


Pangarinda Botanic Garden

At last, a very welcome rain. May not be the opening rains our farmers are looking for but the plants at Pangarinda Botanic Garden seem to pick up with rain on the leaves that trickles down branches to the litter below. In the weeding amongst this litter after showers, often small frogs are seen.

For visitors to Pangarinda wanting to see the local birds, the South Australian Plantings is the area to sit and listen. The Rufous Whistlers have arrived; their loud persistent calls are heard before the bird is seen. These curious birds will come close if there are trees above to sit in. Their white throats outlined in black above a rufous belly, stand out amongst the leaves.

The White-naped Honeyeater is another bird that has been seen in the past week. It feeds amongst the leaves of gums and is a very busy little bird, hard to get a good view of the blackhead and white crescent on nape to identify. Grey Fantails are seen flitting out of trees chasing insects, and they are easily identified by their fanned tail that never seems still.

A Station Sensation, George the Cat.

It's a busy commuter station with well over a million passengers passing through it every year.

From Stourbridge Junction Railway station in England, you can catch trains to local Birmingham destinations as well as further afield to the likes of Stratford-upon-Avon, Worcester and down to London Marylebone. For many of those departing or arriving, the station is familiar territory. Some of the staff they know and like to chat to, but there's one figure at the station it seems everyone knows.

In fact, **George, the station cat,** is not just known by travellers - he has a worldwide fanbase! Cat-lovers not only keep up with George's daily exploits via his social media channels - but they also visit from far-flung countries like America to check in personally. The ginger tom is popular with staff and passengers. With the quantities of merchandise, with local charities getting very welcome donations as a result.

It's a remarkable tale, and one that began when George, a ginger tom who is now ten, just wandered into Stourbridge Junction one day in 2017.

"George started to visit quite regularly, and lan Tomlinson, our station supervisor, who had cats previously, took quite a shine to him," Simone Carter, West Midlands Trains area station manager for the busy Snow Hill lines, explains. "When lan was finishing up at night after a late shift, he would often carry George back to his owner's house nearby to make sure he got home safely."

Around that time, George's owner was emigrating to Spain and looking at taking all of her cats with her.However, realising the bond that had grown between lan and George, she agreed to a formal adoption.Simone has 44 stations under her stewardship, but Stourbridge Junction is a key responsibility and a regular base, so she sees lots of George and has, like so many others, become totally smitten.

His favourite perch is the ticket office counter, ensuring he was soon a favourite with passengers. "He'd either be on the counter or sleeping on a chair in the office, and people loved to see him," Simone says. "He's quite small although he wouldn't agree with that - very soft to touch and exceptionally friendly. He really is such a lovely little thing."

A Facebook page was set up for George and, when Simone took over her station duties, she began adding more regular. George welcomes passengers at the station ticket office. Updates and putting him on Twitter **(now X)**, too. He now has almost 70,000 followers on X and more than 50,000 on Facebook.

"It ramped up a lot during the lockdowns as we wanted him to spread a bit of cheer when we were all in this great big unknown," Simone reveals.

"George always says good morning and good night and puts out little pearls of wisdom- which might be from me! They could be, perhaps, how Christmas can be quite an emotional time of year for those living on their own or who can't see their families. It's just to reassure that you are never alone. People have messaged privately to say how much he has helped them."

As George's fame has spread, so did the desire to come and see him. Fans have come from all over the UK, travelling mar miles to Stourbridge Junction just to see and spend some time with George and then hop on a train back home.

"We have also had people from Hong Kong, Canada and America," Simone add

The stipulation of George's previous owner was that she was putting him into lan's charge on the understanding that when lan retired George would go into a happy, welldeserved retirement with him. Simone says lan is getting closer to the stage where that is becoming a possibility, and George will put his paws up with him. She's sure, though, that George won't make himself a stranger. In the meantime, however, Stourbridge Junction travellers can continue to check in on a station cat in a million.

George gets hundreds of comments about his daily Facebook posts, which include this typical little thought: "Good morning and welcome to Tuna Tuesday. You can't make a cloudy day a sunny day, but you can embrace it and decide it's going to be a good day after all!"

This Month we complete the last story of Bob Coonnolly.

Bob Connolly - 25-9-28 / 06-10-2024 (Part 3)

I didn't play much football but attended a few training sessions.

I vividly recall Jeff Hughes, a champion footballer, once telling me, *"You don't kick very well."* I took that to heart and soon realised football wasn't my calling, so I shifted my focus to other pursuits.

Instead of chasing a footy, I took up cycling, spending countless hours riding along the highway during Sunday Road races. The Labor Day races were always a highlight, with competitions held around the oval—its perimeter bituminised—and on other major event days. Among the local cyclists, Les Baker stood out as the strongest rider in the area; he was a real force on two wheels.

As time passed, I felt I was getting a bit too old for cycling and decided to swap my bike for something with a little more horsepower—literally. My first horse, Bob's Hope, introduced me to the exciting world of hunting. I must've been doing all right because a local owner soon approached me with an offer: *"Would you qualify a horse for a jump hunt at the Hunt Club?"* I took on the challenge and successfully qualified the horse. But two weeks later, the owner came back with another proposal. *"I've entered the horse in a race,"* he said.

"Who's riding it?" I asked. *"You are,"* he replied. By then, I was married and figured it was best not to take the risk. Instead, a jockey from Mount Gambier took the reins—and won the race by ten lengths.

My passion for horses didn't end there. In time, I purchased another horse and joined the Hunt Club in Murray Bridge, riding alongside familiar names like Bill McMorron and Ross Jaensch. Getting to the club was an adventure in itself—we'd load the horses onto the old ex-Pinnaroo train, which departed around 11 a.m. on Saturdays. The club was more than just a sporting group; it was a close-knit, family-oriented community where we shared countless hours socialising, laughing, and making lifelong connections. It was a time of good mates, great rides, and cherished memories that have stayed with me ever since.

After finishing my tenure as President of the footy club, I took up lawn bowls, thanks to the relentless encouragement of Tiger Lyon, who finally convinced me to give it a go.

I was fortunate enough to win four club championship pairs, an achievement I owe primarily to Des Zander's guidance and mentorship. Des had a remarkable way of offering advice without a hint of criticism, even when I struggled on the green. His support made all the difference.

I have many fond memories of Tailem Bend, but the people stand out the most. Everyone pitched in to help one another in those early days, creating a strong sense of community. The town was thriving, with a bustling railway at its heart, and local businesses flourished thanks to the railway workers and their families. The town was home to many colourful characters, and the Main Street shops flourished, especially on railway paydays every fortnight on Thursday. On any given day, the streets came alive with children playing cricket, kicking footballs, and enjoying games of rounders, creating a lively atmosphere filled with laughter and camaraderie.

It was heartbreaking to witness the decline of the railways—but I suppose that's progress. Still, I vividly remember those days when every street echoed with children playing, the main street buzzed with activity, and it seemed like everyone had a job.

Bob passed away in October 2024, and we want to take this opportunity to honour his lasting impact by highlighting some of his many contributions to the community he loved. His dedication and service touched countless lives, leaving a legacy of leadership, kindness, and civic pride.

On the left is a summary of Bob's contributions to the community:

Commitment to Tailem Bend:

• Lifelong resident of Tailem Bend, embodying a deep connection to the town's history and community.

• Recognised as the oldest living person born in Tailem Bend at the time of his passing.

• Bob was also an active member of the Tailem Bend Progress Association, where he joined forces with likeminded individuals, all dedicated to the betterment and growth of their beloved town.

Bob clearly understood the role a football or sporting club plays in the local community. He identified, and quite rightly, that sport gives the local people a sense of identity, pride, and ownership.

Tailem Bend Football Club:

• Dedicated countless hours watering the oval, often perched on the back of a Ute alongside fellow volunteer Michael Sacco and his family

• Served as President, providing strong leadership and vision.

• Led the club's social committee, enhancing community engagement.

• Awarded Life Membership in recognition of his outstanding service.

• Served on the River Murray Football League committee, contributing to regional sports development.

Tailem Bend Marching Girls:

• Bob played a pivotal role in establishing club rooms for the newly formed Tailem Bend Marching Girls. Not only did he help secure space and home for the group, but he embraced the role of marching girl instructor, taking on the responsibility with passion and dedication. His efforts helped shape the team and gave the young girls a place to develop their skills and thrive, showcasing his leadership and unwavering support for community initiatives.

Tailem Bend Bowling Club:

• Distinguished Life Member with significant contributions to the club's success.

• Key player in multiple premiership-winning teams, exemplifying sportsmanship and dedication.

Telecross Volunteer:

• Along with his wife Patt, he dedicated 14 years to providing daily welfare calls, offering companionship and support to the elderly and vulnerable.

Church and Faith-Based Service:


• Active church member involved in collecting offerings and supporting parish activities.

• Secretary of the Knights of the Southern Cross, contributing thoughtful insights and leadership.

• Assisted in organising post-Mass gatherings, fostering community spirit within the parish.



Staff are Suffering!

New data: Australian workers are not taking breaks; quality of staff and their work is suffering.

Getting in touch with new research around how over a quarter of Australian employees never take breaks, and the impact this has on their quality of work, from \$300 million Australian owned and operated office supplies company COS.

Key findings include:

More than a quarter of employees (28%) don't ever take a break during business hours, a concerning insight given the strong link between breaks and productivity.

Gen Z were notably more likely to take breaks daily (84%) compared to any other age group (Millennials at 72%, Gen X at 70% and Boomers at 65%).

Daily breaks deliver tangible business benefits, with workers that do take breaks reporting higher efficiency (29%), lower stress levels (27%), and improved quality of work (25%).

The main influencers on whether workers take breaks or not are: supportive workplace culture (21%), dedicated rest areas in the office (21%), and active encouragement from the leadership team (20%).

Murray Bridge Runner Takes on 55-hour Marathon for Domestic Violence Survivors

Kai Martin hopes to raise \$25,000 by doing something that, to most, would sound impossible. Murray Bridge local Kai Martin will run a 325-kilometre ultramarathon over two days next month to raise funds for domestic violence victims and survivors.

The Lavender Federation Trail usually takes hikers 12 to 14 days to complete. Mr Martin, supported by a small group of friends and family, plans to get it done in one go.

The 25-year-old disability support worker also hopes to raise \$25,000 over the weeks leading up to the marathon. In the eight days since he announced his intentions on social media – with a slick video produced by local videographer James Dawson – he has already raised \$10,000.

"The support from the community is amazing," he said.

Mr Martin said his intention was to put a spotlight on domestic violence, and to make victims feel that they were not alone. Many members of the community had since reached out to him about their own experiences with domestic violence, he said, which highlighted the need for more public discourse around the topic.

"It's way bigger than what I ever imagined, but it's a good thing," he said.

The money raised will go to the Murray Bridge Regional Collaboration on Violence Against Women and Children. He would like to see the money go back into the community by providing safe housing, easier to access and more affordable support services, and school programs to educate kids on domestic violence. Mr Martin has been a passionate advocate on the issue for almost a decade and has chaired the Murray Bridge Domestic Violence Awareness Group since 2018.

He also appeared as a guest speaker at an annual domestic violence march at Sturt Reserve in December.

Mr Martin said having two family members affected by domestic violence meant that the issue was deeply important for him, and that it was crucial to give affected people a voice.

"I feel I have to do this – I can speak for the people who can't speak," he said.

He hoped to reach more men in the community, to increase male support and advocacy, as men were significantly more likely to be reported as perpetrators in domestic violence cases.

"Hopefully other men in the community go 'we can be the voice; we can be the ones to stand up'," he said.

"For so long, women have been the ones fighting this, and I think it's time for men to step up and do it."

Council update Around the District

Throughout the month past Coorong District Council has undertaken a range of activities, events and delivered programs across the district.

The **Community Facilities** team has completed tree trimming in Meningie, repairing potholes at the roadside entry to the Tintinara Aerodrome, installing new safety Tintinara rails at the Oval Playground and repairing the irrigation main at Tailem Bend.

Rural road users are continuing to be supported through the patrol grading program, with 373.5kms of unsealed roads graded during April 2025. Road users may spot the patrol graders in the Sherlock area, as well as on Emu Springs Road, Coombe Road, Sandersons Road and Loveday Bay Road in May.

The internal construction crew commenced renewal of eight kilometres on Settlers Road as part of the 2024/25 Unsealed Roads Program in April and contractors will commence road

Welcome to this month's renewal on seven kilometres of Taunta Hut Road at Deepwater.

> The 2024/25 Sealed Roads Renewal Program is now complete. after works on Alexandrina Drive at Narrung were completed in early May.

> Works on the final section of the Carcuma Road upgrade at Tintinara are underway. Clearing and shoulder widening works were completed in April and a 200m section of guard railing was installed following a road safety assessment.

Road construction is underway with the works expected to continue into June.

Construction of a 1.8m high fence along the southern boundary of the Tintinara Apex Park has been installed, with further fencing works occurring to enclose the whole park

along with installation of new play equipment and a picnic bench replacement as part of the Apex Park upgrade project. The fencing also continues along the newly installed footpath next to the rail corridor, connecting pedestrians with the new level crossing.

The upgrade of the Coonalpyn Swimming Pool car park has commenced. Once completed, the newly sealed car park will provide approximately 30 parking spaces, including two pram parking bays and two accessible (disabled) parking bays.


