

Giant crochet Christmas Tree!!

Using the art of crochet, The Tailem Bend Progress Association would like to create a magnificent Christmas tree that will be displayed in one of the local businesses of Tailem Bend.

If you would like to be a part of this fabulous project, all you need to do is to crochet granny squares with these requirements:



ABOVE: Example

Wool - 8ply acrylic

Hook - size :4.5

Square size - 15cms x 15cms

Final row- The last row of each square needs to a dark colour to make joining the squares easier.

All completed squares need to have the loose ends woven in and can be donated into the box at the Tailem Bend Post Office along with your name so we can acknowledge all those who participated.

If you have any spare 8 ply acrylic wool these too can be placed in the donation box at the Tailem Bend Post Office. Donations of granny squares and 8 ply acrylic wool can be made until **September 1st**, so as to allow time to construct the Christmas Tree. Here are some links to YouTubes that will help those who want to learn to crochet a Granny Square. The Tailem Community Centre has had many achievements and last month was no exception.

The Tailem Bend Community Centre has been nominated for two separate awards in the Community Achievement Awards. Nominated for both the Prime Super Community Group of the Year Award, and the Junction Australia Connecting Communities Award.

Tailem Bend Community Coordinator Tammy Shepherd said "It's great".

The centre has been nominated for their tireless efforts from volunteers. The programs and services they run benefit the entire Coorong community form Meningie to Tailem Bend and more.

"We have just appointed a creative writer, who is a volunteer and fills out award nominations, so it is great to see we are hearing back from them so fast." Tammy said. "One thing you don't do at a community centre, because you don't have the time, is to reflect on what you have done. So this allows us to do so."

Tammy did not know about these nominations that have been put forward. "To receive a nomination that I'm not aware of is just beautiful." She said. "These awards come from having such dedicated volunteers, when you look at the whole community across the varied range of groups, you see volunteers are everywhere. They keep everything going. A special mention has to go to the board of management, the professionalism of the services we are delivering is incredible, and not just Tailem Bend but the whole Coorong area."

If the centre is successful in winning the awards they will win \$2000 for first place in each category. Tammy said that amount of money would be incredible.

"It would be lovely to use it to recognise our volunteers, or use it to give volunteers further training, either way it would definitely be used to give to the community." Theu will find out if they are successful at a presentation dinner on Friday, November 25.

Fight to save tennis club (Courtesy of MV Standard)

The Tennis Club has had many problems over the years and the following story will tell one of them, also mentioning some of those who weighed in with support.

More than 750 people put pen to paper for a petition to cancel the planned demolition of the Tailem Bend tennis clubrooms. The Tailem Bend Tennis Club wished to thank the community for supporting the petition, which amassed a significant number of signatures in just 14 days.

"To the service clubs that have offered support, thank you that is so encouraging" club member Pauline Merritt said. "There is a Combined Sporting Complex on the drawing board which the tennis club is excited to relocate when completed. The club is currently in an appeal stage with the Coorong District Council to rescind the motion to demolish the clubhouse, which was passed unanimously on 19th July."

Pauline said the clubhouse floor was affected by white ants and needed repairing but had been treated and has a ten year guarantee, while the 2015/16 asbestos report had no problems 6

"We wish to repair the floor and want a lease to state that we can continue, until such time as the new venue is ready for us to relocate."

She said *"It would be common-sense to anybody that if tennis ceases, it will not start again in five to seven years as stated for the new venue."* Pauline said there was a Tuesday night club that ran 12 months of the year and was joining players from Meningie and Mannum to make up a group of 25 people. She said the courts were also used by a number of other community members and private lessons were often undertaken as well. The club is planning to advertise after school coaching again for juniors in the new school term, said Pauline.

"Anne Howell was the driving force behind this. Anne Howell is the icon of this club and coached the club in the Friday night competition." Pauline said.

Unfortunately we have to hire other clubs to achieve this. The club is seeking donations in the meantime with proceeds going towards the cost of hiring courts to play. *"How lucky are we to live in a small community that cares and has been so supportive with this situation, so please if you need any help for any issues. Talk about it as nothing will be solved without communication."* Pauline said.

Tailem Bend at one stage had 2 tennis clubs, one named the Towns and the other the Railways. Tennis now is played at the oval Hub.



Tailem Bend History

Tailem Bend began as a proclaimed town on July 28th 1887 and over the years has had many debates over the origin of its name, and to this day continues.

The railways began arriving in the town in 1886 with the Inter-colonial line from Nairne to Bordertown due to the eastern states linking to the river trade on the River Murray. Further lines started to appear in 1906 to Pinnaroo and later to Browns Well *(later to Barmera),* Loxton. Yinkanie. Peebinga, and Waikerie, and to the south east taking in

destinations of Mount Gambier, Kingston, Beachport, and Glencoe with these of Mt Gambier, Pinnaroo and Wolseley extending into Victoria.

In 1925 the workshops at Murray Bridge (*Bridgeport*) were transferred to Tailem Bend, some 30 locomotives had been stationed at the Murray Bridge workshops, so workers commuted between the towns on the *"workers train"* 3 times daily (*morning afternoon and night shift*) and so became the service centre for Murray Bridge Division of the South Australian Railways, covering all those areas mentioned earlier.

Housing provided for different trades and operational workers with some 450 employed in its heyday, the fleet of SAR class diesel locomotives were all based at Tailem Bend at one stage. The influence of the displaced migrants in the 1950's caused another building boom in railway housing and the town had a hospital, all forms of businesses, good sporting venues and great service by rail to Adelaide. Children attended the local school or in the 1940's could attend St Joseph's convent school (school closed in 1980"s).

When reaching grade 7 students had to travel on the infamous "school train" (albeit a "Worky train") to attend high school at Murray bridge. Buses eventually replaced the train taking students to school, which markedly decreased absenteeism. Indigenous persons have a large influence in the area and have to this day several sites of significance around Tailem Bend. The town is situated on the banks of the River Murray which flows into Lake Alexandrina some 14 kilometres downstream.



Patient Assistance Transport Scheme (PATS)

Patient Assistance Transport Scheme (PATS) criteria for residents living in Tailem Bend.

PATS is an important initiative that assists regional South Australians to access specialist medical services not available locally.

The Local Health Networks across regional South Australia works hard to provide medical specialist services closer to home for country residents, therefore reducing the need for them to travel out of the region. When they have been unable to secure a local visiting specialist, PATS will then subsidise travel for patients to access their nearest specialist when required to travel over 100 kilometers each way.

PATS distance eligibility is calculated using Google mapping software to accurately measure the shortest distance from the client's residential address to the client's treatment destination. Additional distance incurred by making stops which raise the kilometers travelled are not factored into the distance eligibility calculations. Tailem Bend as a town has no restrictions regarding eligibility. Every claim is calculated for distance from residential address to treatment location, providing the distance travelled is over 100 kilometers.

When claims are calculated within two kilometers of the eligibility criteria, they are automatically escalated to PATS management for review. The route calculation is then investigated for suitability.

PATS can accept a claim up to six months after the specialist appointment, but it is urged that claims documentation is submitted as soon as possible for assessment. Claims can be submitted via post, email PATS@sa.gov.au or online at www.PATS.sa.gov.au.

As a taxpayer funded scheme, PATS needs to ensure that all requirements are met and are in line with the eligibility criteria.

Pangarinda Botanic Garden

Growing at Pangarinda Botanic Garden Eucalyptus rhodantha, also known as Rose Mallee is a 5-metre open and spreading mallee, loving our sandy and dry conditions and is bigger than any I've seen.

The waxy-grey buds nestled between stalkless, heart shaped, grey leaves are ready to drop their long-pointed caps, to expose red flowers for winter flowering.

This Eucalypt is declared rare flora, occurring in the Avon District of Western Australian in only a few areas. In the 1920's a farming family at Watheroo had the foresight, while clearing land to leave the small area of this rare plant.






BOOK REVIEW


