



Pangarinda Botanic Garden

Autumn has arrived and still no rain. I have been amazed at how well some of the plants are coping with the extreme dry.

It has been interesting to see plants from higher rainfall areas coping well while some local plants dying. Yes, we have lost many hard to obtain plants which is disappointing to all the volunteers watering every week to keep plants alive.

Eucalyptus mcquoidii is a very rare Eucalypt, found growing naturally in a restricted area at Quoin Head close to the sea in the south of Western Australia with a lot higher rainfall has adjusted well to less rainfall.

A small bushy tree, at present full of unusual buds, the fused base with long narrow caps that will fall off and become a round cluster of yellowgreen flowers. This small group is often referred to by their aboriginal name Marlock or Yates.

Anzac Day - My Uncle's War Medals.

Dear Editor, I want to share a true, uplifting Anzac Day story about my Uncle's War Medals.

I live in Mt Gambier but was staying at my partner's house in Tailem Bend for a couple of weeks and decided to order a few items online which I needed. This was my first time getting mail delivered to Tailem Bend. When the postie was delivering my parcels, he asked if I was related to Malcolm Dew, he said he had noticed my surname on my parcel and thought it wasn't a very common surname, so he thought he would ask. He went onto say that he had purchased some of Malcolm Dews's war medals and wondered if we were related. I said that the name wasn't familiar, but I would ask my dad about it.

I called my dad and asked him if he knew of a Malcolm Dew, he said yes, it's Uncle Max. He went on to say that Uncle Max's name was Malcolm and wondered why I wanted to know. I then relayed the conversation with Allen (the postie) which opened a massive can of worms. Dad had done our family history a while back including our family history regarding the military.

Dad had plaques made, which are on display at the RSL in Mt Gambier. Dad is SGT Trevor Dew 1bn/10bn RSAR (15.10.1963 – 30.10.1972)

France - PTE Henry Calder 27th infantry battalion (17.5.15 kia 06.08.16 age 26)

Belgium - SPR Albert Calder 15th field coy engineers (26.08.15 kia 26.09.17 age 23)

His Uncles:

PTE Raymond Dew 1 parachute battalion (29.07.1942 – 11.09.1945)

SGT Malcolm Dew 27th Infantry Battalion (06.03.1942 – 07.01.1946)

SGT Donald Dew 2/5 company aasc (09.05.1940 - 09.10.1945)

CPL Frederick Dew qlofc records 1 aif (25.04.1940 – 13.04.1944)

CPL Eric Dew amn coy 9 div (20.10.1939 - 03.08.1942)

Dad went on to email me information regarding Malcolm Dew with service history paperwork and some other information that he thought Allen would like. I drove up to the post office at Tailem Bend and asked them to pass my mobile number onto Allen, so I could relay the information to him. Allen called and I went on to let him know that we are related to Malcolm Dew and that I had information that Dad would like me to forward to him.

Allen told me the medals were on show at the RSL Murray Bridge. Dad was curious how Allen had come in contact with the medals, Allen had mentioned he had purchased them online and that Australian war medals are highly sought after overseas and he felt they needed to remain in Australia, so he purchased them a while ago and donated them to the RSL. I couldn't believe it, a random meeting with the postie at Tailem Bend could then lead me to finding out that he had purchased my dad's uncle's war medals. (*I believe they are the only medals that hadn't remained in the family*). All three of us were blown away and couldn't believe how random it all was. Several days had passed and I couldn't stop thinking about it, I had an idea that I wanted to put to Allen.

So, I messaged Allen and asked if he would consider selling me the medals *(I thought there is no harm in asking).* He said he would! He was heading to Melbourne for a few days and when he gets back, he will look for the paperwork and let me know how much they cost, he said he would sell them to me for the price he paid. I was ecstatic! I didn't tell Dad any of this, I wanted it to be a surprise. Allen got back to me with a price, he said that he would collect the medals from the RSL and post them to me. I waited patiently for them to arrive in the post, still keeping it a secret from Dad, he had no idea! We were having family friends over for the weekend, so I thought it would be the perfect time to present the medals to Dad.

To say Dad was moved would be an understatement, I recorded the moment he opened the box and saw what was inside, he couldn't believe it, he sat in silence and then the tears fell. What a special thing I was able to do for my dad.

All thanks to a random meeting with the postie from Tailem Bend. Dad is aiming to march on Anzac Day, proudly displaying his uncle's war medals. **Thank you Allen.**

The Changing Face of Tailem Bend #150

Memories: This month we look at the Life of Identity Bob Connolly

Bob Connolly - 25-9-28 / 06-10-2024 (Part 1)

Bob Connolly was born on September 25, 1928, in the close-knit town of Tailem Bend. For 96 remarkable years, he called this place home, embracing its landscapes, people, and spirit as an inseparable part of his story. More than just a resident, Bob was a living thread in the fabric of Tailem Bend's history. At the time of his passing, he held the unique distinction of being the oldest living person ever born in the town—a testament to a life well-lived and deeply rooted in the community he loved.

Bob knew the town's history, the stories of people who had long since passed, the businesses that once thrived, and the moments that shaped our community. His memory was a living archive, a thread connecting us to a time most of us have only heard about in passing. Bob didn't just witness the town's history; he was its history in many ways. His love for Tailem Bend was evident in the memories he carried and the stories he shared. In an interview with the local library historian, Bob reflected on the town's past, offering a personal and invaluable glimpse into its rich history. Through his words, he preserved a legacy for his family and future generations, ensuring that the Tailem Bend he knew and cherished would never be forgotten.

This is Bob's story....

I was the third child born to HP and Nora Connolly. I remember my aunt telling me that Mum and Dad had planned to have four children—but twelve more came after me, so that plan didn't quite work out!

As a child, school life in Tailem Bend was simple yet full of adventure. Playtime was spent on the playground with marbles rolling across the dirt and the girls hopping between chalk-drawn hopscotch squares. Though times were modest, we cherished those days, finding endless delight in the bonds we shared and the memories we created together.

The sweltering summer heat made schooldays challenging, with temperatures soaring as high as 113°F. One particularly scorching afternoon, a group of boys decided that sitting through lunch in the stifling heat wasn't an option. Instead, we made our way down to the river. None of us had brought bathers, but that didn't matter—we stripped off and plunged into the river, relishing the cool water.

As we swam, the showboat glided past, packed with women leaning over the railings, catching sight of us in our carefree antics. Before we could react, a lad on the cliffs started hollering, warning us that the headmaster had caught wind of our little excursion.

Sure enough, the headmaster stood on the bank, arms crossed, his presence spelling trouble. He ordered us back to school immediately. We pleaded with the boy on the cliff to grab our clothes and take them to the rowing shed for us. But he wasn't keen on getting involved.

The headmaster surveyed the situation, weighing his options. Finally, with a smirk, he instructed the lad to fetch our clothes and take them where we could dress in relative dignity. Once we were back at school, the consequences awaited—four sharp cuts as punishment. As we walked out, rubbing our stinging hands, the headmaster gave us a knowing look and said, "You won't do that again."

One of my most cherished pastimes was time spent "down the river," where we would test our endurance by swimming across and back. The river was also a beloved escape for the townspeople during sweltering summers.

The Changing Face of Tailem Bend #150

With no air conditioning, we found comfort in its cool waters, spending countless hours laughing, splashing, and seeking relief from the heat. I loved dancing and was known for never missing a local dance. The night's music and joy always drew me in, making those gatherings some of my favourite pastimes. The town came alive with dances, and the community's youth eagerly looked forward to the nights, especially after a long, hard day's work. The music and energy filled the air, allowing everyone to unwind, have fun, and connect. It was the perfect way to shake off the fatigue and celebrate the camaraderie of the close-knit town.

I owned a 1928 Buick and lived in the family home at 217 Webb Street (Gunn Alley). One night, after staying out a little later than I probably should have, I decided to sneak in quietly, hoping to avoid waking my mother. As I pulled into the driveway, I tried to be as discreet as possible. But just as I was easing in, the car stalled. Not wanting to make a scene, I climbed out and decided to crank it by hand, hoping to get it started without a fuss. Fate, however, had other plans. As I turned the crank carefully, it suddenly came loose-flying straight up and hitting me square in the mouth. The sharp impact shattered my teeth, leaving me stunned and in pain. That is how I ended up with false teeth.

The circus at the Oval was always a significant event in town. The ground was so hard with limestone that the tent pegs would get stuck and often remained there long after the circus had left. They became a familiar sight, as pulling them out required a truck. The Buff Lodge had a special show featuring horses and donkeys performing tricks. One particular challenge caught my attention: you could earn five pounds if you rode a donkey around the ring. I got talked into giving it a try and was doing surprisingly well. With just 20 yards to go before winning my five pounds, the music suddenly stopped. Right on cue, the donkey turned sharply, and I tumbled straight to the ground.

I'm convinced it was trained to do precisely that! While still at school, I sold sweets for Jameison Confectionery. Every Saturday night at the picture theatre, I'd sell a tray of sweets. The first tray was easy to sell, so I returned for a second. Instead of making two shillings, I ended up with four-a great night's work! I also got to watch the movie, but I had to keep an eye out for Mr Bromley, who ran the picture theatre, as he would have charged me an entry fee.

After leaving school, I worked for Jim Crouch as a General Carrier, delivering goods from Eudunda Farmers by horse and cart. Jim only took the job because his son was away at war. He told me, "When you turn 16, you can get your license and drive the truck on windy days." I turned 16. Then 16 and a half. I waited and waited. Finally, I asked, "When do I get my license?" "You're not ready for it," Jim replied. "Right," I said, "then I'll finish up on Saturday!" I loved working there, however. I used to go with Mr. Kelly, and we sold wood around town for seven pounds a tonne.

After that, I had a brief stint on the Railway. Mr. Tonkin, the Loco Foreman, sent me to Adelaide for a medical. I worked in the Locomotive Foreman's office for a while. Later, I moved to shift work at the chargeman's section but soon realised that the fireman's duties made better money, so I switched to that. I liked working with Jack Holloway and Tom Giddings, both great train drivers. Working on steam locomotives in a bygone era was no easy task, but I fully embraced the hard work and challenges.



\$500,000 to Bring Tailem Bend Precinct Projects to 'SHOVEL READY' Status

Coorong District Council is just one of two South Australian councils to receive grant funding through the latest announcement of successful projects under the Australian Government's Regional Precinct Partnership Program.

The theme of the night was Adelaide Cup, ladies adorned their fascinators and gentlemen their top hats. Winners of the best dressed for the occasion were Gary Hansen and Dianne Wickes. The Minister for Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Local Government, the Hon. Catherine King MP recently announced \$508,000 had been awarded to Coorong District Council for design and costings of projects in Tailem Bend.

"Our Council is very grateful to the Federal Government for this great opportunity to bring several projects in Tailem Bend to what we call 'shovel ready' status," says Mayor Simmons.

The successful grant includes \$105,000 for the Tenth Street Precinct affordable housing proposal, which involves creating a plan of division, infrastructure and landscaping plans and legal templates to assist Council in considering utilising surplus land for housing development. Dickson Reserve's Old Ferry Landing has received \$63,000 to enable heritage and engineering experts to prepare a conservation plan for the heritage listed structure, which is a key feature of Tailem Bend's river and transport history.

A further \$45,000 will be spent on additional design activity at Dickson Reserve to ensure this popular area continues to be a welcoming and functional space for locals and visitors. The Highway corridor through Tailem Bend will benefit from a \$95,000 investment in further design work to prepare enhanced engineering drawings and costings for improvements to the median strip and corridor verges. The Council has actively engaged with the Department for Infrastructure and Transport to collaborate on improving this area.

The Tailem Bend Golf Club History

Compiled by the Tailem Bend Golf Club.

Dear Editor, agony and ecstasy! These words may describe the feeling of many who have embarked upon a pastime which has become ever so popular in recent years. I refer to that enigmatic game we know as golf.

Henry Longhurst, the rhetoric golf commentator, often referred to golf as a "pleasant walk interrupted". This may be true for metropolitan golfers with excellent facilities closely accessible, but the walk has not been as near pleasant for their country counterparts. save for a few exceptions.

Here in the country, at Tailem Bend. we are trying to make the golfers life a little more enjoyable. Over the last decade a concerted effort by club members has transformed the course from nine holes with scrapes and fairways relying on winter rains for grassing to nine holes with irrigated fairways and grass greens. For those of you familiar with the arid climate and limestone terrain of the area you will appreciate this has been no mean feat. Indeed, it has made the golfers' walk a lot more pleasant. By digging horehound and onion week with shovels and mowing with hand propelled cutters. Slag from Port Pirie was used to keep the scrapes topped up. This was necessary as the slag kept "disappearing!" not from the wind as was first thought, but by cunning residents who realised the slag was high in silver content and could be further refined for a Tittle extra pocket money.

Late in the 50's a permit was granted to consume bottled beer on the premises, and the sanguine cheeks of the members complement the little red tin shed where the ales were so delightfully consumed. In 1961 an enthusiastic member embarked on a massive tree planting program. Armed with only crowbar, pick and shovel, one can imagine the endless sweat and countless blisters endured while digging through the remorseless limestone, to plant the hundreds of eucalypts that now graciously embellish the course. During 1964 it was decided better house facilities were needed, subsequently an ex-housing trust portable house was purchased, for 75 pounds, but golf all year round a 12 month liquor licence was applied for and granted. The funds generated from extra trading being used to upgrade the clubrooms with arpet and indoor toilets. By 1980 it was obvious the existing bore could Cope with increasing irrigation, so a major plan was unveiled for a completely new reticulation System with the water to be put directly from the nearby River Murray. After thousands of hours of voluntary work spanning 5 years and \$80,000 of club funds the irrigation System was finally completed, and the club had the Capability to water the whole course.

With improved playing facilities club membership increased and in 1986 it was decided a new clubhouse would be advantageous. Once again, members came to the fore with voluntary Tabor and during a six-week period the old clubhouse was almost demolished, then rebuilt to its present modern standard. There remained but one improvement to be made to cap off a decade of progress, the installation of greens.

With conflicting ideas, some planning, a Tittle professional advice, toss in a shoestring budget, a wing and s prayer, the club built 2- experimental greens in the summer of 1987. These 2 greens proved successful, so over the ensuing years the existing scrapes were gradually replaced with the more conducive putting surface, until finally on opening day winter season 1991 (March 10) the last green was in play.

The wildest dreams of our foundation members could not have envisaged the transformation of that once Limestone paddock into the 'pleasant surroundings we now enjoy. The extensive development of our facilities has been possible only due to the members willingness to work voluntarily and participate in fund raising activities and the club is justifiable proud of its achievements, He believe our efforts have added a Tittle more to promote the sport of golf in this state.

We hope you may be able to grace our course one day and share a "pleasant walk interrupted"

March 2025 (Edition 67)

Council received a deputation (presentation) from the Meningie Football Club on their exciting new development, the Coorong Community Clubhouse. The club is seeking a Council Ioan to fund detailed engineering plans, ensuring the project is "shovelready" for future grants.

Cr Qualman and Mayor Simmons have been elected as Council's delegates to the Murray Darling Association National Conference & AGM (Griffith, NSW), with Cr Qualman serving as the voting representative at this key meeting.

Deputy Mayor Cr Pietzsch will represent Council at National General Assembly (Canberra), which will focus on efficiency through technology, vibrant communities, mental health in regional areas, and the future of regional road infrastructure. Additionally, Cr Pietzsch announced his intention to contest the seat of Barker for the National Party in the upcoming Federal Election.

A recent Federal Government inquiry into local government sustainability received 287 submissions nationwide, with a common theme emerging: cost shifting. Over time, councils have taken on responsibilities beyond the traditional "three Rs" (rates, roads, and rubbish), now managing infrastructure, planning, environmental conservation, aged care, childcare, mental health, and more. This shift is creating significant financial strain, especially in areas, where population growth remains static.

After rejecting an application for a large, illuminated sign on the Dukes Highway at Tailem Bend, Council acknowledged the need to update its Signage Policy to address the use of illuminated, rotating-image signs. To streamline policy development, Cr Pietzsch successfully moved a motion to establish a Governance & Policy Review Working Group to refine policies before presenting them to the full Council.

Cr Maidment, Cr Bland and the Mayor will attend the upcoming LGA Conference in Adelaide, which will focus on strategies for building liveable communities.

Council has endorsed a revised design for the Tintinara Apex Park upgrade following valuable community feedback. The project, funded by the Australian Government's Local Roads & Community Infrastructure Program, will enhance connectivity with new fencing and a footpath from Fulwood Ave rail crossing to the park.

Council remains mindful of the rising cost of living and continues to explore alternative revenue streams, including selling underutilised land and rezoning for future housing development. Increasing the local population will help expand the ratepayer base and ease financial pressures.

Council's asset management strategy this year will focus on ensuring all Council-owned assets are accurately accounted for.

Council employs 62.1 full-time equivalent staff, with a near-equal gender split (53% male, 47% female). Employee turnover has dropped significantly from 20% to under 10%.



While strategies such as gas guns and culling have been implemented, their effectiveness is limited due to the sheer number of birds. A long-term solution is still needed. Apparently, these birds can live for 40 years.






