Hakea Highlights at Pangarinda

At Pangarinda Botanic Garden, two striking Hakea species can be admired. Hakea corymbosa, often called the cauliflower hakea, forms a dense, green, cauliflower-like shrub up to 2 m high. In spring, its very sharp leaves are covered with scented yellow-green flowers, creating a vibrant display.

Hakea cinerea—Latin for "ashy," referring to its blue-grey leaves—is a spreading shrub reaching 2–3 m high. Large, showy yellow flowers appear in the leaf axils at the ends of branches, maturing to a bright hue.

Both species are well known to native plant growers but are rarely available for sale. They naturally grow in neutral soils along the south coast of Western Australia, extending up to 70 km inland.

The Changing Face of Tailem Bend #156

This month, we look at the memories of two local identities: Jake Persello and Glenys Cocks.

Persello is State Snooker Champion

Tailem Bend's Jake Persello is set to head to the Australian Snooker Championship in October, after recently winning the state under-15 title in Adelaide. Six juniors aged 10 to 14 competed, with Jake winning 2-1 in a "very close and tense" final against 14-year-old Udit Lakra. Jake will now play in the national championships in Brunswick, Victoria, from October 2 to 4.

Jake said he was happy to have won the state championship and excited to compete in the national championship. He continues to practice about an hour a day on the pool table his father, Andy, built for both of them. At just 12 years of age, Jake adds this win to a growing list of titles, including Australian under-15 nine-ball champion and South Australian under-12 eight-ball champion.

Jake's Sights Set on Series

Jake is now aiming for the nine-ball World Series in Adelaide later this year, after being named under-15 nineball state champion. In a mixed competition, he outplayed two under-18 state champions to win the title.

However, he must first determine whether he needs to compete at the national titles in Sydney, which he won last year, to be eligible for the World Series. Persello said the series is something to work toward, as playing against international competitors would be different from Australian players. "Nine-ball is more mainstream in most countries," he added.

Persello Pots the Right Ball

Talented young nine-ball player Jake Persello has deservedly taken out The Murray Valley Standard/Fischer Motors Sports Star of the Month Award for August. Thirteen-year-old Persello seems unfazed by his success. With a recent win at the state under-18 competition, he is gearing up for the national competition in Sydney.

Jake said he is confident going to the competition, even though many of the players he will face are much older. The nationals will be the biggest competition he has played in, and if he wins, he will go on to play in the World Series in Adelaide — a goal he described as "amazing to reach."

Jake is busy practicing every day at home and travels to Adelaide weekly to train with Murray Bridge sportsman Bruce Pearson. At this stage, he is the only competitor from South Australia heading to Sydney, and his parents are proud of his achievements. His father, Andy, said Jake showed promise from an early age and was already defeating players in local competitions with 30 more years' experience.

Jake is now seeking sponsors to help cover the costs associated with travelling around the country to represent South Australia, and hopefully, soon, Australia.

The Changing Face of Tailem Bend #156

Glenys Cocks: Supportive as Anyone Can Be

After 26 years at Tailem Bend Primary School, Glenys Cocks has been a quiet but steadfast support to staff and students.

Glenys insists she is "just an ordinary person," but for the staff and students of Tailem Bend Primary School, she supported them in every way possible. "I'd rather remain anonymous. I've done no more than anyone else," she says.

Mrs Cocks arrived in Tailem Bend in 1960 with her husband, a railway worker, and their three boys. She had another son soon after, making life "pretty hectic" with four young males in the house. "They were all sports mad and played football and cricket for Tailem Bend... I was always in the canteen or taking the team around to different places."

Glenys Cocks spent 26 years as Tailem Bend Primary School's support officer.

Mrs Cocks began her role as a Support Officer **(SSO)** in 1975, a position she held for 26 years. "It was wonderful. I worked in the library, did speech programs, and helped with special education. I went on most school camps, mostly as the cook," she said.

"Special education was very rewarding. The kids may have problems, but they are wonderful children. Any subject they did, we helped with — cooking, art, lifestyle activities. It did a lot for their self-esteem."

She remembers in particular the primary school winning a national Wattle Day competition, which earned the school a computer. "With the pom-poms we made in foot-

ball colours and sold, we raised enough money to buy an outdoor setting for the school."

Mrs Cocks retired from the SSO position at the end of term three last year. Students, staff, and friends gave her a farewell, sending their best wishes. "I didn't want any big hoo-ha. The staff and kids gave me a lovely farewell. There were lots of faxes from former staff because over 26 years, you work with a lot of people. It was a sad day, but I was ready to go. I will always miss it, of course."

Mrs Cocks moved to Murray Bridge 15 years ago after the

death of her husband but still holds the memories close to her heart. Originally from Elliston on the Eyre Peninsula, she trained as a nurse at Port Pirie, where she met her husband.

One of the personal milestones in her life was visiting Burma

with her sister to see their father's grave; he died in Changi Prison Camp when she was four. "Going over there was very special. It was something I had always wanted to do. It was different not having a father around; we lived with my grandmother and grandfather, so I suppose he was our father figure. Mum was fairly special because we didn't have a dad."

Aside from her efforts at Tailem Bend, Mrs Cocks has been involved with the Lioness Club for about 15 years, including the last two years with the Twin Lions Club. "The Lions Club is a wonderful organisation. They really helped me after my husband died. I have got a lot of satisfaction out of working to do things in the town."

Motivating Book Launch

Join us in celebrating the voice of a new generation—one that is thoughtful, powerful, and just getting started. The Murray Bridge Library will be hosting an inspiring book launch at 10 am on Wednesday, October 15, 2025. Simon Goodridge is a thirteen-year-old local author, who has turned his own life experiences into a moving story about courage, self-belief, and hope.

Simon, who lives in regional South Australia with his greataunt Diane, great-uncle Colin, and younger half-brother Dominic, has spent the past three years drafting a book that began as a simple character sketch and evolved into a fulllength novel. Diagnosed with autism (Level 2), Simon has always seen the world through a unique lens—and now, he is ready to share that vision with readers.

The novel follows the journey of Jay, a 12-year-old boy who dreams of singing but struggles with self-doubt and feeling "different." As Jay finds his voice, builds relationships, and starts a family, the story explores deep themes of resilience and love—even as Jay's child faces leukemia. The story, though fictional, is grounded in Simon's subjective experiences and the challenges he has faced growing up.

"I didn't mean to write a book," Simon shares. "I just started writing about someone like me. But then the story kept growing."

What began as a creative outlet for Simon at age nine blossomed into a powerful narrative about identity, family, and the strength found in life's hardest moments.

One of his favourite parts of the book is the Thompson family—a fictional family, who reflect, love, loyalty and the hope that can carry us through the darkest times.

"Even when everything feels like it's falling apart," Simon says, "they turn the page and start a new chapter. That's what I want people to remember."

Despite his challenges, including navigating life across two households and balancing relationships with half-siblings from both parents' sides, Simon has remained grounded by the support of his guardians and brother. Their encouragement, along with Simon's natural empathy and curiosity, helped shape a book that speaks honestly and directly from the heart. The September launch will feature an author talk where Simon will share how the book came to life, how he used research and imagination to build his world, and what he hopes readers—young and old—will take away from it. Industry guests, educators, librarians, families, and the wider community are warmly invited to attend.

"Simon's story is a reminder to all of us, that creativity knows no age," said a library spokesperson. "His voice is authentic, brave, and incredibly moving."

Simon hopes his readers will walk away with one simple truth: anything is possible when you believe in yourself.

Changes in My Aged Care regarding advocates/representatives

From **1 November 2025**, a new role called a **Registered Supporter** will replace the current "advocate/representative" system in My Aged Care.

If you already have a representative set up, that person will automatically become your registered supporter unless you choose to opt out.

What Does a Registered Supporter Do?

- A registered supporter is someone you choose to help you understand information and make decisions about your aged care.
- They can talk with My Aged Care, assessors, and service providers on your behalf.
- Most importantly you still remain the decision-maker.
 The supporter is there to help, not to take over.

Who Can Be a Supporter?

- Usually a trusted friend, family member, or carer.
- You can have more than one supporter.
- Supporters must act honestly, respect your wishes, and put your wellbeing first.

From 1 November 2025, a new 'Registered Supporter' role will replace the current My Aged Care representative system. If you already have a representative, they will automatically become your supporter unless you choose to opt out. Talk to your family or a trusted friend now if you would like someone to support you in understanding information or making aged care decisions. You can also speak with TBCC staff if you'd like help checking or recording your information.

Advance Care Directives - Why They Matter

Life can be unpredictable, and sometimes circumstances arise when you may not be able to make decisions about your own health care, living arrangements, or personal matters.

An **Advance Care Directive (ACD)** is a legal document that allows you to record your wishes, values, and preferences in advance, giving you the peace of mind that your voice will be heard if you can't speak for yourself.

What is an Advance Care Directive?

An ACD is a written plan where you can:

- Appoint a trusted person (called a Substitute Decision Maker) to speak on your behalf.
- Outline your preferences for medical treatment, lifestyle choices, and future care.
- Record what matters most to you your values, beliefs, and wishes.

It ensures that doctors, carers, and family members have clear guidance about what you want, reducing stress and uncertainty in difficult times.

Why Do You Need One?

Having an ACD is about choice and control. It:

- Protects your right to be heard even if you cannot speak.
- Prevents confusion or family disagreements during emergencies.
- Gives you confidence that your care aligns with your values.

Many people think ACD's are only for the elderly, but the truth is they're important for everyone. Illness or accidents can happen at any age.

Why It's Important Someone You Trust Knows Where to Find It

Completing an ACD is just the first step. It is equally important to make sure:

- Your Substitute Decision Maker knows about it.
- Family, carers, or close friends know where it is kept.
- Copies are shared with your doctor, hospital, or anyone who may need to act quickly in an emergency.

An ACD tucked away in a drawer can't help you when it's needed most.

How TBCC Can Help

At the Tailem Bend Community Centre, your wellbeing is our priority. TBCC staff may ask you a few questions about AC D's and record key information for emergency situations. This is not about taking over your choices – it's about ensuring that if something happens, the people who care for you can access the information they need quickly and respectfully.

Creating and sharing your ACD is one of the most important gifts you can give yourself and those who love you.














The Tailem Bend Country Fire Service (CFS) welcomed its new captain, Dylan Collett, during the brigade's annual Open Day on Sunday, August 31, 2025 – an event that once again drew strong community support.

Dylan, who has been with the Tailem Bend brigade for five years, said he was honoured to be elected captain and grateful for the confidence shown by his fellow volunteers.

"I was quite shocked to receive it, but it was really good to see that the brigade rallied behind it and voted me in," he said. "The best thing about the CFS is the family you gain. You create one big friendship group that looks out for each other."

The Open Day gave residents a chance to learn more about the work of the CFS, from responding to road crashes and house fires to assisting the SES at incidents across the region. 


BOOK REVIEW

The Pearl of Tagai Town By: Lenora Thaker

Primarily set in far northeast Queensland in the decades leading up to, during and immediately after the Second World War, Lenora Thaker's debut novel, The Pearl of Tagai Town, is the tale of one young woman's extraordinary grit and vision for her life.

It's also a love story to warm the coldest of hearts.

This immersive, propul-



sive novel is a clear-eyed portrait of a time and a community navigating racism, including horrifying violence, segregation and oppression, wartime tragedies, and the general hardships and joys of life. The characters are irresistible, and the local languages woven throughout are as evocative as Thaker's narrative. This is the kind of book you'll want to read again immediately, and will appeal to fans of Kate Grenville, Pip Williams and Anita Heiss.



■ September 2025 (Edition 73)

Spring is here and it's been nice to see the colours of the landscape change. At the Sept meeting we paid tribute to **Patti Connolly** who passed away at the age of 95. Cr Maidment read a tribute touching on some of her achievements and community work.

A 10-year lease (with a right of renewal for a further 10 years) was granted to the **Meningie Bowling Club**

We were delighted to welcome year 4/5/6 students from **Coomandook Area School**, who shared with us their creative ideas and solutions for easing traffic congestion on Granites Road, Tailem Bend.

A report on morning swim sessions at the **Coonalpyn Pool** was noted, and a motion was moved by me (*seconded by Cr Pietzsch*) to clarify that afternoon swim sessions from 4:00 to 6:00 pm on weekdays will operate with one lifeguard and one additional person present, while morning sessions will require two Council staff members as the canteen will not be open. Council also acknowledged the challenges of resourcing the morning sessions and noted that engaging an external provider may incur additional costs. It was further resolved to trial a 7:00 to 9:30 am morning swim time, with attendance records to be kept determining the most suitable timeslot.

The new sealed carpark at the **Coonalpyn Pool** is finished with a slight drainage issue being rectified. The Tailem Bend Railway Terrace Carpark design has been finalised, with work likely to commence in late 2025 and be completed by Feb 2026

Cr Arthurs' three motions to remove the declaration of drought and to postpone rates for primary producers and the industries that support them, lapsed without a seconder, meaning no vote was required. This sent a clear message that the chamber continues to recognise our region is in drought. At this stage, postponement of rates does not compromise our capacity to provide services. Supporting those who keep our region employed and viable is not only compassionate but also fiscally responsible, because if our primary producers, who contribute around 70% of rates, and

their supporting industries collapse, the long-term cost to the entire community will be far greater.

In 2024/25 \$10M worth of projects in the District were completed. The contract for the new Coonalpyn Toilets has been awarded with construction expected to start in late 2025 and be completed by Feb 2026. The old toilets will remain in place and operational until then.

Sadly, the **Narrung Jetty** is in far worse condition than expected, with serious safety risks that will require significant funding to address. Built in 1877 to service mail steamers, the jetty quickly became central to the life of Narrung, handling not only mail but also produce, stock, and passengers. While its role has shifted over the years, the jetty remains a valued community asset. Council will be briefed in January 2026 about costs and funding options.

During 2024/25, Council spent \$1,681,273 re-sheeting 30.6km of its unsealed road network. This was less than the annual target of 35kms, due to dry conditions and extra costs involved with water cartage, along with a long lead for localised rubble. The 25/26 budget will see \$2.727 million spent on Pascoe, Todd, Burns, Jabuk South, Loveday, Cantara Deepwater, Taunta Hut, Buccleuch North and Klitscher Roads.

Council has funded a district-wide **banner pole upgrade**, starting in Tintinara with the replacement of 16 old poles. Eight new pulley-style poles will be installed, while four of the old poles with decorations will be gifted to the **Tintinara Action Club**. Expansion to other towns is planned in future years.

Childcare: Recent community consultation confirmed an immense need for additional long day care in the district, with two-thirds of parents reporting they are heavily impacted by the lack of childcare. Surveyed families indicated they would work an average of 25 extra hours per week if they could access three days of childcare. According to the 2021 ABS, there were 245 children aged 0–4 years in the Coorong and 1,016 people providing unpaid care for children. A report is being prepared that will assist in discussions with State and Federal ministers, agencies, and key stakeholders, as well as support future funding applications.

Welcome to this month's the annual patrol grading program, Council update **Around the District**

Throughout month the past Coorong District Council has undertaken a range of activities, events and delivered programs across the district.

The Community Facilities team were busy with winter mowing across the district, repairing the irrigation valve at the Tailem Bend Football Oval, and topping up soft fall mulch at the Peake Playground.

The Meningie entrance sign has had its lighting and wiring replaced, now brightening up and welcoming everyone to town again.

Almost 350 chairs at the Tailem Bend Town Hall have also had a spring steam clean and are now ready for this year's festive season.

Throughout August, approximately 368.2km of unsealed roads was graded across the district as part of

improving road safety, accessibility, and travel conditions for rural road users.

Unsealed Road Renewal Program

Planning is underway for the 2025/26 program, with scoping underway for rubble quarries to support future works. This program aims to enhance road durability. safety, and access for rural communities.

Renewal works on **Buccleuch** North Road at Peake have seen a 3.1km re-sheet completed in mid-September 2025.

The next stage of renewal is scheduled to begin on Jabuk South Road, Carcuma by 29 September 2025, covering 5.5km from the Tauragat Well Road intersection north to the Ladara Bore Road intersection. These works are anticipated to take approximately 5 to 7 weeks, further strengthening the region's unsealed road network.

Carcuma Road Stage 2 Upgrade

The final stages of the Carcuma Road upgrade are approaching, with final sealing works scheduled to occur in October 2025.

Coonalpyn Changing Places Public Toilet Facility

Work is moving ahead on the new Places toilet Changing at Coonalpyn. Trees have been cleared from the site, and Council is now working through changes to power, water. and wastewater services. Construction of the toilet facilities is expected to commence in the coming months following the completion of site preparation.

Key Decisions

At the September Council meeting Members received a findings report on Early Childhood Education and Care following engagement with the community earlier this year. The report will be used as an advocacy piece, with data and evidence to support and address the childcare gaps across the district.

The Meningie Bowling Club's lease was renewed for 10 years, with an option for another 10 — giving the club certainty for future planning.

The Coonalpyn Swimming Pool opening hours were reviewed ahead of the 2025/26 season; a trial of changed morning swim hours (7am - 9:30am on weekdays) was endorsed for the upcoming season. Afternoon and weekend hours will remain the same.

Council also received a report on the Narrung Jetty, following its closure in July due to safety risks. Options and costings will continue to be investigated, as well as funding opportunities for renewal of the jetty.

Thought for the Month - A Prince of the People

Princess Dianna was considered to be the People's 'Princess' connecting with people from all walks of life and appeared equally at ease with royalty and those who were marginalised by society.

She mixed with people suffering from HIV and other contagious diseases. She visited countries in which the people lived alongside unexploded ordinance. Wherever she went she was followed by the press and so her actions, though criticised by some, shone a spotlight on problems people faced all over the world, spurring action to remedy these situations.

Jesus also attracted attention wherever he went as he preached the Gospel and healed the physically and mentally sick. Matthew 15 v. 29-32 Perhaps he could be called the 'Prince of the People'. He also had those who criticised his work. Those who were horrified to see him with 'sinners', mainly the Pharisees who thought salvation would come when all the Jews keep God's Laws.

People who were shunned by society were perceived to have broken God's Law. When Jesus entered Jericho he saw Zacchaeus, a tax collector, and told him,

'Come down immediately. I must stay at your house today'. All the people began to mutter that Jesus was going to be a guest of a sinner. When Jesus ate dinner at Matthew's house, another tax collector, the Pharisees asked, 'Why does your teacher eat with tax collectors?' Jesus' reply was, 'It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick....... I have not come to call the righteous but sinners'. Matthew 19 v 10-13.

We are asked to love our neighbour and this means those who are marginalised in our society as well as those people we consider worthy of being loved. There is rejoicing in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents. Every sin and blasphemy will be forgiven men, but the blasphemy against the Holy Spirit.


