Happy 135th Birthday Tailem Bend

John Morphet surveyed the area in 1839. The area then became a sheep station, run by David Gillan. He called it Thaleam. This area was also known as Pine Camp in the very early years.

Tailem Bend was proclaimed a *"town"* on 28th July 1887 with 42 subdivided allotments surveyed by N W Pethick.

There are a few different stories on how the name Tailem Bend was derived. The bend in the river, or an aboriginal name, to bending the tails of the bullocks when crossing the river in the overland stock days.

Whatever the reason Tailem Bend has become an important town in South Australia, with its River, Road & Rails.

Starting with the First Nation people, many who worked for the farmers.



Winter at Pangarinda Botanic Garden

Winter is the time of the year when the Hakeas put on a display with many flowering at the same time. Also a good time for a walk through this never know what is flowering garden.

Hakea verrucosa is one of the winter-flowering shrubs, often mistaken for the closely related Grevilleas. The large clusters of cream and pink flowers that age to red form amongst the sharp terete leaves along the old and new stems. Flowering from May until August.

A very prickly, round dense shrub to 2 metres high and wide, attracts birds while providing protection from predators.

Found growing in a variety of soils in the Ravensthorpe area of WA, and proving very adaptable to soils in this Region, tolerating frosts and dry areas.

Christmas Tree FARM at Wellington East

Did you know there is a Christmas Tree FARM at Wellington East?

It's almost eight years since we purchased an ex-Geraldton wax flower farm on 20 acres, built a house and sheds, installed fencing, added a shipping container workshop, and laid out extensive irrigation for animal, vegetable, fruit and crop raising.

Black Kite Farm is now well established. We keep alpacas for wool, goats for grass trimming, sheep, a steer for entertainment, and chickens, ducks and bees for produce. We are off-grid, with a 5kw solar system charging 24 x 847AH deep cycle gel batteries supplying all of our power needs. We occasionally run a backup generator in winter when clouds are denser, and the sun is lower. We collect rainwater and have onsite septic. We have extensive veggie beds, established fruit trees, and harvest honey from flow hives. We can, bottle and dry produce, and participate in extensive sharing with other growers.

We planted our first 200 Christmas Trees (*plantation supplied radiata pine*) five years ago. A 1967 Massey Ferguson turns the ground over and digs out small wax flower bushes which keep popping up in the wrong place, preparing another section each July to ready it for planting.

This year we are going to do it a little differently. With a large number of kangaroos coming across the property, they see young baby trees as tasty snacks. We lose a large number of freshly planted trees within the first month. Last year we trialled holding back 50 trees and planting them in pots for the first six months, putting them in the ground in December.



This has worked well, with the kangaroos less interested in the chewier six-month-old saplings.

This year, we will put all 250 saplings in to pots which will be housed in a large greenhouse. The greenhouse has been standing for many years with its rusted main trusses and cracking posts. We are bringing it back to life having removed and given away the mass of glass which once formed its roof, to be replaced with sheets of greenhouse Perspex, making use of purlins reclaimed from our builder. The end walls will be recycled Colorbond, and shelving for the tree pots will be made from pallets. Having a greenhouse will also allow us to grow vegetables all year round.

This Christmas our five-year-old trees will be ready for sale. They are now well established and ready for decorations and lights in local lounges.

The Changing Face of Tailem Bend #121

The late Ron Trenowden was a significant figure around Tailem Bend for a long time, but was one of those volunteers who got the job done in a quiet manner. He was a railway man who was connected strongly with two local families who revived his memories.

Ron was born at Gawler on 8th January 1925 to Sydney and Audrey Trenowden the eldest of 3 children. His sister Jean had a childhood illness which made it difficult to walk the mile to and from school. It was something Ron didn't think about twice and immediately started her as a passenger on his push bike. He always wanted to enlist for active service, but however as much he wanted it he was most disappointed that he was not accepted because of a medical problem.

After the completion of his schooling he obtained his first job at the Aircraft Factory based at Islington. Before the end of the war he had commenced working for the South Australian Railways and soon found himself appointed to Tailem Bend. When he arrived there, he lived in the single men's quarters.

He became friendly with Betty Hurford in 1945 and they were married in St. Luke's Anglican Church in 1948. They initially lived in Webb St. (*Gun Alley*) followed by a move to Princes Highway after living with Betty's Dad for a period who lived in a house near the RSL. Finally moving to 151 Railway Tce. And remaining there for the remainder of his life. Sadly he lost his beloved Betty in 1988.


Ron passed all the necessary Railway rules to progress over the years from commencing as an Airman to working in a shunt driving team with Diesel Power Locomotives seeing the shunt yard move from 3 full shifts to only one. He retired from the Railways *(then National Railway)* after completing 40 years of service.

FootBall

In sport Ron played in the Premiership team of Gawler Rovers Football Club in 1940 and was obviously one of the younger players in the team. Then he featured in the famous premiership team of Tailem Bend in 1947, this was the team which coming so soon after the war was legendary.

These were treasured memories, however he was not a person to boast about his achievement.

Ron was very supportive follower of the Tailem Bend Colts football players through the 70s as timekeeper and also helped out with transport.

Horse Racing

Ron had a love for horses, when he could no longer ride, he kept his interest by following horse racing. One day his niece spotted him in the Judges Box at the Mindarie/ Halidon races and was surprised because he had kept it low key but carried the position with pride.

He loved returning to Gawler for race meetings, and in the years following his retirement he particularly enjoyed the Murray Bridge Races.

Bowls/Golf

In 1992 Ron passed the test to be a National Umpire with Australian Bowls, he also represented the Tailem Bend Club playing as a skipper in Division 2 Pennants. He also served as a selector and committee member.

A keen golfer he enjoyed his games, but maybe he got more pleasure, if that were possible, from trips away with his fellow golfers.

Community

Involvement with the Community was a feature of Ron's life for many years. In 1975 a Certificate of Membership was issued to record his involvement with the Tailem Bend Lions Club. He also received key membership for exceptional and unselfish service to the club while he was President of the club. He was also President of the Probus Club.

After Betty's death in 1988 his determination to be independent was a credit to him as he dealt with his new life without her by his side.

Some years later there was a renewal of friendship which had been initiated in 1955 when the Thompson's family moved next to Ron and Betty who were situated on Princes Highway. Joan's husband Jack Thompson had passed away some years earlier. Joan met up with the Ron that she remembered from earlier years as a *'bit of a snob'*. Over many years a special friendship developed which gave Ron the opportunity to share some wonderful times with Joan. Together they could forget the loneliness of seeing an old year out and a new one in by themselves.


Living all his married life in Tailem Bend he was well known by the young folk even though he had no children of his own. Jeff and Ivy Hughes's children can recall Ron and Betty baby sitting them.

Nicknames played a large part in Ron's relationship with others, and he had his fair share of names by which he was known. To family at Gawler he was known as Ninna Nowden, to his Godson Lloyd Downs and his family he was Ningy, to JJ Hughes he was Digger and to many others he was the Gawler Goat. (How they all came about goodness knows.)

Ron's memories live on through family members Pauline Merritt and Jeanette Kozikowski and others who remembered his involvement to our community.

Health Advisory Council (HAC) How it works in your community?

Coorong Health Services (Meningie and Tailem Bend Hospitals) are a part of the Riverland Mallee Coorong Local Health Network (RMCLHN) which comprises 10 country hospitals in the regions with its major hospitals at Berri and Murray Bridge.

Meningie and Tailem Bend Hospitals are fortunate to have Private Medical Practices with Doctors contracted to treat patients in the respective Hospitals. Many rural hospitals do not have this service and rely heavily on teleconferencing from the service based in Berri or Murray Bridge.

In recent times Meningie and Tailem Bend have been directed to use this service for non-life-threatening presentations at the Accident and Emergency department between 7pm and 7am.

Presentations between 7pm and 7am are assessed by the Nursing staff who will then liaise with the Medical Officer in Berri or Murray Bridge with regard to ongoing management. If necessary, the Medical Officer can utilise the teleconference facility in the Accident and Emergency Department to view and converse with the patient.

In case of a life-threatening emergency, the local Medical Officer on call will be notified immediately and will attend, which is in line with the RMCLHN guidelines.

Any persons whose employment requires an on-call roster commitment in addition to full time work knows how onerous and tiring this responsibility can be. Any arrangement that can alleviate this stressor should be supported by the community.

The community is asked to understand and respect the change to health care protocols directed by SA Health in managing after hours presentations to the Hospital.

Community members may continue to present after 7pm at their respective Hospital but with the understanding that a non-life-threatening situation will be managed from Berri or Murray Bridge and that a Medical Officer will not be physically present.

HAC members are happy to be contacted if further clarification is required.



In previous articles recently published in the Lakelander and Tailem Topics the changes to public health in public hospitals pertaining to your community have been outlined.

The Coorong Health Advisory Council strives to represent your community and can serve you by governing your aspirations and individual needs regarding current and future health services. HAC's role in the health service is to engage the community to ensure required services are provided in line with current SA Health principles.


To be truly effective HAC must receive the community's input on issues that can be improved to enhance your health care outcomes. This may include services which you individually require and may be available through SA Health services.

Chicken & Vegetable Soup - Always good for the soul

Ingredients:

- 5 chicken thighs (bone in or out)
- 2 carrots, chopped
- 2 celery stalks chopped
- ½ sweet potato, chopped
- 1 zucchini chopped
- 1 onion chopped
- 450g pumpkin, chopped
- 2 medium potatoes (optional)
- 1 teaspoon sweet paprika
- 1 teaspoon ground turmeric
- 1½ to 2 litres chicken stock or water
- 2 handfuls chopped baby spinach leaves
- Salt and pepper to season

Method:

- Put chicken, vegetables, spices and the stock in a pot. Bring to the boil and cook on low for 3 hours.
- Carefully remove chicken from the soup, discard the bones and shred the meat and put aside.
- Using a handheld stick mixer blend the soup until smooth then return the chicken to the soup.
- Stir in spinach and season.
- Top with extra chopped spinach.

This soup freezes very well and it is so warming and delicious.

- Weekly trips to the Murray Bridge heated pool will commence when it reopens (\$5.00/return)

We have also applied to the Department of Infrastructure and Transport to operate weekly shopping trips to Murray Bridge and Mount Barker, so stay tuned.



Sam was delighted to deliver a presentation to Meningie Probus on 21 June which was well received. She spoke about TBCC services available in Meningie such as transport and CHSP assistance, the proposal to establish a Community Centre in Meningie, and focused on explaining My Aged Care and how to

navigate it. Since then, Sam has been invited to speak at Murray Bridge Probus in a few months' time. If you have a community group or organisation in surrounding areas (eg. 



Meningie's Shorebird Banners

Some people may have noticed the new banners at the northern and southern entrances to Meningie and also at Salt Creek.

The banners depict a photograph of a flock of Stilt shorebirds feeding on the water flats of the Coorong, taken by shorebird expert John Gitsham.

On the top right of the banner is a QR code which when scanned will take people to a shorebird identification website.

The banners were gained by the Meningie Progress Association through grant funding from the Australian Government's National Landcare Program, supported by the Limestone Coast Landscape Board.

Meningie Progress was approached by the Limestone Coast Landscape Board to help find ways of spreading interest for the Coorong's local and migrating shorebirds.

The funding also included the purchase of a badge maker which was used at the Meningie Food Fair and the Friends of the Coorong's *'Farewell to the Shorebirds'* day held earlier this year at Parnka Point.

Children and adults were able to create their own badge at the events depicting one of the birds and its name.

The banners will remain in place until about October, when the Sunflower banners will make a return.




SALA Festival



And then there's the mysterious girl living rough whom Greta tries to befriend.

Determined to make sense of it all. Greta is drawn into Joel's unspoken past and confronted by her own. Before long the curlew's haunting cry will call her to face the secrets she and Joel can no longer outrun.

Operation Return to School – July 2022 – Term 3

On Monday 25 July 2022, students return to school in South Australia. The beginning of a new school term is a busy time around school zones when traffic volumes are generally higher. Children and young people are at risk in road environments around schools for a number of reasons.

They are smaller and less visible to drivers, their active behaviour can be less predictable than adults and they may have errors of judgement when dealing with traffic. Younger children *(generally children under 10)* do not have well developed peripheral vision, cognitive and perceptual abilities which may also put them at higher risk in a road environment.

Please be extra vigilant at this time, not only near to schools but in other areas when children travelling to and from school.

LETTER TO EDITOR

Dear Editor.

The news of an outbreak of Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD) in livestock in Bali has sent a shiver down the spine of every livestock producer in the country.

Combined with ongoing fruit fly outbreaks in the Riverland and the outbreak of Varroa mite in NSW, it is a stark reminder of the importance of Australia's biosecurity protocols.

With July school holidays upon us and international travel resuming following pandemic closures, the return of thousands of Aussie travellers from Bali over the next few weeks poses a serious threat to our livestock industry.

An FMD outbreak in Australia would have a catastrophic impact on our nation with modelling showing that it could cost our economy up to \$80 billion and damage our clean, green reputation.

The shock waves would be felt in every regional economy across the nation.

The Federal Labor Government's response to the outbreak in Bali to date falls a long way short of addressing the current risks faced by Australian producers.

The Federal Government must step up biosecurity protocols and ensure it implements preventative measures relative to the risk FMD poses.

At the very minimum, all travellers from Indonesia and any other FMD hotpots must have their footwear appropriately treated.

In the circumstances and given the risks all measures should be under serious consideration.


