## Local Racer Lets the Dirt Fly!

### Henry is the youngest racer on team Brumfield Racing New Generation, a grassroots family racing team that includes his father Darren and is based in Tailem Bend.

Junior Sedans are a Speedway Class for young and upcoming racers with drivers eligible to compete from 10yrs and up to 17yrs. Rookies race in the **"New Stars"** class with the more experienced drivers progressing to the "Top Stars" or **"All Stars"** as it is now called.

Local Junior Sedan driver Henry Brumfield started his racing career in Dirt Midget Karts when he was 5yrs old before progressing into Rookie Karts as a 7yr old. Henry made the move to Sedan racing when he was 10yrs old following the footsteps of his Speedway Street Stock Racer father Darren. He showed great improvement throughout his first season and won his first heat race and feature race on the same night just before his 11th Birthday. Henry received Rookie of the Year from the Murray Bridge Sporting Car Club & Motorcycle Club Inc. and also received 3rd highest points for the New Stars.

Henry was moved up into the Top Stars division early in his second year after a couple of early feature wins at Murray Bridge where both the New Stars and Top Stars were put together due to low numbers. It was a huge season where he travelled to as many of the SA tracks as he could gaining experience and working on his racing craft. He Achieved many wins and podium finishes over the season as well as receiving Top Stars 3rd in points for both Murray Bridge and the SDA. The SDA (*Speedway Drivers Association*) members accumulate points from every SA Speedway track that they race at. Henry also came away with the SDA Junior Sedans Most Improved and Junior Sedans best Presented.

## The Changing Face of Tailem Bend #132

A long-running series submitted by Peter Connolly.

### <u>Past Memories from</u> Brian Jaensch - Tailem Bend

Brian Jaensch was born in Tailem Bend on April 16, 1934, to parents Jack and Viola Jaensch. He has a younger brother, Bevan. He married Shirley on April 12, 1958 at Tumby Bay. Together they had two sons – Steven and Gary – and a daughter Tanya. They have six grandchildren.

**SCHOOL:** My parents lived on a farm at Moorlands. I went to primary at Moorlands, we had a table and any- where between seven and 10 pupils. We had one school teacher there who taught all grades. The school was held in the Moorlands Institute, we used to have to stack all the desks and stuff away if they had a dance or something on Saturday night. Then for my secondary education, I went to Adelaide and boarded at Thebarton Technical High.

**SPORT:** Tennis was really the only sport I played, I loved tennis, and I must say I didn't play a bad sort of game. I played until I was about 60.We played tennis in basically every place we went. We used to play night tennis in Alice Springs and we went up to Tennant Creek to play for a cup. We stopped at peoples places for the few nights we were up there and that was good fun. We broke the windscreen going back, and we all started piling on all our jumpers and putting on our dressing gowns on for a bit of warmth.

**ENERTAINMENT:** We used get a lot of people playing cards on Saturday night. We'd often go to someone's place and play cards until midnight. At Broken Hill, we used to do a bit of 10 – pin bowling.

**CLOTHES:** We had a school uniform when I went to high school. For home and around the place we still had reasonable clothes, we had no jeans in those days.

**WORK:** All my working life I was with Elders, the stock agents. I started work soon after I finished school and I joined the Adelaide office and worked there for about three years, before they decided to shift me to the country branches. I went to National Service at 18 at Woodside. Within a week of finishing up, Elders put me on a plane to Cummins for my first assignment. I had about 12 months there before I went to Tumby Bay and then shifted to Pt Lincoln. After a couple of years at Pt Lincoln, I got appointed to Broken Hill. Then Shirley and I got married and she moved up here and we had another four years before they shifted me to Alice Springs, we had four years there and it was fantastic. Then we moved to Kapunda for three years, then the next move was back to Tailem Bend.

**FOOD:** Being the Depression, it was tough for the blokes on the land in terms of being able to afford anything flash. We always had our own meat, we would kill a pig and sheep every now and again. We'd also have rabbits on the farm, there were lots of them around and it was cheap. I've always liked steak and I really like sausages and whatever we decide to have with them.

**BEST ADVICE:** Keep out of the way of drugs but also listen to your parents.

**GREATEST ACHIEVEMENT:** I've enjoyed my employment all the way through and was happy at that.

**BEST HOLIDAY:** One weekend we went down with a mate to AYERS Rock on his light aircraft. He flew us down there, then flew us around the rock and we landed at the hotel for a nice lunch, we climbed up and down the rock, then we took off we flew around the Olgas.

One annual leave we drove to Darwin for a trip for about 10 days. They were both great trips. We've also done a few overseas trips since our retirement. We went to New Zealand in "96", we visited both islands and I really enjoyed that. About nine months later we took off with a group and toured around America and Canada. We also visited Europe for 10 weeks, where we visited 16 countries. M/V Standard 2015

### Tailem Bend Historians Launch Plan

The Tailem Bend Historians (TBH) have met regularly over the last six months at the Tailem Bend Library and are about to launch their plans to preserve the towns local and imagery documentation and associated artefacts.

Starting from humble beginnings as a Tailem Bend Historic Rail Trail tasking group, the Coorong District Council's Anna Del Rio with Tailem Bend's Geraldine Dickson, Don Green, Peter and Bob Connolly have witnessed the. TBH to grow to 10 passionate volunteers.

Working closely with the Tailem Info Station, the District Council and other groups, the TBH have been able to bring the town's historic imagery together into one data file.

With multiple backups, the town's irreplaceable images have been collected and stored by the TBH, Angie Tomkinson and Glenn Power both of Tailem Bend, in an easily accessible digital format with images grouped and named to maximise online searching results on the propose revised Tailem Bend Library website.

We started with over 15,500 images, but after removing duplications from years of copying and sharing from various sources, we now have a strong bank of about 5,500 historic digital images Glenn said.

"I love doing this work, I often have a chuckle as I come across yet another great shot, the collection is remarkable, I can't wait to see them all on the library website for all to see and share."

Glenn and Angie hope see the collection continually grow with the occasional drop in at the library and a proposed annual TBH Image Road Show, possibly held each year at the town's renowned Tailem Bend Primary School Fair.

## PARTNERSHIP WITH SECOND BITE AND COLES



We are thrilled to share that our collaboration with Second Bite and Coles has been progressing excellently! Thanks to their support, we have been receiving a consistent supply of bread every Tuesday, Friday, and occasionally on Saturday. It has been an incredible effort, but we have

encountered a few challenges in organising pickups from Murray Bridge.

However, we want to express our deepest gratitude to the amazing Coles staff members who have gone above and beyond to help with deliveries. Their dedication has made a significant difference in our mission to provide for those in need. Given the success and increasing demand for this initiative our local Mayor, Paul Simmons, has generously approved one of his staff members to collect the bread on their way to work. We are truly fortunate to have such incredible support from our community.

While the donation amounts haven't met our initial expectations to sustain this project, we remain passionate about continuing and supporting those who rely on us. We sincerely hope that those who have the capacity to donate will consider doing so, as every contribution matters. Money donated is used to support people in need and expand community service options for people in the Murraylands. *Take what you need, give what you can.* 

Since we began this project on April 18th, 2023, eleven weeks ago, we have received a staggering total of 2,290kgs of bread and bakery goods, along with 52kg of vegetables and 13kg of fruit from Coles and Bakers Delight. Estimated retail value \$8,015. In terms of monetary donations, we have received \$1,248.65 so far, alongside numerous donations of goods. On average, this equates to approximately 54 cents in donations per kilogram. To give you an example, one loaf of bread or a pack of six rolls received an average donation of 18 cents. When factoring in the staff time required to coordinate, unpack boxes, and enter data, we realize that while this service is incredibly needed, it's not sustainable without further assistance.

That's why we're reaching out to our amazing community for help. We are seeking dedicated volunteers who are willing to commit their time to support this much-needed service. ## Jervois Couple Plans for Everyone's got an Olly

A Jervois couple hope to make their café and farm into a learning centre for young people with autism.

Lisa and Darren Henley's Jervois café and farm, Everyone's Got an Olly, has already proven popular since it opened but they hope to turn it into something more.

The couple wish to expand the premises into somewhere young people can grow through interacting with animals. The Henleys' daughter, Olly, was diagnosed with dyslexia at the age of 11 and autism at the age of 13, and continues to battle mental health issues as an adult.

The parents of three children, who had been living in Adelaide, wanted to find a way to help Olly get through her depression and help like-minded teenagers. So the Henleys sold their Adelaide home and moved to Jervois in December 2021, into an old dairy with 65 acres of space.

The Henleys have assembled a fine collection of farm animals on their property, and opened a coffee and food van in February this year to drive forward their idea for a welcoming space for youth.

The Henleys' goal is to keep young people, particularly those with autism, out of hospitals; and to give them the freedom to express themselves and develop their confidence and life skills.

Customers at the café can already have barista-made coffee and hot food with Shetland ponies only metres away, but the concept is set to expand, with the Henleys planning to convert their milking shed into a classroom.

"We can make lunch for the students, and they can interact with the animals; we'll have ducks and chickens wandering around them," Ms Henley said.



Ms Henley said that as a high percentage of children with autism had mental health issues, she hoped that Everyone's Got an Olly could support youth with autism to improve their mental health and social skills. According to Ms Henley, one way to do this is through animals.

"There are stories where kids can't talk to humans, but there's eye contact with animals - one might find contact with horses, or another might find contact with a chicken," she said.

Some of the animals that are at the farm include chickens. goats, sheep, and alpacas named John, George, Paul and Ringo - because Mr Henley is a big Beatles fan.

### There's also a turkey called Christmas. Why Christmas?

### "Because he'll be Christmas in July if he doesn't behave," Ms Henley joked.

## After 40 years, it's curtains for TB Music Hall

Once a year, almost every year since 1983, the ordinary folks you might see around Tailem Bend have become stars

of the stage: divas and dancers and comedians. For a couple of weekends in August, anyone can be anyone.

Tailem Bend Music Hall has never been professional, but it has always been magical. It was never meant to make a profit, though it has made hundreds of thousands of dollars for Tailem Bend Rotary Club projects, including upgrades to the town hall it always seems to fill.

It was meant to bring a community together through song and dance, and for 40 years it has done just that. But when the curtain closes and the lights fade on August 12, that will be the end of that.

For Sandy Przibilla and the other volunteers who pull the show together every year, the job has got to be a bit much. It takes a lot to plan a production, find a cast, source the music, choreograph the dances, organise the ticketing and promotion, then work through months of rehearsals and show weekends.

Almost a year ago, as 2022 came and went without a Music Hall being staged, Ms Przibilla announced that this year's show would have to be the last. So, on Tuesday night, inside the darkened Tailem Bend Town Hall, rainbow-coloured lights twirled around smiling, laughing dancers on stage, lyric sheets in their hands.

To one side, members of a three-piece band rifled through sheet music in the dark. They raced through one chorus after another, pulling together 40 years of memories into a show that will surely be long remembered.

Joyce Medlow was in the audience for the very first Music Hall, joined the cast for the second, and will make a final appearance on stage this year.

*"It's a sad thing, but at my age it's hard work now," she said. "I just wanted to be part of the finish – a little trip down memory lane."* 

Music Hall had brought her great joy over the years, she said, reminiscing about Violet and Daisy, the comedy act she and Lyn Simcock used to present; the Holden rims formerly used as pulleys for the curtains; and a baby Narelle Blacket sleeping in a bassinette at the side of the stage.

Darren Gurney joined the Music Hall cast in 1992, after electrician Les Scott heard him singing on a building site and invited him to come along.

"I think we've had a good run," he said. "It's really hard now to get it all together ... a huge effort for a small amount of people. "I'd rather finish on a high note and go out with a big bang."

He would miss the camaraderie, he said, the friendships formed – including those he had found with Noel Kneebone, Brenton Ahrns, Anthony Hodgen and Neil Chapman, the other members of the band Mallee Blue, who went on to earn airplay on SA FM during the 1990s.

"Music Hall has a good way of getting people confidence, getting people in the community to have a go," he said. "A lot of people were shy, reserved, but you get them up on stage, get them in the chorus, get them dancing or even just standing there. "(Music Hall) means confidence, entertaining and giving back to the community."

Mike Bristow can trace his success with the band Arkhive over the past 20 years back to Tailem Bend Music Hall, too.

"For me, personally, I wouldn't have been a public speaker or done anything like that (without Music Hall)," he said. "I've got confidence from this: I can do this." He had also experienced the joy of watching other, younger cast members join in, "seeing them grow and hearing their voices come out".

Ms Przibilla's journey started the same way: she had been a shy, quiet singer at Lameroo, gazing at her feet, but her late partner got her involved in 2000. She painted part of the backdrop in that past year, but went on to produce segments and eventually direct the whole show. She watched on on Tuesday night as performers bopped around the stage, singing the words to a Daddy Cool song: "good old eagle rock is here to stay".

After 40 years, Tailem Bend Music Hall might not be here to stay, but its impact will stick around for a lifetime.

## **Clash with Pet Turns Life Upside Down**

Kerrie McDonald's life changed in May 2018, after an unlikely encounter with her pet lamb landed her in a coma with a rare flesh-eating bacterial infection. The altercation with the lamb has left Kerrie with two missing limbs, her right leg from the hip and part of her left leg from the knee.

Kerrie cannot recall all the details of the accident, but she can remember loading a trailer of sheep, and a pet lamb jumping from the trailer and running at full speed, colliding with her right leg, just above the knee.

"It didn't even hurt, I was a little sore, but I just kept working - then it drastically went downhill, and I ended up with Necrotizing fasciitis." "It's a rare flesh-eating bacterial infection that spreads quickly through the body and can cause death." "I was very sick, it only took a few days, and if it wasn't for Bernie at the Tailem Bend Hospital, I would have died," Kerrie said.

"I was rushed to the RAH, where doctors put me into an induced coma for eight weeks – they did a wonderful job of keeping me alive, however, they had no choice but to amputate my right leg. I then lost two toes from my left foot, and many bits and pieces of veins, muscles, and digits," Kerrie said.

Born in Kingston, as a small child, Kerrie moved with her family to Mount Gambier and after leaving school, began working in the local Pharmacy before moving to the Solomon Islands.

"One day, I jokingly asked my boss's mate, Ted Williams, who owned a Pharmacy in Penola and one in the Solomon Islands, if there was any chance of getting a job in the Solomons?" Kerrie said. Ted replied straight up, "Yep you can start tomorrow if you like."

Kerrie had always wanted to travel, and her primary goal was to get the travelling bug out of her system before taking on university studies and becoming a teacher.

After a few years of island hopping, Kerrie moved back from Honiara to Australia, settling in Sydney for a year. Upon some advice from a friend, she decided to enrol in an Early Childhood Degree, which saw her transfer to James Cook University in Townsville, Far North Queensland. Securing her first teaching position back in Mt Gambier, Kerrie worked in everything from kindergartens to teaching at TAFE, during her 20-year career.

"I was a Junior Primary School teacher at North Gambier for a long time before becoming the Principal of a New Arrivals Program for refugees arriving from Miramar/Burma and the Democratic Republic of Congo," Kerrie said. Kerrie's main and closest support is Kym, her partner of ten years.

"After meeting my partner Kym, yabbying in the middle of nowhere at Cockatoo Lake, which is just outside Naracoorte, I moved to Wellington to a small farm. From our new home base, I would travel to Oakbank Area School, where I worked with children from the Inverbrackie Detention Centre. I then worked at the Strathalbyn R-6 Campus, and the TAFE campus in Murray Bridge," Kerrie said.

"Everything changed after my trauma, the National Disability Insurance Scheme allocated me a Support Coordinator and I was so lucky I found Genuine Support Services Australia, as my preferred NDIS provider." "They had just started up and I recall I was their twentieth client – I am so impressed with their caring and professional support," Kerrie said.

"GSSA really cares and provides all the personal support I need." "Transport is my main issue, and as I now have my driving licence back, I cannot wait until I have the hand controls fitted to my car. For now, my Support Worker drives me to the gym in Murray Bridge, two to three times a week. Donna's team at Inner Soul is just brilliant and my physiotherapist, Mark Zadow, is outstanding."

"There's always a lot of driving - back and forth through the Murraylands, all over the place really. I have medical appointments everywhere and I love watching my cousins' children at their SAPSASA activities in Adelaide."

"Once a month I catch up with my friend Dianne from Mount Gambier, for lunch in Hahndorf or Mount Barker, but the most enjoyable day of the week for me is Mondays with my horse Bella and Support Worker, Julie from GSSA." "I'm finally back in the saddle thanks to the Riding Patch in Strathalbyn, Kathy is an amazing lady – an Angel." "Holly from Genuine Support helps me with a little in-home care, mainly cleaning."

Kerrie says that despite her disability, her quest for independence keeps her remarkably busy. *"I don't get much of a chance to do a lot in the community, although there's a horse arena opening up soon down the road, which I hope to be involved with,"* Kerrie said.

"Thanks to all the support I receive, I have not needed any high-intensity help, but I do love my gardening – unfortunately though, my Gopher loves running over plants." "I do not qualify for any NDIS respite, but I am sure Kym could do with a rest on occasions."

"I dream of one day riding again with my friends on the Fleurieu Peninsula, I used to trail ride regularly near Victor Harbor." Relationships mean a great deal to Kerrie, and it is those, that keep her moving forward.

"There is no doubt, that it is my friends and family who keep me going - I would be lost without Kym, Mum, Bella, my Border Collie, Poppy, and my funny Cavoodle, Oakley," Kerrie said. "It seems that I'm always doing something, but I consciously try to make time every day to maintain my relationships – it's so important to me," Kerrie said.

Kerrie continues to focus on improving her horse-riding skills but also knows that life will change course once the NDIS approves the hand controls for her car. Kerrie is also extremely excited about giving lessons to the staff at Genuine Support Services Australia, tutoring them in commercial writing and report writing.

Items of note considered by Coorong District Council during its July Council meeting included granting a 21-year lease to Coorong Cottage Industries Inc. over a portion of land at Lots 190 & 191, 14 Princes Highway, Meningie.

## Road users should be aware of heavy vehicle manoeuvrability and adapt their driving behaviour accordingly.

**Slow moving vehicles,** including cyclists and large agricultural machinery, such as tractors and harvesters, may be encountered on country roads.

**Remember to:** overtake agricultural vehicles at slow speeds as they often swerve when approaching roadside posts or turning in to a property. Travel carefully when overtaking, cornering or driving over the crest of a hill – a slow vehicle may be on or entering the road in front of you. Many trucks carry loads that could be dangerous either through fire, explosion, corrosion or radioactivity. Information about what is being carried is indicated on the vehicle's emergency information panels.

#### Road users should be aware of heavy vehicle manoeuvrability and adapt their driving behaviour accordingly.

**Overtaking lanes** are provided on some rural highways, in particular the Dukes Highway (*A8*), National Highway (*A1*) between Port Wakefield and Port Augusta and the Sturt Highway (*A20*). They give drivers of faster vehicles the opportunity to safely pass slower moving vehicles.

When in an overtaking lane, you must: Always use the left lane, unless you are overtaking. At the end of an overtaking lane, indicate clearly that you intend to move into the other lane, giving way to any overtaking vehicle in that other lane

When changing lanes at any time, give other road users sufficient warning by indicating clearly and giving way to vehicles in the other lane.

#### Stopping distances.

Braking distance is the distance travelled by the vehicle once the brakes have been applied. This distance is much greater for heavy vehicles, including buses, due to their additional weight.

Keeping clear of heavy vehicles that are stopping will help prevent crashes.

Take extra care when you enter a road or change lanes in front of a heavy vehicle. Leave plenty of road space, as their additional weight also requires greater slowing distance.
