The East Wellington Cemetery Book

The East Wellington Cemetery book was officially launched at The Hall Café on Thursday 17th November 2022 with a good gathering of local identities and Coorong District Council representatives in attendance. The Tailem Bend Historians received a Coorong Council Community Project Grant to assist with the printing of the East Wellington Cemetery book.

The book came about after researching for an exhibition of the history of Tailem Bend, when it was found that there were many unmarked graves at the East Wellington Cemetery. The first step was to identify who was buried in the cemetery from 1840 to 1895 as only 88 people were recorded on headstones.

During the 1800s, West and East Wellington serviced outlying settlements, including Tailem Bend, Woods Point, Westbrook, Ashville, Cooke Plains and the stations of Wellington Lodge, Poltalloch, Brinkley and Nalpa, so these locations were added to the search criteria.

Wellington Police Station almost certainly kept early records, but were destroyed by fire. Fortunately, newspaper reports of the day detailed proceedings at inquests and the subsequent burial of a deceased person. The first reported burial was Frederick Oughton on 9th October 1847. His death was not recorded in SA Deaths, but according to newspaper reports, he was working for the South Australian Company and drowned while swimming.

Upon death, a person was simply buried up on the hill, on the outskirts of East Wellington. This hill was unfenced and constantly trampled by livestock on route to the busy River Murray crossing. With headstones and burial sites continually being damaged and destroyed, local residents pressured the government to attend to the matter. This resulted in the 1859 survey for a cemetery reserve of 15 acres.

Four years later, in April 1863, Special Magistrate E C Hughes, chaired a meeting where it was decided to at once take steps for enclosing the public cemetery with a substantial stone wall and iron gates, which were never erected, despite raising substantial public money. The cemetery reserves for East Wellington and Bedford were Gazetted and officially vested in the District Council of Meningie on 19th July 1888.

Elizabeth Nicholls researched deaths from 1840 - 1895 which were merged with records transcribed by Christine Hartmann from 1895 - 2000. The East Wellington Cemetery book contains details of 300 deaths together with a selection of corresponding newspaper reports of the day. Some who met their misfortune were simply crossing the river, or passing through on the road to the gold fields. It is believed, many travellers were buried in unmarked graves east of the cemetery's boundary, commonly known as the 'police paddock'.

Copies of the book will be housed at the Coorong District Council, Tailem Bend Historians Association Inc, Tailem Bend Community Library and Murray Bridge Community Library, providing a record for interested persons and a direction for further interments in the East Wellington Cemetery.

The Changing Face of Tailem Bend #125

The Changing face of Tailem Bend Historical Rail Trail. As compiled by Jeanette Kozicowski.

The MAIN STREET

The liveliness of the main street rotated around the lives of the railway men and their 'pay day', as then the money got spent in town. Railway employees' work commitments were varied and, in some cases, involved around-the-clock shift work duties, including Saturdays and Sundays. Maintenance workers in the main did not work shifts, their responsibilities were the upkeep of the many employees' houses. These men mainly worked in Tailem Bend and travelled around the Division on the Pinnaroo and Riverland lines. Then we had the traffic side of the Railways. The Shunters in the marshalling yard, Station Master, Yard Master, Porters, Labourers, Signalmen, Ticket Clerks, Goods Shed workers, Gangers, Electricians... the list goes on and on.

At all times they carried their tucker boxes containing meals prepared by their wives. The marshalling yard was extremely busy with train crews and staff on the ground working three shifts, day, afternoon, and night.

In the early 1900's the Methodist Church was located where the Foodland Store is now. The Church was used as a school and for town meetings. In 1911 a new school was built and remains at the same site today. There were 84 children. At one time there were more than 19 businesses on Railway Terrace.

Initially the Railways supplied the town water and electricity supply and there was only one telephone and that was at the Railway Station. The shops included the Newsagency & Tobacconist, a Butcher, Baker and Post Office.

The original Tailem Bend Institute, now the Town Hall and Council Offices, was the hub of Tailem Bend's activities. There were many concerts, some of which were held on the adjacent lawns using a semi-trailer as a stage. Events such as Christmas Carols, Pageants,



Dances and Parades were held frequently. When markets were held at the saleyards the town was very busy and noisy. Sheep trucks would start arriving as early as 7am and were coming and going all day, sometimes as late as 8pm.

RAILWAY STATION, 1913

The Station was commissioned by the South Australian Railways (S.A.R.) in early 1913 and was opened on the 7th October of that year.

The Station served the local and surrounding communities, both for passenger travel and the transportation of freight, for 83 years before the Station was decommissioned in 1996.

"Just imagine if every train that passed this Station over the past 100 years could speak. I'm sure they'd have a story to tell. There would have been trains full of students going to Murray Bridge High School, carriages on the Overland heading to Melbourne, countless tonnes of grain carted to and from the silos, heavy-laden freight trains and commuter trains transporting railway workers to neighbouring towns along the line such as Coonalpyn and Tintinara. Overall, the Station has served as a major transport intermodal for not just the district, but the nation".

ROTUNDA, 1927 CA

The Tailem Bend Rotunda was built by Jack Rodgers. Sadly, he passed away on the night of the Rotunda opening.

There is a room beneath the Rotunda where the Tailem Bend bands would rehearse. Now its entrance is covered.

RAILWAY COTTAGES, EARLY 1920's

In the early 1900's the marshalling yards that were in Murray Bridge were transferred to Tailem Bend with all its workers. The line was laid and opened in 1906. A total of 250 homes were constructed in Tailem Bend for railway workers.

The cottages were built in 1926 for railway workers under the Railway Housing Scheme. The picture below is the first row of these homes. The street was named after the Commissioner of the South Australian Railways from 1922-1930, Alfred Webb.



These were cement cottages that were poured into moulds. Webb Street was and remains known as *'Gun Alley'*. A gun shot went off one day and someone asked *'What?! Where did that come from?'*. The response was *'Down the alley!'*

In number 217 Webb Street the Connolly family raised 15 children.

RAILWAYS INSTITUTE 1928

The Railways Institute of SA was a social club for railway workers. Originally this was used as a dining room for the construction crew building the early railway cottages. Later it was used for the railway workers and their families' social events. Many railway stories were shared under this very roof. The *'New Australians' (migrants)* began a new style of social living in Tailem Bend, introducing cabarets and dances around the piano bar at the Railways Institute.

'The Institute would be of great benefit to the railway employees, and as a social centre it would be an asset to the community. The Institute will be a boon to the railway employees in Tailem Bend', said Mr Tucker on the opening night.



The Railways Institute ceased operating on the 30th June, 1996,

FORMER FERRY LANDING 19XX

The Tailem Bend ferry landing was one of the last Government timber jetty type landings to be built on the River Murray and it is the only substantially intact example remaining. This landing represents a stage in the development of ferry crossings on the river, when timber landings were standard. Since 1839 ferry crossings on the River Murray have played an important role in the development of the state's transport network and its links to the eastern states.

SALE YARDS 1920'S

Stock markets in Tailem Bend were opened by the SA Farmers' Union in 1920 with the first market being held in March of that year.

Subsequent sales were held periodically until 1925 when yardings were available. Goldsbrough, Mort & Co. Ltd. Then conducted monthly markets starting on May 14th, 1925. Elder Smith & Co. commenced later.

The 'sale days' were held every Tuesday. They were busy, important business and social events.

They became so popular that the yarding increased and in 1935 it became necessary to have two-day sale events. The sale yards became deserted in the mid 1970's when Murray Bridge became the hub.

This is only a portion of Jeanette's work and research, many thanks to her, there will be more in the New Year with interesting photos from Doris Connolly's Collection.

Strong winds at Tailem Bend on Sunday 20 November and Monday 21 November made conditions unsafe to complete the works required to restore the second circuit. MURRAY BRIDGE POOL & MARKET PLACE BUS

We are soon to launch our new transport service to Murray Bridge, travelling Wednesdays and every second Monday. The bus will pick you up from home (if you are more than 5kms outside of TB, we can meet you at TBCC) and will depart by 8 am. We are offering two options for our passengers: either the MB heated pool (near the hospital) or MB Marketplace, but not both. The bus will drop off at the pool and then go on to the Marketplace.

With the BankSA branch shutting in Tailem Bend, there is a possibility of stopping at the BankSA branch in Murray Bridge.

The bus will arrive back in TB by 11 am.

The trial run for this service begins on November 23 and will continue until Wednesday 21 December. The cost will be a gold coin donation (during trial phase only) and pool fees will be payable at the pool reception.

If the service is well utilised, TBCC will resume again in early 2023 for a cost of \$5 per person. Trial dates are:

Mondays: November 28, December 12

Wednesdays: November 23, December 7, 14, and 21

Bookings are essential. If you have any questions or wish to book a seat for these dates, please give us a call.

Both the Tailem Bend shopping bus and Murray Bridge pool bus are services available to people of all ages. If you are over 65 years (or 50+ years ATSI), then you will need to be registered with My Aged Care (1800 200 422) and have a transport referral in place. If you require help with this, we can assist and guide you through the process. These services are new to our town and TBCC has philanthropically funded them to determine the level of need for these types of services in our community. If they are not well utilised then we will be unable to continue providing them in the new year, so please help us spread the word.

Pangarinda Botanic Garden

Rains keep coming, with our plantings loving the excess water that is going deep into the soil, this has been lacking in the last few years giving volunteers the endless task of watering.

Volunteers are receiving continuous compliments from visitors on the exceptional beauty of the Garden and the huge variety of plants growing here. Above average rain is lengthening a very prolific flowering.

Our workforce is slowly getting on top of the veldt grass. We get asked why we don't spray it out, the answer is Pangarinda Botanic Garden had huge patches of sand drift before 1993 when volunteers started planting. Veldt grass had been planted to try and stop the drift. Committee found mowing and brush cutting the veldt grass keeps the sand stable and cut material adding mulch. The mulch this year is a little more than normal.



Murray River High Flows

The Murray Darling Basin is currently experiencing high flows and flooding due to flooding events in both NSW and Victoria.

As at 18 November, the State Government provided data on River Murray flows showing that at least 175 GL/day is now expected to flow down the river in South Australia from earlv December.

Council is part of the Zone Emergency Support Team which with connects us relevant neighbouring agencies and councils, ensuring timely and accurate information is received and communicated

Currently, Council's response to the high flows include:

- Risk assessments undertaken to understand the impact the current forecast flows may have on public infrastructure, with actions allocated when specific flow levels are reached.
- A targeted action plan will be developed based on predicted flows and standing water levels once further modelling has been completed by the hazard lead agency.
- Active monitoring of high flows, with advice taken from lead agencies and emergency services to ensure а coordinated response council continues monitor to the information



Stay safe on the road this Christmas - As one of the busiest and most dangerous periods for Australian drivers, it's important to be aware and prepared for heightened risks on the road. And with domestic and international travel on its way back to normal, we can expect to see that risk increase even more significantly this year. Regardless of whether you're working or heading off on a family road trip these holidays, have a read of our top tips for staying safe on long journeys this Christmas and New Year.

Be realistic with your journey deadline - At this time of year, you're going to be sharing the road with A LOT more vehicles than you would typically. And whether you like it or not, all this congestion will undoubtedly lead to longer journey times and, often, frustration. For instance, a trip that might usually take four hours could end up taking you six. As painful as it may be, planning for these delays will help avoid any stress and keep you driving safely throughout the whole trip.

Be extra alert - With people travelling long distances and at all hours of the day, holiday drivers are more likely to be driving tired, forcing them to lose concentration or become distracted. With this in mind, the best way to stay safe on the roads during these busy times is to utilise defensive driving techniques. Some of these techniques include being aware of your surroundings, paying extra attention to what others are doing and keeping four seconds distance between you and other drivers. It's also a good idea to position your vehicle where you have the best view of others and where they have the best view of you. This helps to minimise the risk of a collision and allows you the best chance of getting out of the way should you need to.

Drive to the conditions - Just because the speed limit is 100 km/h doesn't necessarily mean that this speed is safe. Particularly in holiday traffic, it's important to read the road and weather conditions and adjust your driving behaviours accordingly. For instance, if you're being forced to stop frequently, reduce your speed and increase the distance between you and the vehicle in front. Similarly, those driving on country roads should use extra caution, particularly when overtaking other vehicles. Higher speed limits combined with the potential for wildlife, potholes and farming machinery on the roads add an extra element of risk – so make sure you're aware and prepared to take action if needed.

Thought for the Month - THE BIRTH OF JESUS

"The Word became flesh and dwelt among us" John chapter 1 verse 14. "Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign: The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and will call him Immanuel." Isaiah chapter 7 verse 14. "Do not be afraid, Mary, you have found favour with God. You will be with child and give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus." Luke chapter 1 verse 30.

You will know that Jesus was born in a room used for animals, and his first bed was an animal feeding trough:

"Joseph went there, (Bethlehem), to register with Mary who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child. While they were there the time came for the baby to be born, and she gave birth to her first born, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn." Luke chapter 2 verse 4-7

You will also remember that Jesus was visited by shepherds who were watching over their sheep and told by angels that Jesus had been born in Bethlehem.Then Magi came from the east, following a star to find and honour a baby who had been born, " to be king of the Jews." From this visit by the Magi, Jesus became a refugee before he was two years old.

King Herod was 'disturbed' at the news of the birth of, 'one who was born to be king of the Jews,' (Matthew 2v2), and he "realised he had been outwitted by the Magi, he was furious, and he gave orders to kill all the boys in Bethlehem and its vicinity who were two years old and under, in accordance with the time he had learned from the Magi." Matthew 2v16.

However Joseph was warned in a dream, "...take the child and his mother and escape to Egypt." Matthew 2 v 13. Joseph and his family returned to live in Nazareth after King Herod had died.

Jesus would have then grown up watching his father work at his carpentry and probably learning the trade. Every year he went to Jerusalem with his parents to celebrate the feast of the Passover. The year he was twelve Jesus parents were returning home with family and friends when they realised that Jesus was not among them. They returned to Jerusalem to find him, three days later, in the Temple courts 'sitting among the teachers, listening to them and asking questions. Everyone who heard him was amazed at his understanding and his answers. When his parents saw him they were astonished.' Luke 2 v 41-48.

May God Bless you and your families as you celebrate Jesus' birth this Christmas.




