

Hughes Family Sells Tailem Bend Newsagency

After 80 years and three generations of service to the community, family-run business Hughes Newsagency will change hands on June 30.

The newsagency has been sold to Adithya "Adi" Asani, a partner in a Melbourne company. The new owner will take on all current staff.

"It will be business as usual, just without the Hughes family at the helm," the Hughes family said in a letter to customers.

They thanked the community and generations of staff for their support over the years. Third-generation owner Tony Hughes said that support had been the highlight of his time at the newsagency.

"The customers and staff are all lovely people," he said.

"We have always aimed to offer good, friendly service, and have loved getting involved with the community.

"We have really enjoyed supporting the local sporting and community clubs over the years, that's always been really important to us."

The Tailem Bend icon has been in the family since 1943, when deli owner Jeff Hughes bought the business next door to his.

Jeff's son Robert then took over after returning from the police force.

Some years later, after working for a short time as a teacher, Robert's son Tony became the new owner.

Over the years, one thing the family prided themselves on was their ability to adapt to their customers' needs, having sold not only newspapers but paperback novels, giftware, computer goods and even bread flour at one point.

"All towns need local businesses and the people need to support them; otherwise there won't be any small businesses," Tony Hughes said.

Although it is certainly the end of an era, the Hughes family will remain in Tailem Bend.

The youngest Mr Hughes will still run Rob Hughes Agencies, and his mother and father will continue their retirement.

The Tailem Long Paddle

Our dragon boat club, Vicki's Pride, based at the Murray Bridge Marina and Caravan Park, decided to end the season with a long paddle to Tailem Bend.

Our previous long paddle a few years ago to Sunnyside and back for a barbecue had blown up windy, choppy and drizzly. This year, some bright spark suggested we end this season with a long paddle to Tailem Bend and back. What kind of weather could we expect? In late May, short days, foggy starts, cold and wet; nevertheless, we decided to tempt fate again.

Sixteen gluttons for punishment set out soon after eight on Sunday 22 May. Heavy fog gradually lifted to a gorgeous calm, sunny day. With our support boat variously following, passing or preceding us, we made excellent time. There was, too, plenty of time for bird watching – a darter with a baby in the nest, for instance – and seeing the off-highway riverside you would normally only see from a speedboat or houseboat.

Apart from a stop at the RiverGlen Marina for a toilet and snack break, we paddled through without stopping – the boat that is, we did take turns to rest. We made good time, rotating sweeps and swapping sides – dragonboat paddlers sit two to a seat – to give our lefts and rights an even chance at exercise.

When I first glimpsed the silos of Tailem Bend, I thought we'd made terrific time. Of course, it took quite a while longer and several bends in the river to actually make those silos grow. We'd originally thought we could stop for a toilet break behind some bushes on the way if necessary, but that turns out not to be so easy to do, what with all the willows and reeds and no one wanting to actually get wet climbing out. Good thing, then, that no one needed another toilet break.

Thankfully we'd decided most of us would make our own way back to Murray Bridge in partners' and friends' cars, while the support boat towed a skeleton crew back.

Vicki's Pride Dragon Boat Club paddles twice a week during the main season and we are thinking of paddling Sunday afternoon, weather permitting, during the winter off-season. Our motto, fun, friendship and fitness, drives our training, racing and social activities.

The Changing Face of Tailem Bend #120

A long-running series submitted by Peter Connolly.

This month we have look at two short stories about dualistic identities who were and still are, seen as dyed in the wool super Tailem Bend proponents. I've had the first one on before but can't help with him looking younger and wearing shorts, presenting him again, he had so many stories of fame to tell.

Doctor Phillip Gooden from the MV Standard 1981.

The Doc. remembered when steam trains stained the town with their smoke, and people queued for immunisation against hepatitis during the epidemics of the early 1960's. At the time he was in his 32nd year for the area, during which he amassed bitter sweet memories and many humorous experiences. He come to Tailem Bend as a young medical graduate from Adelaide University, and spent three weeks with the local practice during end of year holidays to earn some money.

Joins the practice

After completing his internship at RAH he was invited to join the practice as an assistant, in December 1952. He then joined the partnership two years later. He remembered a very different town in those early days, it was a brown town filled with railway houses which were all painted brown, by heck it all looked awful he said.

The Town of Tailem in the 1950's

"There were no trees in the streets, the smoke from the steam trains covered the atmosphere badly, especially in Webb St where the trains were close by. I had memories of brown houses and soot covered washing he said"

Then the railways converted to diesel engines and the little busy town brightened up. One of his most unpleasant memories was a town stricken by epidemics of hepatitis caused mainly by lack of proper drainage. He remembers jabbing hundreds of people. He also remembers an outbreak of Polio in 1954.

Point McLeay

A harrowing memory was a 200 mile visit he made to Pt. McLeay, during the 1956 floods. He left at 6am and did not return home until midnight, much of the road was under water. He made the trip monthly sometimes with the local

dentist. When he first arrived, the Hospital didn't have running water in the operating theatre, and only a plastic curtain separated the theatre and the delivery room. That all changed over time with big improvements.

Threat of Hospital Closure. 1988.

The Headlines read. The Rebel with a Cause. Doctor in highway blockade. It's a cause that has brought the mild mannered country Doctor, who has faithfully served the same community for the past 35 years, out of the closet and into the streets. Dr. Gooden and his supporters took to the highway to present their cause to the public. It was all about the State Government's decision to close down acute care facilities at the Tailem Bend Hospital.

That is bad enough but city people making these decisions helped stir the blockade that held up the traffic for 30minutes and caused 2km traffic jams. It was just the first shot in the local's campaign against the Govt. decisions. We will just continue to work here an indignant Dr Gooden said at the blockade "We are just not going to close it"

The Doc. was always very active in his community. Away from his practice he served on many local committees, including one to line every town street with trees. He loved his community and in return was loved by all. To cap it off he was voted Citizen of the Year by Tailem Bend Rotary Club.

Jaensch Family

Another strong Tailem identity was Ross Jaensch, (Neville's Father). The Jaensch family was utmost active in the town's formative years (Second only to the Connolly family) Whoops. When Ross Jaensch starts talking about this town, in which he has lived all his life he soon stirs from his normally placid nature.

"I've been Tailem Bend and Tailem Bend has been me" he said. The Town has had its ups and downs but I have always had faith in it. He went on to say. "It has a character all of its own. It's never been given anything; everything has been done by the people who live here. They have tried to get industries here, a new gaol here, and now it looks as if they might take our hospital away."

Street Names

Ross retired from farming and said he identifies with the town very much, mainly through his family, his grandfather's Louis Pontt and August Jaensch who once owned large tracts of land east of the railway line. Subdivision of the land nearest the town was gradual progress which started in the early 1900s, and the family history is written into the street names.

Pontt St, Pretoria St. (Named after the Jaensch property) Bannon Ave. (Ross's wife maiden name) Culley St. named after the architect who designed the Jaensch homestead. Hutt St. was named because it is near the site his ancestors built when they first came to the district with bullock teams to fence the property. Ross's Grandfather bought property, his father developed it and Ross took it over progressively after he returned from the AIF.

Land Donation


His father Ben represented Tailem Bend Ward on the then Meningie Council unopposed for 25 years, but Ross only served two terms. "Sons don't always follow in their father's footsteps" he said. He did however follow in one respect, his father donated the land for towns oval, named Jaensch Park by the town, and Ross donated the land on which the local Homes for the Aged were built. "It gave me a lot of joy and satisfaction to donate that land" he said, it was not extremely valuable, and I did not give away a fortune.

Horses

Hunting and show jumping were his greatest love for about 40 years. (I remember my brother Bob hunting with him, resplendent in their red coats). Ross competed at most shows as far away as Pinnaroo and Brown Wells. Taking his horse by rail in padded boxes provided by the railways.

Broadway

His best horse was named Broadway, on which he won many country events, "and one or two" against interstate competition at the Royal Adelaide Show. At the time the roads were not good and horse floats were rare, participants had to take their horses to the station and load them into a horse box.

Ross was Master of the Murray Bridge Hunt Club for seven years immediately after World War 11 and was Patron of Adelaide Hunt Club for two years.

Community

Ross was a J P for 30 years, a Legatee for 16 years and Rotary for 23. He also followed the family tradition serving the Methodist/Uniting Church in almost every capacity.

"It is the Council's formal statement to reconciliation and will assist with embedding the principles and purpose of reconciliation within the organisation."

"Coorong District Council is located within Ngarrindjeri Ruwe and covers much of the Coorong, which has been home for many thousands of years to the Ngarrindjeri people."

"The Ngarrindjeri have a timeless connection to the lower Murray River, Lakes and Coorong, and like the Ngarrindjeri, we as a Council are proud of our district and the RAP framework which allows us to further understand where we need to grow, develop and create stronger connections with First Nations people."

The Reconciliation Action Plan will guide the Council in its reconciliation journey, acknowledge what is being done well

which will be used as a foundation to build on, and continue to develop relationships and seek guidance from First Nations peoples.

The artwork featured on the cover of the plan was created by Artist Summer Dawn and is titled 'The Art of Reconciliation'. The artwork is a representation of the Council's vision and journey to reconciliation and reflects the unity of commonality between reconciliation and culture.

The RAP was launched at the Coorong Gallery's newest art exhibition opening which coincided with the first day of this year's National Reconciliation Week. The exhibition celebrates and features established and emerging Ngarrindjeri artists.

The 'Ngarrindjeri Ruwe – Our Lands, Our Waters' exhibition is open to the public at the Coorong Gallery between 9am – 4:30pm weekdays, and will remain on display until 22 July 2022.

Introducing Your Health Advisory Council (HAC)

Meningie and Districts Memorial Hospital and Tailem Bend District Hospital have proud histories of serving their respective communities. From their early inception to the current day, there have been many changes.

Initially, Hospital Boards comprising local volunteers, made decisions determining their direction. In more recent times Country Health SA was divided into Local Health Networks with Meningie and Tailem Bend Hospitals amalgamating to create Coorong Health Services (Meningie and Tailem Bend).

The HAC was formed with interested volunteers from within the community to meet regularly and link the community to the governing body – Riverland Mallee Coorong Local Health Network.

What does HAC do?

- Advise the health service on the health service needs, priorities and issues of the community
- Ascertain the health needs of the community
- Advocate on behalf of the Community with Riverland Mallee Coorong Local Health Network
- Operate consistently with the strategic objectives of the Government of South Australia.

What HAC doesn't do?

- HAC is not empowered to operate businesses of any kind
- HAC does not have the power to employ any person

At times, via the Lakelander and Tailem Topics, HAC calls for nominations from interested community members to offer their services.

Community members with concerns regarding health services in any way pertaining to either Hospital or Community Health Care are encouraged to contact a HAC member. All concerns will be treated confidentially when taken to and discussed at a HAC meeting. HAC aims to improve community trust and experience of the health system and to improve the value and equity of health outcomes of the community. It is important to note that Private Medical Practices (Coorong Medical Centre and Murraylands Medical Centre) are outside the realm of HAC.

Ngarrindjeri Mulyawonk Creation Story

It's been said that the home of the Mool-ya-wonk is in a cave near Tailem Bend and not Murray Bridge as many may believe.

While the Mulyawonk Creation Story may vary from Lakalinyeri *(clan)* to Lakalinyeri *(clan)*, the Ngarrindjeri Mulyawonk Creation Story in part says:

In times long ago there lived a Ngarrindjeri Korni (man) who was greedy catching far too many fish than he needed to. The Elders were not happy with this selfish man who did not respect the Ngarrindjeri laws of fishing.

The Elders were so angry with this man that as a punishment they turned him into the Mulyawonk – a half fish, half man creature, banishing him to the river forever. Ngarrindjeri children are told never to swim alone or to take more fish than you can eat from the river and lakes.

If you do swim alone or are greedy in taking too many fish, then the Mulyawonk will get you.

This story teaches children water safety and respect for the fish of the river lakes.

One home of the Mulyawonk is in a river cave near Tailem Bend.



The word Bunyip has its origins from the Wemba-Wemba or Wergaila language of Aboriginal people of South-Eastern Australia.

It can be said that during European occupation, Aboriginal people warned Europeans of the danger of river and lake swimming and that certain areas were prohibited to visit for if you did you would fall victim to a Bunyip.

Lunch Time Corn Chowder



INGREDIENTS

- 60g Butter, 3 Rashers of Bacon diced, 11/2 Cups Finely diced Celery
- 1 Grated carrot, 1 Grated Potato
- 2 Medium Onions finely chopped, 1 Tablespoon Plain Flour
- 1 Litre Milk 2 Chicken Cubes, 1 Can Creamed Corn, Salt, Pepper, Parsley.

METHOD

- 1. Melt butter.
- 2. Add cut up bacon, onion and celery, cook gently over low heat until vegies and bacon are tender.
- Mix flour into first mixture then gradually add milk and cook over medium heat until mixture thickens, add crumbled chicken cubes and creamed corn, add salt and pepper to taste.
- 4. Serve in a casserole, sprinkle with finely chopped parsley and serve with crusty bread or croutons.





From the Chamber

The June ordinary Council meeting was an important one, as it included adoption of the 2022/23 Annual Business Plan and Budget.

The plan has been developed to be responsible and fair, acknowledging the current economic environment and balancing that against community expectation.

There will be a focus on asset renewal of roads and footpaths, with a 50% increase to the unsealed road re-sheeting program (from 40km to 60km per year) and roll out of the new footpath network expansion strategy. Some key projects and programs for 2022/23 include:

- Undertaking the 2022 Council elections
- Streetscape master planning for Tintinara, Coonalpyn & Tailem Bend
- Implementing first-year findings of the Growth Strategy
- Delivering \$137,000 of works for the footpath renewal and expansion program
- Improvement to mobile black spots through construction of two new mobile phone towers at Colebatch and Narrung.


WAKE - SHELLEY BURR

A searing debut crime novel where the grief and guilt surrounding an unsolved disappearance still haunt a small farming community... and will ultimately lead to a reckoning.

The small town of Nannine lies in the harsh red interior of New

South Wales. Once a thriving outback centre of stockyards and sheep stations, years of punishing drought have petrified the land. Now nearly a ghost town, Nannine has been whittled down to no more than a stoplight, a couple of pubs and a police station.

But it has another, more sinister claim to fame: the still:unsolved disappearance of young Evelyn McCreery nineteen years ago from the bedroom she shared with her twin sister. The details seem impossible: the intruder left no evidence.



No forced entry. No fingerprints. No footprints. No tyre tracks. Evelyn simply vanished.

Mina McCreery's life has been defined by the intense public interest in her sister's case, which is still a hot topic on social media and in true:crime chat rooms. Now an anxious and reclusive adult, Mina lives alone on her family's sunbaked destocked sheep farm.

Enter Lane Holland, a private investigator who dropped out of the police academy to earn a living cracking cold cases. Before she died, Mina's mother funded a million:dollar reward for anyone who could explain how Evelyn disappeared from her bed in the family's farmhouse. The lure of cash increased the public obsession with Evelyn and Mina, yet has never led to an answer.

Lane needs money to pay for his little sister's university education, and he wins Mina's trust when some of his more unconventional methods show promise. But Lane also has darker motivations for wanting to solve the case, and his obsession with the search will ultimately risk both their lives : and yield shocking results.

WAKE is a hugely compelling mystery with a vivid rural Australia setting and fascinatingly damaged character.


