New Partnership with Murray Bridge News!

A partnership with Murray Bridge News will help Tailem Topics better meet locals' information needs. Under the deal, local photographer Glenn Power will serve as a correspondent for both Murray Bridge News and Tailem Topics.

Murray Bridge News will commission him to write regular stories about what's happening in Tailem Bend and surrounding communities each month. Those stories will be published by Murray Bridge News first, giving locals access to timely local news online and in a free weekly email edition

Tailem Topics editor Josephine McGrath may then, at her discretion, choose to include any such stories in her next print edition, making a wider range of local stories available to all. The Topics will still be 100 per cent owned and operated by the progress association.

The partnership came together after a reader survey prompted managing editor Peri Strathearn to reflect on how Murray Bridge News might better serve Tailem Bend and nearby townships.

"We didn't want to come in over the top of the Topics, which have always done a great job of keeping the community informed," he said. "We're not in competition, after all, since they're in print and we're online.

"I hope this investment will help Jo more easily fill the pages of the Topics each month, and – if locals are willing to support Murray Bridge News with their subscriptions and advertising – that it will help sustain the Murraylands' independent local news service.

"If the model works, Murray Bridge News could consider trying something similar in other communities."

Ms McGrath described the partnership as a step forward in the Topics' quest to be entertaining and informative for the community.

"It's an opportunity for us to work with like-minded individuals who can provide top-quality editorials and images on local events which might otherwise be missed," she said. "It (also) gives me a safety net ... in case I don't get enough content, because I like to do 32 pages each month."

Tailem Bend Day

Article and photo submitted by Glenn Power. - Tailem Bend was proclaimed on 28/7/1887



Tailem Bend's proud history: Prior to European settlement the area was inhabited by the Ngarrindjeri people. They made bark and reed canoes, and lived on the fish and animals residing beside the river. Following Captain Charles Sturt, the whole area along the Murray was opened up by overlanders who moved sheep and cattle across the land. By the 1840s there was a ferry across the Murray River at Wellington which meant that the more difficult terrain, particularly the high cliffs, around Tailem Bend were overlooked in the development of the riverbank.

In 1884 while laying the mainline through to the eastern state of Victoria, the track laying gang set up camp amongst some native pine trees and naming that particular site 'Pine Camp' from then on the local township began to grow. The name Tailem Bend came from the Aboriginal name for this part of the river called 'Thelum Ki' which means bent water, and over the years has had many debates over the origin of it'.



Meanwhile, the Murray Bridge team of Ian Oates, Jim Freak, Alan Kennedy and Don Coulter was a beaten semi-finalist in the State fours.

Donna is on track for the world

When Donna Jaensch travels to Finland in August, she will be hoping to pull off another gold medal in what will be her second attempt, at the World Junior Powerlifting Championships.

Last year, when the titles were held in India, in 1995, the 22yr old won a gold medal for her 180kg deadlift broke two Australian records and placed fifth overall in her 75kg class. Her efforts earnted her a personal invitation to attend this year's event, at Vaassa in Finland, from August 7 to 11, 1996, from the president of the International Powerlifting Association.

This year her last as a junior competitor, has made her hungrier for success. A training schedule hampered by the fact she has to train without her coach will be coupled with a hectic fundraising drive to help raise \$7000 needed for the trip. She said although a small subsidy was offered by the Australian Sports Commission, on their return from the championships, all other costs had to be borne by the athletes before departing.

Donna believes the \$5000 raised last year helped her achieve her success and is hoping for the same support again this year.

"It wouldn't have been achieved if not the support of local business and family and friends." She said of her gold medal last year. "Hopefully, because of my results last year, I'll get a little more support this year. I'm going to go in and give it my best shot – and hopefully, I'll bring more than one medal home."

Fundraising began at Easter with a raffle and will continue with a trading table in Bridge Street in May. Donna trains three days a week for up to two hours at a time. "I'm working hard and intense on my deadlift because I won gold last year, and I want to repeat that." I'll have a good crack at the world deadlift record."

Other Murray Bridge lifters, Terry Hunter and Daniel Hunter, are also hoping for selection to attend the world titles and Kevin Conway is vying for a coaching position with the junior team.

We would like to recognise the work undertaken by our nearly 200 personnel from Australia and New Zealand emergency service who assisted on the frontline, logistics, public information and incident management while deployed in Canada.

They have been able to assist in difficult conditions, providing relief to exhausted fire crews. As of July 19, 4,329 fires had burned 11,140,735 hectares (27,529,356 acres), more than three percent of the entire forest area of Canada. Of the 888 active wildfires, 554 were deemed "out of control.

Our thoughts are with the 3 people that have lost their lives and the 155.856 people that have had to evacuate and leave their homes.

A big **CONGRATULATIONS** to our CFS Cadets who on the 9th of March competed against 4 other teams from Mannum, Morgen and Bomera in the cadet championships and placed 2nd overall and 2 of our cadets helping out the Bomera team making their day possible. Animal Management Plan Open for Community Comment

MEDIA RELEASE

Coorong residents and ratepayers are invited to view and provide comment on Coorong District Council's draft 2024-2029 Animal Management Plan, which is now open for consultation.

Under legislation, Council is required to prepare a plan relating to the management of cats and dogs across the district and it must include provisions for off leash parks where dogs may be exercised off leash and for parks where dogs must be under effective control by means of physical restraint and may include provisions for parks where dogs are prohibited.

The 2024-2029 Animal Management Plan shall guide animal management at a strategic level with decisions undertaken by the Coorong District Council over the next 5 years. The Plan's intent is to promote and facilitate responsible ownership of dogs and cats, to meet the needs of pets and their owners while respecting the rights of other members of the community and protecting the environment.

Public consultation on the 2024-2029 Animal Management Plan is now open and will close at 5pm on Friday, 29 September 2023.



Coorong District Council Offering a Piece of Railway History

MEDIA RELEASE

Rail enthusiasts, historians and collectors will have the chance to secure a piece of railway history as carriages located at Tailem Bend will soon be on offer by tender in the coming months.

Coorong District Council intends to dispose of six (6) railway carriages referred to as the Accident Train and consisting of a range of both flat open-sided and enclosed carriages. This offering will be a great opportunity for individuals, groups or organisations wishing to secure a piece of rail history for restoration or use as a static display.

Before the tender commences, Coorong District Council is inviting individuals to provide feedback on the proposal to dispose of the train carriages by tender. Considered surplus to the Council's requirements, a decision was made to dispose of the six (6) carriages located adjacent to the railway corridor and old Railway Station in Tailem Bend at the January 2023 Ordinary Council meeting, subject to feedback from the community.

"These carriages offer a connection to rail history, however they are surplus to Council's needs and would require a significant investment towards restoration and suitable relocation," says Coorong District Council's Mayor Paul Simmons. "Interested groups and individuals will now have the opportunity to own their own piece of rail history, and Council will retain one carriage which, subject to funding, will be earmarked for future restoration and use," says Mayor Simmons.

Council will offer the six (6) carriages through an open tender process which will be established and advertised accordingly in the coming months. Interested parties wishing to submit a tender will need to be aware of specific requirements – including obtaining approvals from rail authorities and having the technical and logistical capacity for safe removal and transportation of the carriages.

Wellington Artist Leanne McCullough Featured in 2023 SALA Festival

The South Australian Living Artists Festival has begun, and its program includes numerous Murraylands artists, including Leanne McCulloch.

This year, the South Australian Living Arts Festival (SALA) showcases more than 10,000 artists' work at 550 venues across SA. One of those artists is Wellington resident Leanne McCulloch, who is exhibiting a range of her artworks at the Wellington Town Hall from last weekend until this Friday.

Ms McCullough often combines resin and paint and creates original artworks, prints, greeting cards, handbound leather journals and resin art tableware. Apart from having the good fortune to live alongside the river, Ms McCulloch is also fortunate as an artist to have her own recognisable style and technique. Surprisingly, she only started painting full-time around three years ago.

"I'm a lover of abstract fluid artwork, so I was doing abstract pieces and had created one which was very difficult, but I didn't like it," she said. "I put it in the back of my workroom, and I woke up one morning months later and thought 'I'll paint over it and create my tree of life. With the trees, I found my thing."

Ms McCullough said many people didn't appreciate how difficult it was to create her resin artwork.

"You've got to go over it and make sure nothing lands on it – one hair on your piece, and it's ruined," she said.

As a result, even her clearly un-stressed and under-worked cats are banned from the areas of her house where she creates her art – and go back to dozing in font of an open fire-place. The cats Spooky, Henry and Jordy aren't the only ones who enjoy the tranquil setting of a home right next to the river.

"We have a lot of birds here – blue wrens, egrets, cranes, honey-eaters, babblers and a solitary kookaburra," Ms McCullough said.

"I love the peacefulness of Wellington, the access to the bird life and the bush life; we're a tiny town with the beauty of the water. Even the flooding was a wonderful thing to watch."

Although Ms McCullough felt that the tranquil environment helped her to create her lovely art, she said she was not aware of it when she was working.

"When I paint, everything disappears," she said. "You don't know where you are or hear anything – it's a bit like meditation."

The meditative process certainly results in colourful, vibrant and personal artwork, which is Ms McCullough's way of offering something positive to people's lives.

"It's just such a sense of enjoyment and fulfilment for me, and it's wonderful to allow people to see beauty in the world – it's not just for me: it's for other people to see."

In last year's SALA, Ms McCullough exhibited her work at the Wellington Town Hall, and she was "totally blown away" by how the Wellington community supported what she was doing.

"I had people every day and had sales every day." she said.

"Because we don't have access to a lot of the events in Murray Bridge and Tailem Bend, it's offering something new. A lot of people from Wellington came up and introduced themselves, and I believe art can bring people together."

So, why not visit Ms McCullough's SALA exhibition and introduce yourself while you're there?

It will be at the Wellington Town Hall from 11am to 3pm each day until this Friday, August 4.

Pangarinda Botanic Garden 30yr History

September is 30 years since the Beautification committee called a public meeting for all interested in revegetation of the Wellington East Parkland.

The Tailem Bend Beautification Committee was a dedicated group of volunteers who over the years had been targeting a street a year to plant trees. The neglected Wellington East parkland had come to their attention. After work one evening Dr Phil Gooden and Peter Dickson visited the Parkland to be able to report at the public meeting.

While there the sunset was so spectacular they decided it should have some reference to sunset in the name. Dr Phil Gooden was a doctor to many elderly Indigenous people and found out that Pangarinda was their word for sunset. The Beautification committee passed that Pangarinda be the name to take to the public meeting for acceptance.

50 people attended the public meeting nominating nine people to form a committee to look into planting Pangarinda Arboretum with low rainfall plants, they were Dr Phil Gooden. Peter Dickson. Frank Mussgar, Sandra Cockshell. (All members of the Beautification Committee) Pat Foreman, Jacqui Merckenslager, Kaye Bartlett, John Barrie, Max Jettner. The last five all members of the Australian Plant Society.

After the meeting the committee members were invited to go out to Wellington East Parkland as most had not seen it. We all wondered what had we taken on.

As one of the original members still involved, I find it so rewarding seeing what a beautiful area the weed infested drifting area has turned into, attracting so much bird life.


All the people who came to see Jesus and were healed had one thing in common; They had faith that Jesus could and would heal them.


BOOK REVIEW

Keeping up apperances

As tensions simmer in a small country town, three women are going to need more than CWA sausage rolls and can-do community spirit to put things right.

From a bestselling Australian author comes a delightful novel full of practical wisdom and dry humour that examines female friendship, buried secrets



and why honesty is (usually) the best policy.

Privacy is hard to maintain in Badara, the kind of small Australian country town where everyone knows everyone else's business. So discovers single mum Paige when she and her three children arrive from the city seeking refuge. Paige's only respite from child care and loneliness is the Tuesday gym club, where she had feared the judgement of the town matriarchs, but she is met only with generosity and a plethora of baked goods.

Well-to-do farmer's wife and proud mother Briony is in full denial of her family's troubles. Even with her eldest daughter's marriage in ruins and her son Blake's recent bombshell. Suddenly Briony and husband Vince have a full house again - and the piles of laundry aren't the only dirty linen that's about to be aired.

For Marion, the unearthing of a time capsule - its contents to be read at the Celebrate Badara weekend - is a disaster. She was only a teenager when she wrote down those poisonous words, but that doesn't mean she won't lose friends and family if they hear what she really thinks of them - especially as the letter reveals their darkest secrets to the world.

When the truth comes out for Badara, keeping up appearances may no longer be an option for anyone.
