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# **Big News for Tailem Bend**

Tailem Bend Community Centre (TBCC) secures the driver's seat in delivering community transport services across a huge stretch of regional South Australia. After a successful tender, TBCC will now lead the Community Transport South Australia (CTSA) program, covering 15 Local Government Areas (LGAs) across the Riverland, Murray Mallee and Limestone Coast.

This is a major step for the much-loved community organisation, which already provides transport services in six council areas including Coorong, Karoonda East Murray, Southern Mallee, Murray Bridge, Mid Murray and Tatiara. Now, that footprint is expanding significantly to include places like Mount Gambier, Loxton, Waikerie, Naracoorte, Renmark, Wattle Range and more. For Chairperson Judy Bagg, it's an exciting moment for not only the centre, but the town itself. "We're absolutely thrilled," she said. "This means more people in more places will be able to access reliable, affordable transport – all from a service run right here out of Tailem Bend. It's something the whole community can be proud of."

While the Red Cross will continue providing services for people aged over 65 (or over 50 for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander clients) through the Commonwealth Home Support Program until 2027, TBCC will now manage the broader community transport network — getting people to appointments, shops, social outings and more. With the changes will come a new look, the familiar Murray Mallee Community Passenger Network (MMCPN) name will soon make way for a fresh new identity: Community Transport South Australia — Riverland, Murray Mallee, Limestone Coast (CTSA-RMC). Locals can expect to see new signage, branding and communications rolling out over the next few months.

Behind the scenes, the work is already well underway with the TBCC speaking with councils, community partners and volunteer drivers to make sure the expanded service runs smoothly. They're also updating their agreements with key partners like the Department of Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) and Country Health Connect, so drivers have access to enough vehicles across all the regions they'll now serve. TBCC's fleet is already based in Tailem Bend, Murray Bridge, Meningie and Lameroo, with more vehicles likely to be added as demand grows.

"We're not just plugging into a big new service area and hoping for the best," said Judy. "We're having real conversations with communities about what they need, and how we can deliver transport that works for them — whether that's more vehicles, more drivers, or different kinds of services."

She added that being based in Tailem Bend gives the centre a unique perspective. "We understand what it's like living out here — the distances, the isolation, and how important it is to stay connected," she said. "It's not just about getting from A to B, it's about people being able to stay part of their communities, to access healthcare, to see family, to go to the shops or catch up with friends."

As part of the rollout, TBCC is inviting local councils to meet and discuss what transport looks like in their area. They're also encouraging councils to help advocate for better services and support continued funding for older residents beyond 2027. "This is a really exciting time — not just for us, but for Tailem Bend and the whole region," Judy said. "It shows what a small community centre can do when it's backed by the community and focused on making a real difference."

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# Flag Roadshow to Barker

Over 100 delighted Tailem Bend Primary School students joined Mr Pasin to unfurl the larger than-life flag which measures 12.8 m x 6.4 m – about the same as a double decker bus.

# From Steam to Shuttle: A Journey Through Railway History

In Australia, most settlements grew around railway lines, whereas in England, railways were often built to link existing towns and communities.

Recently, I had the pleasure of stepping aboard a special train, Inspiration 200, to view an exhibition celebrating 200 years of railway development. The engine, Hercules, was powered by hydrogenated vegetable oil. It's fascinating to reflect that the very first passenger journey in the world took place on 25 September 1825, from Darlington to Stockton, pulled by Locomotion No. 1, designed by George Stephenson.

In Australia, the first passenger service was horse-drawn, running from Goolwa to Port Elliot on 1 May 1854. While George Stephenson is often called the "Father of Railways," some credit Richard Trevithick of Cornwall. In 1803, Samuel Homfray of Stourbridge, owner of the Penydarren Ironworks in Merthyr Tydfil, Wales, commissioned Trevithick to design a high-pressure steam locomotive to transport iron along nine miles of rail to the Cardiff Canal. On 21 February 1804, the world's first steam-powered rail journey took place, carrying ten tons of iron in five wagons. The return journey, however, was not completed, as the engine proved too heavy for the rails and later became a stationary engine driving a forge hammer.


Interestingly, my great-great-great-grandfather, Thomas Fisher, born in Scotland and later living at Pennydarren Lodge as an agent for the ironworks from 1828, would have witnessed this pioneering engine. His brother, John Fisher, became the first settler in Gumeracha, South Australia, in 1839, and Fisher Avenue there stands in his honour. I now live in Kingswinford, England, about three miles from Stourbridge.

This area, once owned by the Lords of Dudley, was rich in coal, ironstone, and limestone. In 1829, Lord Dudley commissioned a steam locomotive named Agenoria, built by Foster and Rastrick of Stourbridge, to transport materials along the Kingswinford **(Shutt End)** line to the Staffordshire & Worcester Canal. After 30 years of service, Agenoria fell off the rails but is now preserved at the York Railway Museum. At the same time, the firm also built The Lion, the first locomotive to operate in the USA.

And now, for a lighter note, back to George — the resident cat of Stourbridge Junction Ticket Office, whom I introduced in previous editions. To mark International Cat Day on 8th August 2025, the Stourbridge Shuttle Train has been named George. The shuttle runs 0.8 miles from Stourbridge Town to Stourbridge Junction, linking with the mainline, and operates every ten minutes during the day. For rail enthusiasts, the shuttle is British Rail 139, built by Parry Movers, with seating for 20–25 passengers and travelling at 20 mph in a single carriage.

# The Changing Face of Tailem Bend #155

This month we look at the memories of Old makes way for the new, Pauline Merritt, Blue Wren Room, and 50 years of Bowls.

#### **Old Makes Way for the New**

Betty Stringer, 1888 -1960.

The first building erected in Tailem Bend Railway Terrace West has been demolished.

Built by the late Mr. F. G. Mason in the early 1880s, the property served as both residence and business premises—probably the first such establishment in the town. Mr. Mason held the Mail Contracts between Tailem Bend, Wellington, and Meningie.

The old structure was a double villa. The northern villa was the town's first Post Office until 1912, with Mrs. Mason serving as Postmistress. A Postmaster was later appointed by the Postmaster General, and postal business was conducted in the front room of the Institute until a dedicated Post Office was built (not the current one).

In 1916, Mr. W. J. Trevena, who was then running a bakery, purchased the building. He constructed a bakehouse at the rear and continued the business until his retirement in 1960. The current owners, Mr. and Mrs. D. Mik, plan to invest \$15,000 to convert the property into a modern bakery, shop, and cafeteria. Contractor: J. M. Andrea of Murray Bridge.

Mayor Heather Moore said Pauline had been involved in many organisations over the past 35 years, always giving full commitment to whatever she was part of. She was described as an enthusiastic community member, always considering the needs of the Tailem Bend community.

Pauline has been president of the Tailem Bend Kindergarten, a Tailem Primary School parent committee member, a member of St. Luke's Anglican Church, and president

of the Ladies' Guild. She was one of the main instigators in rallying local people when the Tailem Bend Hospital was to be closed by government, organising a blockade of the Princes Highway, followed up with a trip to Adelaide. Supporting the tennis and football clubs has been another of her passions. Taberefta Aged Homes is also an interest, and she has been involved with the Tailem Bend Singers for the Christmas Carols by Candlelight, as well as helping with singing at many community events. She has assisted many people dealing with the loss of loved ones, including family and friends. Pauline thanked Kay Biebrick for nominating her, "the group of people who helped Kay collect the information, and the Council for selecting me."

"I was spellbound when told of the news and took 24 hours to speak about it," she said. She added that Tailem Bend "is my town, I love it and all that is in it." She also congratulated Pam Green and the hospital on winning Event of the Year. The mother of three reflected on her family background, saying: "The saying is that one is rich if you have family and friends. I am very rich." The Australia Day celebrations included a barbecue lunch and two bus performances of The Twisted Tales of Tailem Bend.

# Patients Benefit from Blue Wren Room

The opening of a \$26,000 facility at Tailem Bend's Lower Murray District Hospital will enable patients with 'special needs' to be more self-contained and comfortable, Minister for Health Dr. Michael Armitage said this week.

In opening the room on Tuesday, Dr. Armitage said the new 'special needs room,' which is to be called the Blue Wren

Room, would be available to patients with a range of acute medical needs that demand special attention and private care.

"The Lower Murray District Hospital's special needs room will provide a vital service for patients, such as mothers and their newborn babies, road accident victims and their families, and elderly couples who need to be together," Dr. Armitage said. "It will make it possible for the patient's loved ones to be with them 24 hours a day, if that is what they wish. It is a significant advance in creating a home-like, comfortable environment complete with privacy for people with 'special needs.'

"Such a room indicates the Lower Murray District Hospital's commitment to provide a well-rounded approach to a wide range of health issues. The special needs ethos fits comfortably with the hospital's role of meeting the needs of the community by providing excellent palliative and supportive care, and shows the hospital's commitment to providing a well-rounded approach to a wider range of health care issues."

Other 'special needs' situations identified by the hospital include palliative care, mid transfers, crisis care, and short-term care. The Blue Wren Room was created from an existing two-bed ward into a space with a verandah to provide a facility for patients with 'special needs.' It incorporates kitchen facilities, a day and night lounge area, and a spectacular view of the Murray River.

Funds for the development were provided by the hospital **(\$18,000)**, with the Friends of the Lower Murray District Hospital auxiliary group contributing \$8,000.

# **Years of Motorcycling Memories**

As a 15-year-old Danny Ahern of Tailem Bend clearly remembers intently listening to the results of all the GP Motorcycle races on a Monday morning – his likeminded friends would chat at school, and they'd all have posters in their bedroom walls of racers like Giacomo Agostini, Phil Read, and Mike Hailwood, to name a few.

"We all loved chatting about Giacomo Agostini, he was a former Italian Grand Prix motorcycle road racer who won 122 races and 15 world titles," Danny said. "He was impressive, he dominated the 350cc and 500cc classes for MV Agusta, Yamaha and the Suzuki team."

"You know those posters have led me to a life of motorcycling and travelling the world," Danny explained.

One of Danny's most memorable moments was when he was racing in the USA at Barber Raceway with Kevin Schwantz and Jay Springsteen. "Yeah, we shared pits over the weekend and those two in one race lapped me simultaneously one on each side, boy that was exhilarating," Danny said. "As was the following weeks racing on the heavily banked Daytona circuit. I am so lucky I don't just have one highlight, I have bucket loads, memories – and they're forever."

The Daytona International Speedway is a track located in Daytona Beach, Florida - since opening in 1959, it has been the home of the famous Daytona 500, the most prestigious race in NASCAR.

After years of travelling and working in the building trades, Danny now calls Tailem Bend his home. "I was getting to the end of my full-time working life, and it seemed that The Bend Raceway complex was becoming the real deal, so Tailem was extremely attractive to me," Danny said. "And it was an hour and a half closer to Mac Pk where we race our historic bikes all the time."

Danny is now living in his second house he has built in the region. "My first house was a waterfront place at Wellington East - it was there that I made my first of many local friendships." Danny is an active member of the Tailem Bend Auto Club,

"I think I'm club member 612 or something, boy it's grown – I think it's up to 723 members now," Danny explained. "It's great hanging with likeminded people, and I'm loving country living."

Danny's involvement with motorcycle sports has been a solid 35-year journey, having held numerous roles including President and Vice President of the Historic Motorcycle Racing Register of SA. "I'm so proud, a few years back I was awarded the Frank Franklin Award for services to motorcycling racing," Danny mentioned.

In early 2025 Danny was awarded Life Membership to Motorcycling SA, which sits perfectly with Danny's club life membership and numerous clubmen of year awards.

"Yeah, I must confess, as I hit my twilight years, things are a little different, but I still race six to eight meetings a year and continue to help in officialdom at numerous club events around SA," Danny said.

The two-day program was delivered by David Moran and Graham Lucas from Mental Health Partners, whose passion and knowledge created a supportive and engaging environment for learning.

The course focuses on strength-based skills that not only build resilience in yourself, but also equip you to support those around you. I found this particularly powerful—shifting the focus away from simply coping with challenges to recognising strengths and using them as tools to thrive. Graham and David shared practical strategies that can be applied at home, in the workplace, and in our broader community, reminding us that resilience is advancing despite adversity.

One of the tools introduced was the Driven app, which extends the learning well beyond the classroom. The app provides interactive exercises, guided reflections, and resilience-building activities that you can return to at any time. Having this digital companion means the course doesn't end when the sessions do—you can continue working on yourself, tracking your progress, and embedding resilience into daily life.

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# **Beyond Steel** – The Human Strength of Bowhill Engineering

When people think of Bowhill Engineering, they picture steel. Giant beams, robotic welders, and projects like South Australia's Torrens to Darlington link — infrastructure that shapes skylines. The fabrication sheds themselves are vast monuments of industry. But behind the noise of grinders and the gleam of steel lies the true strength of Bowhill: its people.

From Mannum to Murray Bridge, from welders to accountants, Bowhill's workforce is stitched together by shared values, local pride, and a culture that places community at its core. This is not simply a company — it is a family built on resilience, mentorship, and mateship.

#### A Culture of Celebration

On July 16, the workforce gathered not for deadlines or blueprints, but for their monthly "Celebration Hour." It is a tradition started two decades ago by director Jeremy Hawkes, born from a simple idea: stop, reflect, and celebrate wins before moving on to the next challenge. What began as a casual barbecue has become a cornerstone of the company's culture.

That day, after sausages and stories, staff tried their hand at clay target shooting. For some, it was a first. For others, a familiar hobby. But the point wasn't the scores. It was the laughter, the encouragement, and the reminder that teamwork matters whether you're welding beams or aiming at flying discs.

#### **Diversity and Belonging**

Bowhill's 60-plus staff are as diverse as the projects they deliver. Munashe, a boilermaker from Zimbabwe, says he feels "respected and cherished." Rasadari, an accountant from Sri Lanka, values the "down-to-earth leadership and calm workplace." For locals, the draw is simple: a good job close to home, in a workplace that truly cares.

HR manager Samantha Krollig, with the company for 18 years, oversees a wellbeing calendar packed with events, one-on-one check-ins, and quarterly programs to grow emerging leaders. She sees the impact every day: loyalty, stability, and a workplace where people genuinely look out for one another.

#### **Growing Leaders, Building Futures**

CEO Jodie Hawkes often says Bowhill's greatest investment is in its people. The evidence is clear. Tom began as a metal worker 16 years ago and is now General Manager. David started with a two-week work placement straight out of university — today he's Senior Project Manager, leading multi-million-dollar projects.

Such growth isn't accidental. It reflects a deliberate strategy to nurture talent, provide opportunity, and recognise that leadership is forged in trust and mentorship, not just qualifications.

#### **Anchored in Values**

Both Jeremy and Jodie lead differently but share the same vision. Jeremy, steady and reflective, carries the

quiet strength of someone who has endured personal loss — the death of his brother Simon in 2002 — and channelled it into perspective. For him, family and relationships matter most.

Jodie, vibrant and approachable, balances warmth with tough love. She is quick to laugh, yet unwavering on safety and integrity. "Everyone must go home safe — every single day," she insists. Her leadership extends beyond the office, living at home with her daughters, who also work part-time at Bowhill while studying.

Together, they form a leadership duo grounded in authenticity: one reflective, one dynamic, both deeply committed to people and place.

#### **More Than Steel**

At Bowhill, stories matter as much as steel. Like the painter who was given time off to take his mother, battling cancer, to see her favourite singer — a memory more valuable than any paycheck. Or the retiree farewelled with barbecues, banter, and a song sung together under the Murraylands sky. Yes, Bowhill Engineering builds bridges and beams. But what it truly builds is trust, community, and a sense of belonging. Steel may hold up highways, but it is people who hold up Bowhill. That is the real story. That is the legacy. And it is stronger than steel.



# A Dragon with a Big Heart A Mannum Story That Flew to New Zealand

Each August, the SALA Festival lights up South Australia with colour, creativity, and connection—and this year, Mannum joined in with two lively exhibitions at the Community Gallery and Mannum Community College. Among the artworks, one story stood out: an imaginative collaboration between history teacher Angela Groves and her Year 9 student, Mia. It all began with a dragon.

#### Barry the 2nd: Big, Bold, and Lonely

Barry the 2nd looks every bit the fearsome fire-breather, towering in detail and strength. But as his creators explained, his story carries a softer heart.

"He looks tough, but he's just lonely," said Ms. Groves. "All he really wants is a friend."

Mia imagined Barry as a misunderstood creature, and together she and Ms. Groves shaped his story. In it, a brave girl named

Lucy offers Barry a cookie. That simple act of kindness sparks a friendship, and soon the villagers begin to see Barry differently too. The dragon once feared becomes a beloved friend.

"It was all Mia's vision," Ms. Groves said proudly.

#### A Story That Travels

Although Mia couldn't attend the SALA opening due to illness, her artwork and story were proudly displayed: her detailed pencil drawing of Barry the 2nd, her written tale, and something extraordinary—a custom-designed postage stamp and envelope.

The drawing itself shows a majestic dragon mid-flight, wings stretched wide and eyes wise yet gentle. With just pencil and imagination, Mia created a creature full of emotion and power.

The stamp and envelope came about thanks to Ms. Groves, who shared Mia's work with a friend at New Zealand Post. So inspired was the friend that they helped arrange for Barry the 2nd to feature on a custom stamp. It wasn't part of a contest, just a heartfelt gesture to ensure Mia's creativity reached beyond Mannum.

This wasn't Mia's first recognition. In 2023, she won the state's inaugural Stamp Design Competition in the 6–9 age group, designing a postcard commemorating Remembrance Day. Now, at only fourteen, her teacher believes she is just beginning to show her potential.

"She's incredible," Ms. Groves said. "Talented, thoughtful, kind, and full of creativity. I hope she's as proud of herself as I am."

#### A Festival of Heart

The SALA Festival is about more than showcasing art—it's about celebrating people and stories. In Mannum, that story is of a dragon with a big heart, a young artist's imagination, and a teacher's unwavering belief in her student.

Barry the 2nd may have started as a classroom project, but thanks to courage, creativity, and connec-

tion, he now soars far beyond school walls—in print, on stamps, and in the hearts of all who encounter him.

More than a dragon, Barry represents the power of mentorship and the magic that happens when creativity is nurtured. And perhaps, somewhere in imagination, Barry is still waiting with a cookie to share with a new friend.



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# Bobby Hunter: Mannum's Music, South Australia's Legend

Bobby Hunter called Mannum home, but his music, humour, and energy reached far beyond the town's riverbanks. For more than 25 years aboard the PS Murray Princess, he turned river cruises into celebrations of song, laughter, and community, making strangers feel like family within minutes.

Bobby passed peacefully at 82 on 1st August 2025, leaving behind a legacy that spanned across the Murraylands and beyond. From his early rock 'n' roll days in the late 1950s to his induction into the South Australian Music Hall of Fame in 2022, he performed with bands like The Rockasins, The Drifters, and The Esquires, appeared in landmark shows nationwide, and became a familiar, beloved face to music fans far and wide. Yet no matter the stage, he always returned to his Mannum and Murray roots.

Locally, Bobby left his mark everywhere — in Mannum, Tailem Bend, Murray Bridge, and far beyond. He played football and soccer, creating unforgettable moments for local clubs, and raced at the Murray Bridge Speedway before joining the crash crew and flag team. Known for his cheeky humour, he once "bum skied" behind a Ute in a downpour and ran a lap in skin-coloured bathers and steel-cap boots, leaving everyone in stitches.

Bobby's boundless energy was clear to anyone who knew him. As his son Trevor recalled in his eulogy: "If there was a Speedway meeting, we were there. If there was Speedway at two different meetings on the same weekend, we were there. Dad was often away working in the railways, so Mum would pack the car, load the race car on the trailer then tow it and meet Dad there— Rowley Park, Murray Bridge, Renmark, Waikerie, Whyalla..."

Family and community were at the centre of Bobby's life. He was a devoted dad to Cheryl, Robyn, and Trevor, and "Papa" to six grandchildren and six great-grandsons. He explored Australia with zest — travelling in buses, houseboats, trikes, and campers — always carrying laughter and joy with him.

Those who knew Bobby remember his music in his blood, his humour, and his gift for lifting a room. Cousin-in-law Bob Bowes, who shared 66 years of friendship with him, called Bobby "unforgettable both on and off the stage." Even in his later years, he never stopped giving. He supported Support Act, a charity for musicians and crew in crisis, and right until his final days, he was still at the keyboards, proving that age could never dim the fire of true passion. When the community gathered to say their final goodbye, more than 500 people joined in person and online — a farewell filled with music, laughter, and love, just as Bobby would have wanted.

Mannum, Tailem Bend, Murray Bridge, and South Australia have lost a familiar face, a quick laugh, and a rock 'n' roll heart. But Bobby's legacy lingers in every song played on the river, every story told about a speedway prank, every football tale, and every smile shared by those who knew him.

#### As one friend said after his passing:

"If Bobby is in heaven, they've got a band."

The Murray will keep flowing, and so will the music, laughter, and stories Bobby shared with all of us. His melody lives on in every bend of the river and every cheer along its banks. # Farewell to Queen Rhonda - A Tailem Bend Treasure

Tailem Bend has farewelled one of its most cherished community figures with the peaceful passing of Rhonda Faye Mik on June 25, 2025, at the age of 94.

Known affectionately as Mrs. Mik, Aunty Rhonda, Rhonny, or simply Rhonda, she was the much-loved wife of the late Dave (deceased), mother and mother-in-law of Brian (deceased) and Michelle, Chris and Judy, and Darren and Fouziah. She was adored by her grandchildren Nikki, Scott, Kim, Tylor, Jarrah, Lawson, Grady, Tyson, and great-grandchildren Kaiden, Charlotte and Noah.

To the town, Rhonda was more than a family matriarch—she was an icon of community life. Murray Bridge News spoke to longtime friend Pauline Merritt, who shared heartfelt memories of their deep and decades-long friendship. "It's a very sad time for our small community," Pauline said. "I recall my parents telling me that Rhonda used to work for them in Hughes' Café. They adored her—they said she was a pretty, spirited young girl."

Their friendship deepened when Pauline began working at the hair salon situated in what is now the storeroom at the Tailem Bend Bakery, "Rhonda came in every week for her hairdo. When wigs came in, I'd help her put it on before she went out to face the day," she laughed.

Running the Tailem Bend Bakery with her husband for many years, Rhonda shared some valuable advice with Pauline when she bought the hair salon - "She told me, 'A business runs on a third: wages, expenses, and profit.' And she knew what she was talking about. Every group she touched—from the footy club and Taberefta, to the Friends of the Hospital and even the communities' Mothers & Babies—she ran like a tight ship and always made things thrive."

Though 13 years apart in age, Rhonda and Pauline shared countless memoriesweekends at the Coorong, billiard room parties, and years of raising kids, side by side. Pauline recalled the time when Rhonda's husband. Dave, added red

cherries to Jubilee cakes, straying from the usual coconut topping. "Rhonda hated it! Dave disappeared to the pub, and the cherries were never to be seen again," she said.

A fierce supporter of the Tailem Bend Eagles and the local netball, Rhonda never missed a game. Even as mobility became a challenge, her trusty gopher got her to the sidelines. "She'd ask herself, 'Where to today?' and grab a suitable name tag. She was out more than most people half her age," Pauline said. Rhonda remained active in community life into her 90s—delivering Tailem Topics just weeks before her passing, handling her own banking online, and attending lunches, bus trips, library events, and historian meetings.

"She never stopped. She had her hair done weekly by Kay; then Tammy took over with home visits. She always looked lovely, lipstick on, ready to go. She was 'Queen Rhonda' to us." Even local shopkeepers knew her routine. If she needed help getting her walker off the gopher, someone always came. "Frank the Tailem Bend Hotel publican would always help her adjust her wheels so she could head home to lunch," Pauline remembered fondly.

"Rhonda looked after her community, and in return, we looked after her. She taught us all something through her independence, kindness, and determination." With warmth, wit, and a life of tireless service, Rhonda Mik has left a legacy that will live on in the hearts of all who knew her.

"Dear Rhonda," **Pauline said softly,**"I hope you're getting your cappuccino and doughnuts in heaven. Rest easy, my friend.
There'll never be another like you."

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#### ■ August 2025 (Edition 72)

It was sad to hear that one of the first houses in Tailem Bend, on the corner of Granites Rd and Railway Terrace, was destroyed by fire on 20 August.

The 2025 LGA Roads & Works Conference was recently held at The Bend Motorsport Park in Tailem Bend.

Hosted by Coorong Council, it brought together council staff, elected members, and industry experts from across South Australia to share ideas, explore innovations, and take part in workshops and tours, it was a great opportunity to showcase our region.

Council reviewed the Mayor Seeking Legal Advice Policy, which clarifies when the Mayor or Deputy Mayor can seek legal advice independently of the CEO. The policy ensures timely, well-informed decisions are made whilst maintaining good governance.

A decision to dissolve the Tailem Bend Town Hall Committee as a Sec 41 Committee of Council was adjourned to allow more time to consider the best way forward. If you are interested in being involved with the stewardship of the Hall, please let an Elected Member know.

The Mayor was elected to represent the region on the SA Drought Advisory Group, which provides advice on the impact of drought and the support that's needed.

Elected Members have agreed to put money towards the Community Library at Meningie, this project was started over 10 years ago. The agreement sees the Council pay less money than originally planned and over multiple financial years.

It was also pleasing to learn that the Minister has removed the restrictive encumbrances over **Wadmore House** at Meningie, giving Council more flexibility to look at all options for the site.

Good debt at a council level can be a smart way to invest in long-term community assets like infrastructure, libraries, essential services and recreational facilities. Spreading the cost through intergenerational debt is fairer, as future users also help pay. Good debt also lets councils deliver projects sooner, avoiding rising costs and missed opportunities.

Planning for the next five years is underway, and Council will engage with residents to shape a shared Community Vision Plan (Strategic Plan). Sessions will be held in places where the community already gathers, making it easy for everyone to get involved.

Council is proposing changes to the management of the Tintinara Residential Units to help ensure all four units can be fully occupied. As part of this process, the community will be invited to provide feedback on the future of the units before any final decision is made.

EM's voted not to accept the Audit & Risk Minutes due to one issue. What began as a straightforward proposal to give Coonalpyn Pool Canteen volunteers a small, delegated allowance to buy food items has, two years later, resulted in two sets of legal advice, a special meeting request refused, and a process not followed. I gave a personal statement to the chamber, voicing my disappointment in the handling of this matter.

In June 2025, 267 transactions were processed at the Coonalpyn Caravan Park and 253 in July. These numbers have increased, once again, from the previous year (June 218 and July 243)

The Mayor will be heading to Canberra for meetings around the SA Algal bloom crisis affecting coastlines of SA and the Coorong. The aim is to get stronger Federal support to assist with clean up and management.

Locally, I've asked to see a condition report done on the Coonalpyn Playground. I have concerns about how small children access the slippery dip, when there is no ladder and only a climbing wall leading to the top of the slide. I also enquired about the bark "soft fall" and was told that this material is still within regulations.

I thanked the Council for the quick work they did in replacing the old, cracked cement that leads into the Coonalpyn Hall (the one used by voters when polling is conducted in the Hall) and for the work they did with tidying up the Coonalpyn Cemetery and installing an access gate on the southern side.

As pool season approaches, and prior to our Sept meeting, I've asked to see the Council's report on what avenues have been explored to ensure that the morning swim sessions can continue to happen.





# Welcome to this month's Council update Around the District

Throughout the past month Coorong District Council has undertaken a range of activities, events and delivered programs across the district.

The Community Facilities team have updated the gates and perimeter fencing at the Coonalpyn Cemetery, cleaned debris from a stormwater channel at Meningie, repaired paving at the Meningie public toilets, cleaned BBQs at Tintinara, painted posts and rails at the Tailem Bend Function Centre and conducted tree trimming around the district.

Rural road users were supported through the annual **patrol grading program**, with 276km of unsealed roads graded during July 2025.

Unsealed road renewal works continued to occur on Taunta Hut Road, Deepwater with 4km completed in July; works will continue into mid-August 2025.

#### Carcuma Road Stage 2 Upgrade

The final stages of the Carcuma Road upgrade are nearing with pavement construction underway and trimming works from Southern Cross Road to the Council boundary in progress. Final sealing works are are scheduled to occur in September 2025.

#### **Tintinara Apex Park Upgrade**

The Tintinara Apex Park has received a fresh new look, with upgrade works now complete and perimeter fencing newly installed. This enhancement not only boosts the park's visual appeal but also significantly improves safety especially for families with young children. The new fencing provides a secure barrier between the play

area and the busy Dukes Highway, making it a more welcoming spot for travellers to pause, relax, and enjoy the local surroundings.

At the August Council meeting Elected Members nominated Mayor Simmons appointed as Council's to the SA Drought nominee Advisory Group. The group provide coordinated advice at the State level on drought impacts and support needs. The appointment is a natural fit and continues the Mayor's involvement in the drought space to date.

The Council has also appointed the Mayor to join a delegation of South Australian mayors and industry experts to visit Canberra at the end of August. The delegation will advocate for stronger Federal government support for the algal bloom impacting South Australia's Mayor Simmons coast. will represent the Coorong and Murray Mouth area.

The 2025/26 – 2034/35 Long Term Financial Plan was adopted which aligns with Council's Community Vision Plan, Asset Management **Plans** other strategic and documents and provides guidance in relation to long term financial sustainability of Council.
