people interested in growing Eucalypts.

Coming from the sand dunes of the Little Sandy Desert in Western Australia plants of this 1 to 2 metre high, multistemmed mallee are enjoying the sandy soils of Pangarinda Botanic Garden.

Colourful single or groups of up to three fruits capped with reddish non ribbed caps which are pushed off by 3 to 4 cm showy yellow flowers.

Also flowering is the closely related mallee Eucalyptus pachyphylla, Red Budded Mallee. Differs in having ribbed buds. There is a red flowering form at Pangarinda Botanic Garden as well as yellow.

From the Chamber

Councillors met on Tuesday, 15 February 2022 to consider several key financial reports and documents.

The Long Term Financial Plan 2021-2031 was adopted by Council - the plan presents a financial analysis of all strategic goals set and addresses the operating and capital needs of the district over the next 10 years.

A budget review of the first quarter for 2021/22 was endorsed, and Councillors were provided with a report on the progress made against actions and key outcomes within the 2021/22 Annual Business Plan.

Given the increase in land sales at Wellington East, Council has agreed to proceed with the sale of four Council-owned allotments which are located on Riley Road, Kelsey Road and Trilby Road.

Council also considered two reports in relation to the Meningie Lions Jubilee Park. The exercise equipment in the park has reached the end of its useful life and requires renewal; Council agreed to consult with the community to determine a replacement. Council also resolved to consult with key community groups regarding the replacement of barbecue shelters in the park, which have also been identified for renewal.

Community Grants Program -Round 2 Now Open

Community groups can now apply for up to \$5,000 in funding to help deliver projects and events through round two of the 2021/22 community grants program.

Groups involved in local sport and recreation, cultural, community development, and social and welfare activities may be eligible to apply for grants between \$1,000 and \$5,000 in one of three categories; Small Community Grants, Community Event Grants, and Community Project Grants.

Michael Connelly - THE DARK HOURS

A South Florida Sun-Sentinel Best Book of the Year "A masterpiece"—LAPD detective Renée Ballard must join forces with Harry Bosch to find justice in a city scarred by fear and social unrest after a methodical killer strikes on New Year's Eve. There's chaos in Hollywood at the end of the New Year's Eve countdown.



Working her graveyard shift, LAPD detective Renée Ballard waits out the traditional rain of lead as hundreds of revelers shoot their guns into the air. Only minutes after midnight, Ballard is called to a scene where a hardworking auto shop owner has been fatally hit by a bullet in the middle of a crowded street party. Ballard quickly concludes that the deadly bullet could not have fallen from the sky and that it is linked to another unsolved murder—a case at one time worked by Detective Harry Bosch. At the same time, Ballard hunts a fiendish pair of serial rapists, the Midnight Men, who have been terrorizing women and leaving no trace.

Determined to solve both cases, Ballard feels like she is constantly running uphill in a police department indelibly changed by the pandemic and recent social unrest. It is a department so hampered by inertia and low morale that Ballard must go outside to the one detective she can count on: Harry Bosch. The five fatal causes of road trauma on South Australian roads

Drink and drug driving

Don't drink and drug drive. Make sure you plan ahead and consider:

- nominating a designated driver
- organising someone to transport you to and from the venue
- catching public transport
- catching a taxi or consider ride sharing staying the night.

Speeding

You should always:

- monitor your speed and stay within the speed limit
- adjust the speed to suit weather, traffic and road conditions
 be alert for pedestrians, especially children who may behave unpredictably
- be aware of other road users such as cyclists, whose safety on the road may be affected by drivers passing or overtaking them at high speed

 increase the distance between the vehicle in front when travelling at high speeds
 drive at appende that are pair for your own ability.

• drive at speeds that are safe for your own ability.

Distraction

Driving is a complex task that requires a coordination of a wide range of skills. Mobile phones and other personal electronic devices are major sources of distraction. Research indicates that the use of a hands-free kit only reduces the level of physical and visual distraction but cognitive distraction remains high. You are four times more likely to be involved in a crash whilst using a mobile phone, even if it's hands-free.

Seatbelts

A seatbelt is worn correctly if:

- the sash part of the seatbelt sits flat on the shoulder without touching the face or neck
- the lap part of the seatbelt crosses low over the hips, not the abdomen
- the seatbelt is not twisted.

LETTER TO EDITOR

Dear Editor,

Wednesday 16 February 2022 marks the 80th anniversary of the Bangka Island Massacre.

On the morning of February 16, 1942, 22 Australian nurses, survivors of the sunken merchant ship SS Vyner Brooke, were marched into the surf by Japanese soldiers off Bangka Island, east of Sumatra. The massacre represented one of the darkest chapters of World War II.

Sister Vivian Bullwinkel born in Kapunda, was the sole survivor of the massacre. Shot Sister Bullwinkel fained death lying in the shallow blood stained water until the Japanese troops had left. Following her recapture Bullwinkel spent three and a half years as a prisoner of war before returning home to Australia at the wars conclusion.

After leaving the Army in 1947, Sister Bullwinkel continued in a number of senior nursing roles and was awarded many honours, including the Florence Nightingale Medal. She was also made a Member of the Order of Australia (AM) and a Member of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire (MBE).

On this 80th anniversary of the Bangka Island Massacre, I wish to remember all the women of the Australian Army Nursing Service – in particular Sister Bullwinkel and her courageous colleagues murdered at Bangka. **We remember their devotion to their patients and to their country.**
