This year marked the return of Tailem Bend's ANZAC Day Comemmorative Dawn Service. From an RSL Committee point of view we had missed this event as the regulations had made it almost impossible to hold. To see so many come out to comemmorate this event was a delight and we want to thank everyone for coming out to be apart of this ANZAC day today.

The overarching theme this year was one of freedom. The men and women who served in the first world war went to protect family and to support their mates. They went with the hope that we the later generations of Australians would hopefully not have to. Thrust into the crucible of Gallipoli the values of mateship, loyalty, selflessness and courage were forged into our national identity.

Representing Coorong Council, Councillor Glynis Taylor shared with us a letter written from the perspective of Private Robert Steele of the Auckland Machine Gun Section. His letter walked us through the events of that first ANZAC

day. He shared the randomness of the people around him and also his struggle after himself being wounded.

Is it simply too easy to suggest that a man or woman who fought on and survived the Western Front in World War One was "Lucky". The word appears to offer a quick, casual, distinction between those who were killed or seriously wounded, & those who came home apparently whole.

How can "Lucky" begin truly to explain an individual's escape from Shell splinters that were next to, or ripped past their body? How can "Luck" justly explain the snipers bullets that cracked past their head, time & time again, never finding their mark, belying all the apparent odds?

In the end only "Luck" amply explains the sheer randomness & utter injustice of war that could leave a person standing after 4 years of fighting, & yet take another who had only just arrived in the trenches.

They were, and are all heroes. Their Sacrifices are our Freedom to live in Peace. It is indeed us who are Lucky.

The Changing Face of Tailem Bend #118

This month we go way back in time and look at the "Good old Days" and appreciate just how the early Pioneers moulded their lives while settling land and opening business for generations ahead of them.

Tailem Growth - May 1904

From the Chronicle, the town of Tailem Bend is going ahead, four Coaches are running from Tailem Bend to Wellington and Meningie, instead of two as previously. These conveyances bring cream, fish, ducks and rabbits to be sent on to the Adelaide and Melbourne markets.

Once a week the Mail contractor carries nine mail bags to Pinnaroo and intervening places for the various surveyors who are pushing on with the survey of the railway line as fast as possible, and half a dozen teams are carting out stuff they require. An engine and boring plant are also on the way.


The four farmers who have stuck to their holding, waiting for the line to be passed, are now putting in the crops and doing all they can in a hope of disposing of it when the new settlers arrive.

Tailem Bend has a good hotel, with every convenience and accommodation, the host being Mr. G R Hoed. The following year will see a large amount of wheat trucked by the farmers.

Chronicle - June 1909

For the last two years Tailem Bend has gone steadily forward, and progress still continues. From three railway cottages, the same number of houses and a hotel, the buildings now total thirty while others are in course of erection. This includes a large shop, and the influx of farmers since the construction of dwellings. Also a branch of the Commercial Bank has been established. This season about 7,000 acres will be under crop, and towards this quantity Mr. C. Fuller will contribute 1,500 acres.

Notwithstanding the increased railway traffic to and from Tailem Bend for three years the station arrangements remained practically unaltered. At the time the waiting shed was sheltered on one side of the main line and the

platform on the other, and should the train be a long one passengers must go to either to gain the platform, often in a heavy shower of rain. There was no shelter on either platform, and goods, unless a tarpaulin was available were subject to all kinds of weather.

The Herald - June 1910

The Tailem Bend correspondent of the "Advertiser" writes as follows: Not many towns in this state have made such progress recently as Tailem Bend. The continued and rapid growth of the town has exceeded all expectations. The success of Pinnaroo and the immense amount of wheat, superphosphate and implements being railed through Tailem Bend has made this a very busy railway station, and with the construction of the Loxton railway line now being surveyed will make it the busiest and most important railway town south of Adelaide.

Football News - June 1920

At Tailem Bend VS Cooke Plains

Owing to the South East goods train running late the Cooke Plains team did not arrive until 4pm resulting in the game being limited to four 10 minute quarters, which was a very unsatisfactory time to play an association match in. Nevertheless the Cooke Plains team made good use of the short time and with the advantage of weight won very easily. 3 goals 4 behinds to Tailem one point.

Tailem Bend V Coomandook

On a Saturday morning the Tailem team with a good sprinkling of followers of supporters, that included a number of Ladies, journeyed to Coomandook by goods train. The players were entertained at tea, and an enjoyable time was spent at the dance given by the Coomandook Club.

The match was well contested and not nearly as one sided as the scores showed. Tailem 9 goals 17 behinds to 2 goals 5 behinds. Mr. Patterson gave every satisfaction as central umpire. The team and supporters arrived home at Tailem Bend at the early hour of 2 a.m.

Adelaide Observer - 1892

Warning to Graziers


It was stated that graziers and others will suffer an injustice if leases are resumed and that stock travelling will have to go without food and water for a distance between thirty and forty miles during the journey through certain blocks. Some blocks are enclosed with station gates that pass through Bowmans then reaching a travelling stock reserve opposite McFarlane's, which extends right to Tailem Bend over 14 miles in length. Boundary riders always escort the travelling stock as hurriedly as they can as very few would know if they had the right to graze thinking it could be private property bounding the road.

There was no way of watering and grazing stock until they passed through these blocks, so it would be of greater benefit to the public and country until block settlement was finalised.

Chronicle - November 1914

The Tailem Bend Rowing Club held its official opening and a paddle steamer SS "Milang" from Murray Bridge brought a large number of visitors that included Bandsmen and oarsmen. The President Doctor Cherry spoke of the progress made by the club during the 18 months of its existence. He pointed out that the boatshed and fittings, the landing platform and the two four—oared boats were all paid for and the club was free from debt.

He then called on Mrs Cherry to christen the racing boats. In her speech she said she was pleased to know that this

beautiful portion of the river was to be regularly used by oarsmen. Amidst cheers Mrs. Cherry christened the boat Tailem Bend. From the top of a cliff spectators would be able to see the whole of a three mile race.





Pangarinda Botanic Gardens

With a country recording record rainfall and flooding, Pangarinda Botanic Gardens has only recorded 32ml of rain in the last five months.

We are once again seeing a few of our mature plants dying from the dry. Flowering has been very poor, our four bushes of Verticordia grandis were the exception, with masses of deep red brushes, these too were to turn brown by the only really hot day we had.

With little flowering to be seen there is always the leaf variation and interesting seed capsules to catch visitors attention.

Hakea pandanicarpa ssp. pandanicarpa a large, bushy shrub to 3m. Small, creamy white highly perfumed flowers appear in spring. The very large 7cm seed capsules, which are retained on this shrub becoming rough with age and covering with corky protuberances.

While Hakea pandanicarpa ssp crassifolia is a thick-leaved shrub of similar size, has slightly rough fruit capsules of same size, with-out corky protuberances.

Mature fruits of both subspecies are highly decorative and popular in dried arrangements.

Both subspecies are found in Eyre district of WA and very adaptable in cultivation.

TB & District Combined Sporting and Recreational Hub

In 2017 the Tailem Bend and District Combined Sporting and Recreational Hub (TB HUB) committee finalised the 2017-2021 strategic plan which was developed with the assistance of key stakeholders in accordance with the federal and state government strategic goals, and as per the community vision plan adopted by council on 23 February 2021.

This project meets all five of the strategic outcomes: economy, infrastructure, community, environment, and leadership.

The Tailem Bend Hub Committee has been working with local groups to develop a masterplan which details a shared long-term vision to turn Jaensch Park into a dedicated multi-discipline sporting precinct.

The Regional Hub will provide a range of sport facilities to address identified gaps in current usage and community growth. The draft conceptual plan outlines how the site could accommodate a variety of sports including Football, Cricket, Netball, Tennis and Bowls. It also allows for possible future synergies such as the Community Service Centre re-locating to Jaensch Park.

The project will make a significant contribution to the health, economic viability, and wellbeing of the local and regional community.

The Regional Hub design balances the needs of the specific sporting groups with community values and expectations. The project will provide an important community focal point whilst creating a lasting legacy for Tailem Bend and neighbouring towns in the Murraylands.

A new Football Change Room facility is part of the strategic plan. The football environment is changing, and we all have a responsibility to reflect these changes and provide facilities that best caters for diversity and growth in our game. Players and volunteers have called for better facilities of the right quality to play and work.

The existing change room facilities, umpire rooms and general amenities are not unisex compliant to current day standards. Women's football has flourished across Australia, but in many football communities, there is one big issue — a lack of facilities. Providing dedicated change rooms will encourage more women and girls to get involved in local football, ensuring our Club is supported and the Club can continue to deliver positive physical and mental health benefits to the community. Increasing women's representation in sports is vital to healthy, connected communities, and we must all work towards a future where inclusivity in sport is an everyday occurrence.

Consequently, there is a proposal to develop a new standalone facility that will equally support players

(female/male), volunteers, trainers and umpires who use the facilities weekly for both training and competition.

A new facility will ensure our community has adequate space where people can actively and safely engage in sport and recreation, which can provide improved social, health, educational and cultural outcomes for all.

The current building (built in 1934) has served the Club well, and I am sure everyone that has played and volunteered for the mighty Eagles have fond memories and a story to tell, but it is time for a new facility.

The Tailem Bend Hub committee is working closely with all stake holders to secure the necessary funding to complete this project. We are hopeful that we will secure the required funding, by submitting a strong application and will continue to pursue.

This is a substantial development for the Club and accordingly we are asking for members' support to embrace the vision and collectively advocate around the community for this project.

Each of us have names. Our surname tells us the family to which we belong. Our first name identifies us as individuals within that family. Even identical twins have their own first name, although they share so much more.

With our name we are no longer a 'face in a crowd' but an individual who can be recognised, given a personality and welcomed as a friend.

We answer when we hear our name as we 'own it'. When teachers called my younger sister by my name, she would not answer. She was not me.

The angel Gabriel told Mary the name she was to give to her son. "... and you are to give him the name Jesus". (Luke chapter 1 v 31)

Christians are baptised in the name of Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and join God's family. We are individuals in God's family, just as we are in our earthly family.

Jesus called himself 'the Good Shepherd' and '.. he calls his own sheep by name and leads them out, and his sheep follow him because they know his voice'. (John 10 v 3)

Just as Amy knew the voice of the girls and came to meet them, so Christians know the voice of Jesus and come to him.

The girls fed and cared for Amy. Jesus feeds and cares for us.

We know we can call on the name of Jesus and he will help us and whenever two or more are gathered together in Jesus' name he will be with them. (Matt 18 v 20)

May your name be written in heaven and you answer the call of Jesus and be blessed by him.

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

Tailem Bend Historians



Over the last 2 months the Tailem Bend Historians have been meeting in different locations in Tailem Bend. We couldn't meet in our normal meeting place due to COVID restrictions, so we went out into the community and

held our meetings at Historical places around the town.

In March we went to the Rotunda where the Corellas and the trains kept the noise level on a high. We learnt The Rotunda was also called the bandstand in the early days. Archie Coles built this wonderful Rotunda in 1933. Mr Rogers, the Bandmaster was known in the town as Uncle Jack. Jack was a dedicated bandmaster in Tailem Bend. He died in tragic circumstances at the opening of the Rotunda on New Years Eve 1933. The Bandsmen dedicated the Rotunda to his memory.







April saw us going to the Old Punt Landing by the River. This too was a noisy place with the Corellas and the house boats beeping their horn to pass the Ferry. We shared some history of this area. It is now known as the ferry.

In 1922 the Tailem Bend residents lobbied with a petition for a punt to cross the river. The Punt was working by 1924 where Jack & Allen Bryan took 56 head of stock across the river using the punt. Mr Temby was the Ferryman from 1925. There was a charge/toll to cross the river on the punt up to 1960.


BOOK REVIEW



Letters From the Trenches - Non-Fiction Book

A history of World War I
- told through the letters
exchanged by ordinary
soldiers and their families.

Letters from the Trenches reveals how people really thought and felt during the Great War, and covers all social classes and groups from officers to conscripts to women at home to conscientious ob-



jectors. Voices within the book include Sgt. John Adams, 9th Royal Irish Fusiliers, who wrote in May 1917: "For the day we get our letter from home is a red letter day in the history of the soldier out here. It is the only way we can hear what is going on. The slender thread between us and the homeland." Pvt. Stanley Goodhead, who served with one of the Manchester Pals battalion, wrote home in 1916: "I came out of the trenches last night after being in four days. You have no idea what four days in the trenches means . . . The whole time I was in I had only about two hours sleep and that was in snatches on the firing step. What dugouts there are, are flooded with mud and water up to the knees and the rats hold swimming galas in them

We are literally caked with brown mud and it is in all our food, tea etc."

Jacqueline Wadsworth skillfully uses these letters to tell the human story of the First World War: what mattered to Britain's servicemen and their feelings about the war; how the conflict changed people; and how life continued on the home front.

MONARTO ZOO OFFICIALLY OPENED

The new Visitor Centre at Monarto Zoo has been officially opened today, with Member for Barker Tony Pasin MP unveiling a plaque to mark the occasion.

The \$16.8 million project has delivered a new Visitors Centre that provides an entry to one of the largest safari parks in the world. The new facility includes a retail shop, café, seminar room, meeting facilities, office space, children's play area, an exhibition facility, level 1 lookout, new toilet facilities, a new entrance road and a 900 space carpark.

Mr Pasin said the iconic Monarto Safari Park has become an absolute must visit destination when visiting South Australia. "The new visitors centre will create significant local job growth, offer improved community facilities and attract visitors to the area, boosting tourism and the local economy with an estimated 55,000 people making use of this facility each year," Mr Pasin said.

"The completion of this exciting project marks the beginning of a new era for the Monarto Safari Park. This state-of-the-art visitor facility has transformed the park into a world class tourism experience bringing many thousands of first time visitors including inter-national tourists. "I argued strongly for the Morrison Government to invest \$11.25 million into the Monarto Safari Park redevelopment because I understood the positive flow on benefits for communities across the wider Murraylands. "It's very exciting to see this project come to fruition."

The Visitor Centre project received \$11.25 million from the Morrison Government and \$4.55 million from the South Australian Government towards a total \$16.8m cost of building the new entry and Visitor Centre. The Rural City of Murray Bridge also contributed to the project through the construction of a new slip lane entry from Monarto Road. The completion of the new Visitor Centre is the first of three phases that will see Monarto become the largest safari experience outside of Africa.

Only the Morrison Government will continue to deliver a better future for Barker, and this is part of our plan to build a strong economy and a stronger future.

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
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
