



The Changing Face of Tailem Bend #127

A long-running series submitted by Peter Connolly.

Recently, among my records I came across stories about the history of Tailem Bend sent to me by a long time ago resident, Wendy Takos (Nee) Carter. There are many stories to tell and this is one of them.

Memories of The Tailem Bend Town Hall for the 100 years Celebration. As recalled by the CARTER family.

My family lived in Tailem Bend from 1940 to 1958, my dad was a railway man and we lived in one of two railway cottages adjacent to the main street. Our street was named Railway Terrace East I think and we were in cottage 732.

Mostly I remember the hall as where we would go on a Saturday to the pictures, a place where we would meet up with our friends and simply enjoy ourselves. The time I recall would have been in the 1950's, where in my day we did not go to *"movies"* or the *"cinema"* or even to *"see a film"* we went to *"the pictures"*, or to *"flicks"* we sometimes called them. If one were to think back to those days it was a time when there was no television, we listened to serials on radios, and generally played our own pretend games with friends when not at school.

We would go to the local football game in the afternoon and then meet up at the southern side of the building where we children would assemble to await the wooden doors opening. The doors were locked with an iron bar from the inside which was caught up in a latch type lock similar to a gate.

We would eagerly await ticket in hand for Mr. Bromley to open up then it was a mad scramble to the front four rows *(the spits)* for a seat next to our friends. My sister Lorraine usually sat next to Helen McMorron, Susie her sister was my friend and our brother's Bob & Kevin sat with Johnny Sacco, these are some of the names I recall. Our seats were like canvas deck type chairs, behind these were wooden slat chairs *(these consisted of three or four attached together)* and beyond that the cushioned wooden seats where adults sat. That area was usually roped off. There was a center aisle too that ran down the hall to where the front four rows were spread from one side to the other.

The institute is built of local stone as are many country halls, the front façade had a couple of windows and main doorway too which was in one straight line. One of the windows near the front was where we bought our tickets for 6d each, adults paid 11d.

On the western side was another door which was where I think the toilets were located outside of the hall. The floors were wooden too which made for great fun when a really exciting bit of the film occurred and we would stamp our feet or someone would roll a *"jaffa"* Lolly towards the front. It would go *"clunk, clunk"* as it rolled along and Mr. Bromley would flick his torch over us all looking for the mischief maker.

Somehow I cannot recall a curtain covering the screen but Kevin says an old gramophone played music prior to the start whilst a couple of advertisements flashed across the screen. The National Anthem was always played next and everyone would all stand quietly for that. This was followed by the "Movie tone News Reel", a cartoon and two main movies. We had a break between movies (halftime) when the lights would go on and we would all scramble out of the hall and head to the nearest deli for our lollies, drinks and ice creams. (Remember those dandies and ice creams sandwiched between wafers)?

Our friends would put their monies with ours and we would share what we bought. This proved a bonus when sometimes our parents had no extra money to allow for treats. *"Olley's was the closest Deli located on the southern side of the theatre in the main street, however there was another on the northern side up near Manning's Chemist called Deering's Deli, so it did provide a choice if one or the other was too crowed. Olley's made milk shakes to die for (my favorite being Blue Heaven" They also used their front window to display posters of up and coming films. Back to the hall and we would all settle back in, swapping fantail wrappers <i>(these had film stars names and detailed short stories about them),* until the lights went down and the main feature started. Whatever the movie, the movies always ended the same way, people clapped.

Everyone has favorite movies and I am no exception. Tarzan of the Jungle, Dean Martin & Jerry Lewis and Bud Abbott and Lou Costello comedies, Cowboy films and scary ones such as The Abominable Snowman. One really scary movie that I can still recall was called *"The Blob"*, this was a huge mass of jelly like substance that would ooze under doors and even smother people. The squeals of the children seeing the gunk oozing out from the freezer door was chilling itself. After that movie Lorraine recalls us all running home holding hands, not the short way through the paddock to our house but the long way round through the turnstile along the path.

After the fun films the following week we could all pretend to be Tarzan or Jane or play cowboys and Indians in our backyards. I adored the monkey "Cheetah" and dreamt of owning him. Lorraine and I also would play dress-ups and pretend we were Jane Russell and Maureen O'Hara and being swept away by their handsome counterparts, so you can see we have some great memories.

One of the most popular films *"Rock around the Clock"* and the beginning of the Rock and Roll era was another that proved one of the biggest draw cards for the Hall. I don't know whether dances were ever held there in our time but they may have after we moved in 1958. I do know the record of music from the movie was played over and over in our house as by that time mum had purchased our first Radiogram.

I also remember a Hypnotist holding several shows in the town hall where Kevin was invited up on stage with several others and put to sleep. Then they would have us all in fits of laughter as the hypnotist would have them doing such things as thinking they were sitting next to a smelly person or a beautiful girl etc. He also mass hypnotized the audience and I was one person who could not get my hands unclasped when he clicked his fingers and therefore had to be done separately. Harold Raymond a blind man who played his violin beautifully was also another to perform live on stage. Loraine recalls that on the southern side of the hall on the lawns Amateur Hours were sometimes held, these were shows where local people could try their own musical skills out in front of the town's folk. Our father won a prize one time for playing his mouth organ and singing "Galway Bay".

The Hall also was used for immunization programs and X-rays which were done on a mass timetable for the public. The 1954 earthquake did no damage to the hall but the primary school's eastern end on the top story had a crack running down its side.

Opportunity Knocks at Wellington East



Heidi and Laurie Graham of Monteith are about to finish The Hall Café chapter of their life - originally known as the Wellington East Chapel, The Hall Café is up for sale.

"The community hall was built in 1901 by Ngarrindjeri man William McHughes, as a chapel. We understand that Pastor McHughes was a stonemason from Raukkan who worked the land in Wellington East as a farmer and built the Wellington East Chapel as a dedication to his late wife, Sarah," Heidi said.

"Eventually, the chapel became a community hall, before it laid derelict for many years. We've heard lots of reminiscing about dances held in the hall in bygone years," Heidi said. "It's one of the few remaining stone buildings in Wellington East, it's steeped in local folklore and we're so proud that we have saved it."

"We bought the run-down hall in 2010 with the intention of just saving the building and making it our home, but due to the zoning at the time it became our 'tree change' cafe."



Eremophilas at Pangarinda Botanic Garden

Eremophilas are one genus that most of the species don't like our deep sand.

We have found a couple areas of loam where a number of the species are growing reasonably happy. Most are found growing in the wild in heavy clay soils often in depressions.

Eremophila maculata is one that is proving very adaptable in cultivation. A shrub from 1 to 3 metres high and can be as wide. Flowers come in all shades from deep pink, through to reds, a lovely apricot form to pure yellow. Most are spotted on the inside of the tube hence the name maculata.

A very widespread species, growing in the Eastern state and across to Western Australia. Likes full sun, will tolerate dry periods and is frost hardy.

Flowers are often a great for attracting birds.

Upgrades at The Clubs' Home Grounds

The Tailem Bend Football, Cricket, and Netball Clubs have recently received significant funding for facility upgrades at the Clubs' home ground at Jaensch Park. The projects were made possible through grant funding from the Tailem Bend Advanced Group, for which all three Clubs are incredibly grateful.

The grant will allow the Football Club to renovate the current change rooms (*built-in 1934*) and bring them to a standard that would align with modern-day change rooms. These upgrades to the sporting facility have been identified as important and necessary developments for the Tailem Bend Football Club. The project will assist with positive social development, particularly in the area's youth population, and even more specifically to advance female participation in sports.

The Tailem Bend Football Club sees football as an inextricable part of the region's social fabric. For the TBFC to continue to be vibrant and successful into the future, they need facilities that will assist in getting the community to continue to engage with the Club.

Without a doubt, all Clubs should want anyone who visits or participates in their Club to have an enjoyable experience. Taking pride in your facilities also significantly contributes to your Club culture. When all your members, supporters and visitors have respect for your facilities, it becomes a joint effort to contribute and maintain these standards.

Visitors and locals alike will notice a vast facility improvement once completed. TBFC President Clinton Allen said, "the upgrade will provide the Club with a modern facility to use so we can build on our community. The renovations will allow our players/volunteers/visiting teams to complete their roles in a safe and secure environment.

A better facility will clearly state that we value and recognise our volunteers and the community, ensuring the Club exists for many more years. Furthermore, better sports and recreation facilities make it easier for the community to get active and lead healthy lifestyles," said Allen. The grant allocated to the Netball Club will improve the safety of members and visitors who visit Jaensch Park.

The current entrance on granites road poses a significant risk on both game day and during training sessions due to the congestion and overflow of traffic. To achieve improved safety, relocating the main entrance to Second Avenue would benefit the Netball Club and all Clubs and visitors to the facility.

Additionally, the Club will be installing new security fencing and replacing sections of existing fencing that are no longer fit for purpose. This project will improve the current infrastructure by installing gates at the existing memorial gates to close off this entry and also allow alternative entrance or egress in an emergency. This project also addresses new infrastructure by installing new fencing along Second Avenue and new fencing on the newly acquired parcel of land adjoining the courts.

This project will be managed by the Executive Committee of the Tailem Bend Netball Club, which will coordinate removing existing fencing and installing new fencing and gates.

The Cricket Club will use the grant funding to upgrade their cricket nets. This will enable the Club to meet the required outdoor nets standards to accommodate a growing membership. Investing in new cricket nets will enable the club to give its players the best chance of success. Setting up multiple sets of nets will allow team members to practice and demonstrate their bowling and batting abilities. This means the club can identify those players who have the most vital skills so we can further develop their talents. One of the significant advantages of cricket nets is that they reduce the risk of injury. These nets will enable the players to practice without the chance that a stray ball hitting a surrounding building or a spectator.

Regional Hub President Duanne Edwards said, "these upgrades will see our facilities offering an improved, inclusive, and attractive facility to members, visitors, and the wider community. This opportunity will strengthen and support the TB Hub's vision to create a multi-purpose facility".


After 31.5 years of hard and loyal work at Brinkley Station, today's the day that the "Jack of All Trades" closes this chapter in his life.



From the Chamber

Councillors met on Tuesday, 21 February 2023 to consider several key items and reports.

A deputation was received from Pauline Merritt on behalf of the Tailem Bend Cemetery volunteers, putting forward some suggestions to assist in improving weed management at the Tailem Bend Cemetery.

A budget review of the second quarter for 2022/23 was endorsed, along with Council's revised risk management framework.

Members also endorsed the release of the 'Coorong District Council Streetscape Project 30% Master Plan' for community engagement. The document sets out a vision for each of the main streets in Tintinara, Coonalpyn and Tailem Bend. 

SA Police update

South Australia's Murrayland communities are experiencing flooding as a result of a rising Murray River. Obey Road Closure signs.

Drive carefully on roads that have reopened because they may still be drying out. Watch out for temporary speed limits. When Water starts to go down don't drive over roads until the road is open again. Sometimes the road damage is not known until the road is completely dry and has been assessed by the road authority.

Avoid driving on unsealed road shoulders as these may be extremely soft even though the water has subsided. Flood waters can move fast, so never try to drive over roads that have water over them. Lookout for landslides as many road sides will have exposed layers of rocks and soil that could slip. More than half flood related deaths are a result of driving through flood water. Even if it looks calm, no one can predict what flood water will do, or what's happened to the road underneath. Any amount of swift flowing water can sweep away your car, no matter what you drive. It's simply not worth it.


