In my days they were called *The Pictures* or *The Flicks* and were held in the Town Hall on a Saturday night and some times on a Wednesday. The projectionists were Les Lynch and Ray Bartlett, Mr. H.H Bromley was the owner.

Cinema Opens in Tailem Bend Sept. 17th 2006 -10 East Tce Tailem Bend.

Members and friends of the Motion Piture Industry Club travelled to Tailem Bend to share a barbecue and officially open the Cloudland Cinema. Following the barbecue the celebration started with the opening of the entrance by club president Marlene Gregory. In her brief address Marlene mentioned that it was quite a change to be involved with an opening rather than a closing.

Marlene was employed for numerous years in various city cinemas including the Sturt and Regent cinemas, she was then involved in their closures.

When the group was seated a raffle was drawn for a series of small prizes. Guest of honour Allan Rainer was elected to draw the raffle and present the prizes.

Mr Rainer was the first employer of the Cloudland Cinema's owner Barry White at the Melba Theatre in Dulwich. This marked the start to Barry's projectionist career 53 years ago.

The construction of the Cloudland, built soley by Barry, marks the end to his cinema ambitions.

Raffle Results

The chewing gum prize was awarded when a search of seats delivered one piece of blue tack, which was

used to represent old gum which is usually used left on chairs. A packet of Maltersers was the prize, being the nearest subsistute for Jaffas as used by patrons to roll down the aisles in ealier times.

Ribbon Cut amid nostalgia.

Wallis Theatres manager Bob Parr then addressed the audience and finally cut the ribbon to the screen. The show started in a black and white Popeye cartoon, then a couple of old trailers of early Cinema Scope programs preceding a pre-release movie.

Following afternoon tea the crowd gradually headed off for the return trip to Adelaide, thanking the club committee and stating that they would like to repeat the adventure in the future.

Cinema construction

The construction of the cinema was undertaken as a 5 year retirement project of the owner Barry White. It was eventually opened within 5 years and 3 months of its commencement. Its operation is a non commercial site. Regular monthly screenings of nostalgic films were presented to the ommunity who attended bringing a plate of supper to share.

In the addition to the Cloud Cinema at Tailem Bend, may I sincerely recognise our loss of Bob Parr OAM March 2022. Being the person he was, although not

well he fronted up for the final night of the Gepps Cross Drive In. I wrote to Bob in early March thanking him for all his support with the Cloudland at Tailem as well as his encouragement to keep showing on Kangaroo Island, with the SA Police Youth Groups. I also had to get his help for licences to book Movies for the annual Willalooka Open Air Cinema. Huge crowds flocked into these venues. *Sincere Thanks Bob.*

Retirement Project.

The Cloudland Cinema was a retirement project of the writer, who invested time and money to build a cinema for the Tailem Bend Community. The monthly screenings were always well attended but got stopped with COVID, and has been closed since. The final screening "Ride like a girl' was packed to capacity with perhaps only two seats remaining.

There is a lot more to be told about Tailem Cinema, including two volunteer ladies who at one stage kept the show going after my two bouts of surgery to my right knee and a hip replacement. I was not able to climb the stairs to the projection room.

These two ladies continued on having successfully been trained by a Wallis Staff Technician, a thank you to these ladies on behalf of our community. Barry White.

Well done Barry, you certainly kept a lot of people happilly watching their favourite old time classic movies, all for just a plate of supper. It surely was an era of outstanding actors, no violence, the odd carress or two and in those days plenty of smoke filled rooms. Bad Language Definetly Barred.

The Mighty Murray Paddle = COMPLETED

2220 kilometres of the River Murray from the Hume Dam weir in NSW / VIC, to Sugars Beach on Hindmarsh Island SA. I put the kayak in to the river on the 1st February, and pulled it clear of the water up onto Sugars Beach on Saturday 26th March. In total I paddled for 47 days, with a total trip time of 54 days, completed in one continuous unsupported journey.

What drove my journey?

Actually, it was not the idea of paddling the length of the Murray which drove the journey, it was finding something adventurous and extraordinary which would attract enough attention and interest, to raise money for the Prostate Cancer (Research) Foundation of Australia. I also had a personal reason, which was to highlight to everyone, prostate cancer is almost the silent killer. Too often it is only discovered late and in some cases too late to receive effective treatment. I lost my Dad in 2005 to aggressive stage 4 prostate cancer just over a year from initial diagnosis with no previous ill health or issues. So when my cousin Jamie was diagnosed with it 18 months ago, I wanted to get people especially men asking the question, "when is too early to start asking to be tested?" I knew my kayaking trip could never raise enough money to have any real affect in such a short period of time, but if not me who, and if not now when? In other words, we all need to actively participate in any way we can to not only raise awareness, but to raise money for much needed and all too often under-funded research, which moves all of us closer to cures for cancer.

My journey was a personal one.

I wanted it to reflect in some way the journey taken by cancer sufferers such as literally not knowing what is round the next corner. Expecting the unexpected, yet still being surprised by events. Even with people supporting from afar or behind the scenes, it's a solo journey only the participant experiences, and it's often difficult to explain the feelings and emotions we dwell on when we find ourselves in unusual situations, out of our comfort zone, and left to spend hours dealing with our own thoughts.

I found the trip raised many emotions. Uplifted by the beauty and serenity of my surroundings. In awe of the stunning landscapes, the red cliffs, the incredible and diverse wildlife. Yet saddened at the devastation caused by recent flooding, with so many trees hanging in mid air, holding on to the banks with nothing more than their web of roots. Or the hundreds and hundreds of trees which had lost their grip as the banks have been eroded or washed out by fast flowing waters, or fast travelling ski or wake boats.

For the first three weeks I spent so many hours concentrating on missing or avoiding fallen trees which straddle

the river. These *"strainers"* channel the water through their part submerged branches, creating mini fast flowing rapids, which are a dangerous entanglement and capsize hazard to unsuspecting unpowered craft.

The locks were a joy to pass through. Thankfully none were closed for maintenance, so I was able in all but one instance, to pass through them as a single craft.

Nearly every lock keeper was eager to know more of my journey, and would happily pass on hints and tips for where to camp, and all wished me safe onward passage. It was clear as I dropped down through the river and lock system the flows at the bottom, were nowhere near the speed of the flows at the top. By the time I passed through lock 1 at Blanchetown the flows had all but stopped. Where I had motored along at between 7 and 10 kilometres per hour at the high reaches, I was down to between 3 and 5 kilometres per hour approaching Murray Bridge. Higher up I was able to paddle 40 kilometres in an athletic 5-6 hours, but below lock 1 this turned to extreme hard work taking 9-10 hours to cover 40 kilometres.

Add to the lack of flow a change in weather which brought with it days with high winds and choppy waters, I have to admit the final 10 days were some of the most challenging of my adventurous life. In the end, my will power and sheer determination to achieve what I'd set out to achieve, kept driving me forward morning after morning. Arriving at Wellington on my husbands birthday I found I'd been totally *"set-up"* with a surprise *"welcome home"* dinner with 40+ close family and friends invading The Welly pub. I had to sit out the next three days due to extreme headwinds funnelling up the Goolwa channel.

The Mighty Murray Paddle = COMPLETED

Then on Saturday 26th March, I put the kayak in at Clayton Bay to paddle past Goolwa, through the Goolwa barrage and lock and out in to the salty and tidal waters below, to land on Sugars Beach that afternoon, and complete the journey.

I am now very proud entrant number #428 (unpowered) in the Inland Rivers National Marathon Register (which is on display at Goolwa National Trust History Centre), the certificate for which was presented to me at Goolwa wharf by Kathy Sutton (Registrar), and founder and team leader Frank Tuckwell.

I can also state my journey has attracted over \$17,000 in donations to the Prostate Cancer Foundation (PCFA). The page is still open for donations at: https://fundraise.pcfa.org.au/fundraisers/glynistaylor/massive-murray-paddle-2021 and any contributions are tax deductible and go direct to the foundation.

I'm now looking for ideas for my next adventure in 2024, when I will yet again be raising funds for the PCFA - so if you have any ideas feel free to text/message me your ideas on **0422 774 019.**

Paddle Steamer by Elizabeth Nicholls

She was the finest of the fleet, that Paddle Steamer Roma, A composite boat of seventy-nine feet, built on the banks of Moama. Launched in 1884, she joined the Diamond Line, To ply the River Murray, with loads of wool most fine.

On the 26th of December, in 1886, With 74 bales from Talawanta and Tingapee the mix, She steamed ahead towards the lakes in the summer evening light, The first mate steady at the wheel, with Tailem Bend in sight.

"FIRE HERE, BUCKETS QUICK" the startled cry went out, The whistle blew to raise the crew, their danger was no doubt, Captain Randell took the wheel as flames licked 'round the funnel, Spreading to the cabins, then along the starboard gunnel.

Three minutes passed, the fight was lost, they turned her for the bank, The orders barked, **"all hands-on deck, regardless of your rank,** It's time to jump ashore my lads, no time to be a hero, Leave the ship's certificates, your chance to rescue, zero."

She burnt down to the water line, all the wool burnt too, The news reporter of the day said there was nothing they could do. The enquiry found no negligence from the crew or the captain, So sadly, she was written off, her future most uncertain.

Marked on all the maps today, as sunk at **Tailem Bend**, But did you know it's not the case, her life was not to end, Her rotting hulk was sold by auction, repurchased by her owner, Raised and slung between two barges and towed across to Goolwa.

There on Graham's Slip she sat, and waited for her builder, Intentions were to re-create, another noble steamer, But Graham's Slip then closed to custom, the builder in retirement, Roma lay a wretched site, black metal burnt and bent.

It's said that Captain Johnson then, resolved to break her up, And pull her apart piece by piece, the final shameful wash-up, But he retained some souvenirs, to remind him of her charisma, Decorating his garden front, with relics from the Roma.

MMCPN UPDATE

As previously reported, TBCC recently conducted a transport fee review, due to the increasing rise in fuel prices, insurance and general running costs. From 1st July 2022, there will be a 10% increase in fees (the first price increase since taking on the CPN almost four years ago). This applies only to our volunteer driven Community Passenger Network cars. Medical bus prices will remain the same.

CPN services are subsidised by Federal State Government and contracts. The proposed new Support at Home package of reforms (which will replace the current Commonwealth Home Support Program - CHSP), as identified by the Department of Health in January 2022, highlight significant changes for providers and consumers. Currently, Community Transport is block funded by CHSP to deliver services to as many people as possible. The new Support at Home





Winter Recipe

CHEESEY CAULIFLOWER BAKE

INGREDIENTS

- 1.5 kg of cauliflower with leaves attached.
- 2 tbs butter
- 2 tbs olive oil

CHEESE SAUCE

- 4 cups (1L) full cream milk
- 120 g butter
- 80 g plain flour
- 400 g grated mature cheese.
- Salt and freshly ground pepper, to taste.

METHOD

- 1. Strip the leaves and remove the stems from the cauliflower and chop both into 2 cm pieces. Bring a large saucepan of salted water to the boil.
- 2. Meanwhile, melt butter and oil in a frypan over medium heat. Add the chopped leaves and stems along with a pinch of salt, then increase the heat slightly and cook for 15 minutes or until tender.

- 3. When the water comes to the boil. add the cauliflower florets to the saucepan and simmer for 2 minutes. Drain, set aside. The leaves and stems should be finished sautéing now, but taste and cook for a little longer if they are still tough.
- 4. Set aside.
- 5. Pre heat oven to 220C
- 6. For the cheese sauce, heat milk to just boiling point.
- 7. In another saucepan, melt the butter and flour over low heat and stir to make a roux, but do not let it brown. Add the warm milk 1/2 cup (125 ml) at a time and stir constantly with a wooden spoon or whisk until you have a thick white sauce. Add 300 g of grated cheese, salt and pepper to taste and stir until melted.
- 8. Spread cauliflower leaves and stems in the base of a small baking dish and top with the florets. Pour the cheese sauce over the cauliflower and scatter the remaining 100 g grated cheese and bake for 30 40 minutes. Serve hot.



Road Safety Tips

ROAD SAFETY TIPS FOR WINTER

It is a good idea to drive slowly and carefully in general, but travelling at high speeds is even more dangerous during winter. Wet, icy roads can greatly impact your car's ability to slow down. Keep an appropriate following distance between yourself and the vehicle in front of you.

Avoid hazards by braking gradually before you reach corners. Leave early and allow yourself extra time to reach your destination so you will not be inclined to rush. Remember that the unstable weather conditions can make for increased risk on the roads.

AVOID SUDDEN BRAKING AND TURNING

In winter there is a danger of black ice on the road. This is a thin layer of ice on the road's surface that is difficult to detect. Avoid making any sharp turns or braking suddenly as this could cause your car to slide on the ice. If your car does go into a skid, ease pressure on the accelerator and avoid braking too heavily which will further lock up your tyres. If the back wheels of your car slide on the ice, avoid turning your wheel too sharply which can make the problem worse. Prevent sliding by braking gradually before you reach corners, and maintaining slower speeds.

CHECK YOUR VEHICLE BEFORE DEPARTING

Before you begin your journey, it is a good idea to check your car and make sure everything is functioning. Check the tread in your tyres, and add extra pressure if required. The older the tyres the more likely they will be to struggle on icy roads. Ensure your car is fitted with a spare tyre, and thoroughly clear any snow and ice off your car before driving. Make sure you have plenty of fuel in case any hazards on the road cause delays.

The other 10 spies saw obstacles and danger, but Caleb saw victory. Caleb kept his eyes on the God of promise, the Lord God who controls the future. (*See Hebrews 11:1-3*). Instead of fearing what he saw with his eyes, Caleb trusted in the God of all hope. Caleb received his promised inheritance "because he wholeheartedly followed the Lord God of Israel," Joshua 14:14. But Caleb wasn't ready to retire from God's work. Even though the hill country was still inhabited by the Anakim(giants), Caleb said, "Now give me this hill country that the Lord promised me that day, I shall be able to drive them out just as the Lord said" Joshua 14:12.

Even at 85 years of age, he was ready to take on the giants. He was ready to take on the tough assignment because he trusted in the power of God. There is plenty of unoccupied territory all around us in this broken & stumbling world today. We need our hearts to be more like that of Caleb. Commit yourself today to serving the Lord wholeheartedly like Caleb. Meet the challenge, & claim the victory in Christ Jesus no matter how daunting it may seem.

Ask God for His strength to face the giants that challenge you, and to keep serving the Lord God until that final call when you see Him in heaven.

WATCH OUT FOR WILD MUSHROOMS

As the wet weather sets in across much of the state, South Australians heading outdoors are reminded not to pick and eat wild mushrooms.

The Department for Health and Wellbeing's Scientific Services Branch Director, Dr David Simon, said while some wild mushrooms might look tempting and perfectly safe, ingesting them can cause serious illness or even death.

"Symptoms of mushroom poisoning include violent stomach cramps, nausea, vomiting and diarrhoea, which can take several hours to appear and last up to three days," Dr Simon said. "Poisoning from several varieties including the death-cap mushroom can have delayed onset of symptoms (up to 24 hours) and cause life-threatening liver damage.

If you suspect you or someone you know has eaten a wild mushroom, do not wait for symptoms to appear. Contact the Poisons Information Centre on 13 11 26 for advice and always call triple zero (000) in an emergency. If you suspect your pet has eaten wild mushrooms, seek veterinary attention immediately.


