Service people, family, friends and loved ones came together to honour our dedicated servicemen and servicewomen, as the sun rose on Anzac Day at Tailem Bend Memorial for 2023.

President Chris Taylor started the proceedings by acknowledging our custodians of the land and everyone who attended.

The children from Tailem Bend Primary School from Year 3 – 6 had plaques & candles with 21 servicemen and 1 nurse names, all were dedicated WW1 local heroes, the school-children walked to the crosses around the memorial and formed a catafalque guard of honour. These names were read out by Bastion Kidziak and Ella Peterson.

Wreaths were laid by Tailem Bend RSL, Coorong District Council, Tailem Bend Primary School, Unity College, Tailem Bend Community Centre, Tailem Bend Rotary Club, Tailem Bend Hospital and Nick McBride MP & CFS.

This was followed by the Lord's Prayer and the Ode of The Fallen read by Pastor Timothy Minahan. The bugler "Tim Freund" played "The Last Post" before a minute's silence then the Reveille. Ella Peterson then read the Anzac Poem – In Flanders Fields by John McCrae. Bastion & Ella then returned to lead us in the singing of The Australian National Anthem.

Pastor Timothy Minahan then read the Benediction "God grant to the living, grace; to the departed, rest; to the Nation, peace and concord; to us all Your servants the promise of everlasting life, light to guide us on our way, courage to support us, and Your blessing to unite us in service to You our God and this our Country. Amen"

The Changing Face of Tailem Bend #129

This month we look at two extraordinary local identities who have who have achieved much with their skills and volunteering to our community.

A long-time local resident of Tailem Bend, Mr Wally Lewsey did some things during his youth that many youngsters today would not even think about. His experiences included acting as an armed bank guard at 14, hitching rides behind river boats, earning pocket money by rowing workers across the river, and catching a dolphin in the river.

Wally came to Tailem Bend in 1920 with his mother and step – father. They had lived in Naracoorte since Wally was three, but found it was too damp there for a chest complaint he had, and moved to a drier climate.

Tailem Bend was fairly small at that time, as you can well imagine; Wally said last week. The railways had only four or five weatherboard railway cottages and the station master's house. One of those cottages is still standing, near the town crossing. Wally says that, although almost everything else in Tailem Bend had changed, the railway station (built in 1921) is the same as it was then. He said the school, police station and the post office were all built from Murray Bridge sandstone; the rest of the building were constructed from local limestone, which crumbles after about 50 years.

Wally left school at 14 and worked at a local garage for a Mr W G Goyder, a grandson of the surveyor -general who mapped out the line of rainfall which bears his name. Bank's rules in those days stipulated that someone had to sleep on the premises and whenever the manager wanted to go to Adelaide for a weekend, Wally (then 14) slept at the bank with a bank - issue .32 revolver. Occasionally he would row about four miles upstream to see some friends but. Looking for an easy way out, he asked the master of the milk boat if he could hick behind. The master said 'no' but, knowing he could not see behind, Wally used to lasso a bollard on the boat as it went by and hitch a tow anyway. The current was much stronger in those days than it is now, because the barrages had not been built - which accounted for the appearance of a dolphin one day in about 1923 or 1924. It swam around for several weeks, becoming progressively weaker in the unfamiliar fresh water, and developed a mass of sores, until Wally and several friends realised it was dying and 'put it out of its misery.' Wally still remembers the spot where they buried the nine - foot long (92.7-metre) fish.

There was no settlement at Jervois in those days – only five or six houses for irrigation employees, and a camp across the river from Tailem Bend for the men working on the banks. Wally used to row them across to the pub when they finished their weeks work at noon on Saturdays, and row them back at night. The fare was supposed to be sixpence (5 cents) each way, but Wally often collected more than that. Many of the men would say they did not have any small change on the way over, and promised to pay on the way

back. 'By that time' Wally recalled, they were a bit worse for drink, and would spill a few coins in the bottom of the boat while reaching into their pockets. I would often get two schillings (10 or 20 cents) extra out of the boat –a fair bit of money to a lad in those days.

After returning from a six month trip to England for the 1929 scout jamboree, Wally was without a job. He got one in Adelaide, but was laid off at the start of the Great Depression and was lucky to get his job back at the garage at Tailem Bend. Later he worked with GMH in Victoria, spent 5 ½ years in the armed forces during World War 11, and came back to Tailem Bend in 1956. He is probably best remembered for running his own service station for 15 years before retiring in 1978 – and for the tales he can tell of the early days. "The trouble is" he said last week, 'you can never think of them all at once when you're asked'

Sandy Przibilla combines passion for music and art

Sandra Przibilla has a flair and a passion for art, as journalist Jordaine Liddy discovered upon chatting with the Tailem Bend woman. Dancing, Swimming, teaching, Calisthenics, painting, pottery, singing, playing piano and being a mother are some of the many passions that make Sandra 'Sandy' Przibilla smile. She is a lady of many talents and is known by the Tailem Bend community as energetic and enthusiastic.

"I love being involved in things and people" Sandy said. Sandy loves music and it shows throughout her home, which features many beautiful music art works and figures. She also has many "county" artworks of her own that look as though they should be behind glass in an art gallery. "I love my art," Sandy said. There is something about it that I really enjoy.' Sandy passed her artistic abilities on to her daughters who also spend a lot of their time trying out different ideas and producing amazing pieces of work.

Sandy was born in Lameroo on December 4, 1961. She spent her entire childhood there attending Lameroo Area School. As a child Sandy loved playing netball, swimming, jazz ballet, calisthenics, and experimenting with different types of art. She tried drawing, leatherwork, pottery and painting and had quite a talent in each of these four aspects. Swimming was also one of her passions. Swimming 304 laps of the Lameroo pool when she was only 13 to raise money for the Lameroo Swimming Club. Sandy completed most of her swimming certificates at Lameroo and then came to Murray Bridge to earn her award of merit to qualify her as a swimming teacher. She then entered into a trainee certificate of swimming with the Education Department and taught for three years at Lameroo and then Woodside. Sandy attended Prides Business College in Adelaide for six months until she was able to get into art school.

Studying printing, ceramics, and drawing, she stayed there for one and a half years Sandy then moved to Lenswood where she gave birth to her two daughters, who attended Lenswood Primary School. Sandy soon became involved with the primary school where she ended up holding concerts at the end of each year, where she would get teachers, parents, friends and family member in the plays.

She was also involved with the creation of Come out Week murals. Singing has always been a favourite past – time of Sandy's, performing songs at many of her family and friends birthdays, including her mother 60th birthday, just before she passed away in 1995.

Sandy decided to begin teaching Line Dancing at Lobethal, Mount Barker, Murray Bridge, Balhannah and Tailem Bend, where she is teaching it now. She moved to Tailem Bend with her family in 2001 after living in Balhannah for two years. Since living in Tailem Bend Sandy has continued her art and has many successes.

She won the Art of Community Project for the Coorong Good Food on the Road program in 2004, after entering an unusual piece of art depicting a fish swimming though an apple. Sandy also won the champion adult art award at the Mount Barker Show for one of her unique artworks where she uses old galvanised iron for the backdrop and bits and pieces of nature to create a picture.

Sandy is now heavily involved with the Tailem Bend Music Hall where she produces many musicals alongside her husband Craig. "It is really nice, all the people are really friendly there and just feels life home," Sandy said the things she valued most were family, love and happiness.

History Month Exhibition Now Open!

Friday 31st March 2023 was a special day in the calendar of the Tailem Bend Historians Association Inc. and our community. It was a day of celebration for the Opening of the "The Colonial Days of East Wellington" Exhibition in the Coorong District Council Chambers gallery.

Approximately 45 people attended including invited guests, the Mayor and members of Council, Historian Association members and friends of the community. Some had travelled from Adelaide to attend the opening.

As part of this year's South Australian History Festival, the Exhibition is a comprehensive display of researched articles, photographs and memorabilia reflecting the early settlement of East Wellington, outlining the Special Surveys of 1839, development of the ferry crossing and the gold escorts. It is open to the public and can be viewed in the Coorong Gallery from 1st April until 24th May during Council office hours. Entry is free. Advertising has been Statewide in the events program for the State History Festival with the theme 'Wonder' as its catchword – this word being aptly descriptive in inviting us to wonder at the achievements of those who lived here before us, the struggles they faced and the challenges they overcame.

The Opening Ceremony commenced at 10.30 am with Patsy Crabb, Volunteer Management Officer from Coorong District Council, acting as MC for the program. She extended a Welcome to everyone and gave an Acknowledgment of Country. The Mayor, Mr. Paul Simmons, spoke of how an Exhibition such as this gives the opportunity to share forgotten stories with new generations and to show how our own communities have grown and developed over time. He made reference to the historical and cultural significance of the East Wellington settlement, the home of the Ngarrindjeri for thousands of years and also referenced the European settlement in this area in the 1800's which saw Wellington become a primary location for River Murray crossings and a major transport stopover point. Currently we know of Wellington East as a flourishing township - and one of the fastest growing riverfront townships in the Region.

Local identity, Elizabeth Nicholls, Historian, Researcher and Author of the recently published "East Wellington Cemetery" book gave an informative overview of the preparation involved and topics covered on display in this Exhibition. Her outstanding knowledge, time and detailed research about East Wellington settlement is gratefully acknowledged by the Historians Association and it was invaluable in going ahead with this Exhibition.

Mr. Clem Mason was invited to Open the Exhibition and also to speak. He is a well-known local identity who owns dairy property in the Region as well as having been involved in Environmental issues regarding the Murray and Coorong. His family has lived in the area for many generations and Clem's extensive knowledge of his past family history as well as his local understanding of the East Wellington area provided those attending with a very interesting and informative talk as well as a reminder to embrace change in a sensibly sustainable manner.

Angie Tomkinson, Secretary of the Historians Association, briefly addressed the gathering. She had entered into the spirit of the times by dressing in 'colonial costume' as she took the opportunity to thank those who had contributed in any way to the Exhibition.

The Historians say 'Thank You' to Coorong Council for providing morning tea and also the Gallery as a venue for the Exhibition. Following a successful time of community celebration, opportunity was given to those attending to view and enjoy the "The Colonial Days of East Wellington" Exhibition.

Celebrate the South Australian History Festival and learn all about the townships early history and development at Mr Parker's Wonders, from 11am to 3pm on Saturday 6 and Sunday 7 May, at the Round House in Murray Bridge.

The Rural City of Murray Bridge Mayor Wayne Thorley said locals and visitors would all find a treasure trove of wonders and curiosities at the event.

"It's amazing how everything old becomes new again when you're learning about the stories and long forgotten details for the first time," he said.

"The Round House is an historic building, central to an incredible story about our past.

"What better way to enjoy a weekend than immersing yourself in our local history with a guided tour of the building, some freshly wood fired pizza, gin tasting and music on the lawns overlooking the river with friends?"

Mr Parker's Wonders celebrates local historical figure Mr Henry Parker and the pivotal role he played in the development of river and rail transport in the colony of South Australia, during the early growth of Murray Bridge.

Mr Parker supervised the construction of the Murray bridge and is credited with the commissioning the beautiful stone Round House overlooking the construction works.

Completed in 1876 and built of the same honey yellow sandstone as the bridge supports, the hexagonal shaped House was intended originally as a bridge keeper's residence.

It became an important community centrepiece and enjoyed incarnations over the years as a school, post office, church and Council chamber, before being restored to former glory as the historical showpiece it is today.

The iconic Round House is perched high above the bridge with spectacular sweeping views of the Murray River.

Soak up the historical displays, archival photos and maps curated within, before taking a special History Month tour of the Round House between 11am and 3pm every Wednesday during May.

The Round House is open 11am to 3pm Wednesday to Friday and Sunday, and 8.30am to 11am Saturdays.

Doris Phelps Celebrated Her 100th Birthday

Doris was born in the Barossa Valley, where she lived for most of the first three decades of her life (apart from a couple of years in Sydney).

Doris married Bob towards the end of World War 2 when the troops were recalled from the Middle East. When the war was over Bob was offered his old job back in Sydney, but after some time they decided to return to the Barossa Valley.

When Return Servicemen's Blocks became available Bob and Doris applied for one and moved to Loxton to live. Bob and Doris worked as orchardists until retirement when Bob turned 60. Bob only lived for three more years, but Doris stayed in Loxton for a further 30 years. Doris now lives at Wellington East. Without realising it she has inspired many people over her 10 decades.

Doris always held positions of office at the welfare/parent clubs at her children's schools. She was instrumental in establishing a Special School in the Riverland for children who were not accepted at the state schools, and later, a sheltered workshop in the area. She worked hard, not for the accolades, but to make things better for her family. Doris has always had a love of gardening, both flowers and home-grown vegetables. She was a great supporter of the annual Agricultural and Horticultural Show.

Doris has been president of the Callistemon Society and has Life Membership of the Society for Growing Australian Plants. She has been on many field trips. She is respected for her knowledge and consulted about suitable species for town plantings. She is sharing of her time and knowledge.

When Doris was in her 70s she undertook a Community Fitness training course, having to attend some practical sessions in Adelaide. Then she held a weekly group for ladies in Loxton for a donation which she then gave to the RSL for the use of the hall. Doris played Lawn Bowls, made friends with younger people at Line Dancing, and enjoyed her choir singing.

Doris is a member of Legacy Widows and was an inaugural member of Ladies Probus in Loxton, holding positions of office in both groups. Doris is an accomplished public speaker and also a publisher author. She has written two books about the money system in Australia to try to facilitate change and make things better for future generations.

Over the years Doris has kept comprehensive diaries and family letters, documents and newspaper cuttings. A generational passing down of history. She has gifted her Family her Life History in book form, which is very precious.

With the many changes that Doris has observed over her 100 year and 5 generations, she remains apparently accepting and non-judgemental of people in today's world.

Doris enjoyed her 100th birthday afternoon tea on Easter Monday with approximately 90 family and friends at the Murray Bridge RSL Club. She received a presentation from Legacy. She danced with her great-grand-daughters and great-greatgrand-daughter. She sang over the microphone. Oh, and she did some book-signings.


BOOK REVIEW

ROAD SAFETY TIPS FOR THE COMING WINTER

It is a good idea to drive slowly and carefully in general, but travelling at high speeds is even more dangerous during winter. Wet, icy roads can greatly impact your car's ability to slow down. Keep an appropriate following distance between yourself and the vehicle in front of you.

Avoid hazards by braking gradually before you reach corners. Leave early and allow yourself extra time to reach your destination so you will not be inclined to rush. Remember that the unstable weather conditions can make for increased risk on the roads.

Avoid sudden braking and turning

In winter there is a danger of black ice on the road. This is a thin layer of ice on the road's surface that is difficult to detect. Avoid making any sharp turns or braking suddenly as this could cause

your car to slide on the ice. If your car does go into a skid, ease pressure on the accelerator and avoid braking too heavily which will further lock up your tyres. If the back wheels of your car slide on the ice, avoid turning your wheel too sharply which can make the problem worse. Prevent sliding by braking gradually before you reach corners, and maintaining slower speeds.

Check your vehicle before departing

Before you begin your journey, it is a good idea to check your car and make sure everything is functioning. Check the tread in your tyres, and add extra pressure if required. The older the tyres the more likely they will be to struggle on icy roads. Ensure your car is fitted with a spare tyre, and thoroughly clear any snow and ice off your car before driving. Make sure you have plenty of fuel in case any hazards on the road cause delays.
