Records Shattered at The Bend!

Tailem Bend came alive earlier this month as locals and visitors alike gathered for the 2025 Spring Nationals at Dragway at The Bend. With over 22,000 people filling the grandstands and campgrounds, the town was buzzing as families, racers, and fans celebrated a weekend of high-speed excitement and community pride.

Under perfect spring skies, the atmosphere was electric. The event saw John Ricca make history with a 5.406-second pass, the fastest ever by an Outlaw Pro Mod in Australia, clocking an incredible 270.94 mph (436 km/h). Not to be outdone, Damian Harris broke his own Top Fuel national speed record, reaching 333.51 mph (536.82 km/h) — proving once again that The Bend is home to Australia's quickest dragstrip.

"This track just hooks up," Ricca said after his record-breaking run. "The Bend is hands down the best surface in the country. We came here to push the limits—and we did."

But it wasn't just about the records. The event brought together people from across the region, with locals volunteering, businesses welcoming visitors, and families enjoying the sights and sounds. The off-track entertainment — from live music and free kids' activities to open pit access — created a festival feel that showcased the strong community spirit The Bend is known for.

Campgrounds quickly sold out, with additional sites opened to meet demand, as friends and families gathered around barbecues and shared stories late into the night.

Alistair MacDonald, CEO of Shell V-Power Motorsport Park, said the weekend was a testament to both the track and the town: "This weekend reaffirmed why The Bend is now recognised as Australia's fastest and most complete motorsport destination."

As the final round of the Professional Drag Racing Championship (PDRC), the Spring Nationals was not only a milestone for racers but a celebration for the entire region. With the Bend Classic and Country Music Festival just around the corner on October 24–26, the spirit of Tailem Bend is set to keep shining — both on the track and in the hearts of those who call it home.

The Changing Face of Tailem Bend #157

It is a long running series, submitted on behalf of the late Peter Connolly.

This month, we look at memories of the Railway Station and Railway men, as well as the Coorong District Council's new truck.

Memories from People in Our Community - Russell Nuske – Jervois

Jervois man Russell Nuske, 64, was born on April 10, 1942, at Mannum. His parents are both deceased, but one brother, Beven, lives in Millicent.

Russell's wife Phyllis (née Osborne) was born in Mt Gambier in 1942. They married in 1964 at Millicent and have six daughters, eight granddaughters, and five grandsons. Russell shares a few memories from times gone by.

Money

We never had money on the farm, but we were never without food or clothes. My first taste of real money was when I left the farm and got myself a job. Back in the day, petrol was about 15 cents a gallon (4.5 litres). the national competition in Sydney.

School

All my schooling was done at Cambrai. Back then, Grades 1 to 7 were all in one room. I did one and a half years of high school and left at 14 years of age to work on the farm and do woodcutting.

I remember a school prank in 1952 — we cleaned the fireplace daily, and on one occasion, when putting in the wood for the next morning, we also slipped in a firecracker. The next morning, the teacher lit the fire and moments later there was a big bang — wood flew everywhere! We didn't get into trouble because the teacher never found out who did it!

Food

Back in the 1950s and 1960s, we milked our own cows and made butter from the cream separated from the milk. We had our own fowls and killed our own meat.

When times got tough, we'd eat rabbit — affectionately known as "underground mutton." Grandma used to make a good old hare pie.

Clothes

I've never been a keen collar-and-tie person, although I'll wear them

when the occasion calls for it. I was always in shorts, summer and winter, except when proper clothes were required.

Sport

I played competitive table tennis and badminton in Millicent and Bordertown, and enjoyed a bit of social golf. I've always liked following cricket, especially the test series.

I won a couple of trophies for table tennis at Millicent — A Grade Association Champion — but otherwise, I wasn't into much competitive sport.

First Car

My first vehicle was a light green FG Utility (I wish I still had it!). I paid \$37 per month for two years.

I once drove it from Millicent to Mannum and remember going flat out along the Coorong between Salt Creek and Kingston at about 90 miles per hour, just to make it a smoother run — the road was very corrugated back then.

Media

Back in the '50s and '60s, we only had a wireless. I used to listen to the test cricket with my uncle — when it was played in England, we'd stay up until 2 a.m. to listen, often frustrated when the reception faded.

I also listened to Rocky Page's Country Western Show on Saturday nights (from memory).

Work

After leaving school, I stayed on the farm for a while before moving to Millicent, where I got a temporary job with the Engineering and Water Supply Department (E&WS) at age 19. I worked there for 37 years, transferring between Millicent, Coonalpyn, Bordertown, and finally Murray Bridge before finishing up.

Nights Out

On the farm, we often went spotlighting — sometimes until sunrise the next day. We didn't have many day trips; the farm kept us busy. When I had a girlfriend, we'd go to the local picture theatre in Mannum or the drive-in at Murray Bridge. I remember once going to the drive-in at Mount Gambier — the fog was so thick we couldn't see the movie! Didn't matter anyway.

The Coorong District Council's new compactor truck began its rounds last week, emptying the new 140-litre bins. From August 5th, all garbage must be presented in the new wheelie bins.

Council CEO Bill Paterson reminded residents not to place items beside the bin, as the new robotic arm cannot cater for this. Wheelie bins are now the property of the owner, so it's advisable to personalise them.

Instructions for use:

- Place bins as near as practicable to the edge of the road by 7 a.m. on collection day.
- The handle must face away from the road, toward the property.
- The lid must be closed.
- Keep at least one metre between the bin and any obstruction (trees, cars, posts, etc.).

The bin's contents will be compacted and buried, so ensure no hazardous waste, liquids, hot ashes, or large heavy items are inside.

Manager of Technical Services Trevor Gordon commented on the proposed recycling service, saying: "All urban areas will use the larger 240-litre bins, serviced monthly.

The recycling service will help conserve our natural resources and will cater for household recyclables such as rigid plastic containers, glass jars and bottles, steel and aluminium containers, milk and juice cartons, paper, and cardboard."

He added that waste transfer stations and landfill sites would receive recyclables free of charge. Mayor Heather Moore said she was very pleased with the success of the new collection service: "Apart from a late delivery of bins, everything has gone as well as we hoped! The new truck is functioning extremely well, and most residents have taken to the new bins. Many have commented positively on the convenience — and the improvement in cleanliness. Apart from complying with safe handling practices, we can virtually eliminate litter caused by animals ripping open garbage bags."

Mr. Gordon added that once towns and settlements were fully transitioned, the council would contact rural residents who had registered interest. "There will be collection points along the truck's travel routes for rural residents who'd benefit from using bins rather than taking rubbish to waste sites."

Mr. Paterson said: "Our council is taking proactive steps to better manage our waste. Part of this strategy is to progressively reform our dump sites from August 2002. We've had difficulties with unmonitored sites, so this will bring considerable change. We encourage anyone concerned about how these changes affect them to contact their nearest council office."

The Coonalpyn Show celebrates its 80th birthday Saturday, October 18, bringing together locals and visitors for a special day that captured the true essence of country life.

The quaint, community-driven event was filled with colour, character and nostalgia — everything you'd hope for from a small-town country show.

Among the special guests were Marleen and Bill Dunthorne, who lived in Coonalpyn for 65 years before moving to Murray Bridge. Marleen now in her 80s, was at the very first Coonalpyn Show in 1945 — and even won a prize as a four-year-old. "I fondly recall walking with mum to the showgrounds, collecting wildflowers along the way. Then we found a small tin and finally we tied a blue ribbon around the tin – mumgot that from a family friend as we passed her house," Marleen said. "It was a simple bouquet of beautiful, colufull native flowers – and I won the flower competition that year."

The show also welcomed international visitors, including New Zealander Zack Richards, who's working in Australia on a shearing visa. He said "Aussie shearers earn nearly double us New Zealanders - but I must admitted Merino sheep are much tougher to shear."

Crowds enjoyed a variety of attractions — from tyre bowling and cartoon drawing to crop and field exhibitions, sculpture displays and the ever-popular shearing competitions. The pavilion's flower displays were a highlight, judged by experts with more than 76 years of combined experience.

Entertainment came from the RSL Mt. Gambier Blue Lake Highland Pipe Band, while food stalls, horses, steam engines and trade displays ensured there was something for everyone.

It was an outstanding day — a true celebration of Murraylands country spirit.

The Jervois Hall has long been at the heart of its riverside community, and today it is more vibrant than ever. Led by Murray Bridge mum and qualified instructor Mads, the Thursday morning sessions have quickly grown into more than just exercise—they've become a weekly highlight for many. Classes run every Thursday at 9am during school terms, with the possibility of adding a 10am session if demand continues.

Mads brings not only her professional training but also her genuine passion for the values of yoga. "It's about creating space for everyone—whether your brand new to yoga or have been practicing for years," she said. "We focus on connection, kindness and giving people that one precious hour just for themselves."

Participants come with many different motivations. Some arrive after school drop-off for a little "me time." Others come seeking to ease ageing bodies and strengthen their minds. For some, it's simply a social outing—a chance to share laughter, form friendships, and sometimes continue the morning together with breakfast in Tailem.

"We've seen people walk in a little stressed or tired, and by the end of the session they're smiling, lighter, and ready to take on the day. It's not just yoga—it's community wellness at its best."

Leanne added that the improvements to the Jervois Hall grounds have also helped breathe new life into the venue. "The gardens look beautiful right now. It makes you feel proud of our little hall and what it offers."

With darts, dancing, markets and now yoga, the Jervois Hall continues to prove itself as more than just four walls—it's the beating heart of a strong, supportive community. And with spring in full bloom, there's no better time to roll out a yoga mat and join in.


In Horace and Company, Mannum author Peter Weir mentions a short story he calls perfect—just 600 words that capture a lifetime. Intrigued, I went searching for it and, after chatting with Peter, found myself inspired instead to share this gem: A Touch of Blues. Small, but full of heart and wisdom.

I was sitting at the piano, well more sideways on the stool, just noodling away with the right hand picking out the melodies of tunes long ago. Ann was in the kitchen, cooking up something nice for dinner. The smell of fried onions drifted in along with her soft voice quietly singing the words to the songs as I noodled. I remembered when we could finally afford the baby grand I was now sitting at.I hurried home from work, burst in through the front door, didn't even give Ann a hug and kiss as was usual.

"Has it arrived, yet?" I asked breathlessly.

She just stood back and there it was in the place we had always meant it to be. We were late to bed that night as we played and sang the songs of our youth when we were both musos, in between our daytime jobs. We didn't really think much about our day jobs. Ann was a school teacher and I was still studying part time to qualify as an accountant. In the meantime, I did day shift at a service station.

At night I led a three-piece combo. There was Bluey on bass, Curley on drums and me on the old eighty-eight. We were quite good. No false modesty, we had gigs most weekends. Sometimes we had an engagement that lasted several months. The venues were usually some sort of eating and drinking establishment. For many the music was incidental. They didn't listen, just got louder as the night wore on. Of course, we had to play softly so as not to disturb the "punters". As well, we couldn't always play what we wanted to. Progressive jazz was out. They wanted to hear the tune. We still played around with the tunes, the more so as the noise level rose and no one, except those close, could hear us. There were some afficionados who would gather around the piano.

One night Ann appeared with her boyfriend. He had other things on his mind but Ann was interested in the music. She came again the next night sans boyfriend. Late in the evening she asked if she could sing. Well singers were not our bag but we thought no one would hear her so what the heck. We

hit "Mood Indigo" running, and she stayed with us all the way. She sang it as though you were the only one in the room. The voice was smooth like honey and smokey, sort of like Julie London, only better as far as I was concerned. I turned up the amp. Suddenly the talking stopped and most were listening. By the end of the night, we had asked her to come to rehearsals and the trio had become a quartet for her voice was the fourth instrument.

Ann was fairly tall, perhaps five foot eight, dark hair, nice complexion, very shapely. On gigs she wore long ball gowns which emphasised her willowness. It added a touch of class to our act. Late night after one gig. I asked her to marry me. She laughed and asked what took me so long? We married, kept the music together for a little while then as the children arrived, settled down to a more usual life style. In one sense no regrets, and yet? I started to play "Satin Doll" with both hands. Ann came into the room, a smudge of flour on her cheek. She sang and it was wonderful.

Beautiful music, a beautiful woman and yet a touch of the blues!

Visit from Eremophila Study Group

On the weekend of October 11, fourteen members of the Eremophila Study Group—a branch of the Australian Plant Society (SA)—visited Pangarinda Botanic Garden.

Among them was Ken Warnes, the group's first leader when it was formed in 1972. Ken remains very active and passionate about Eremophilas to this day. It was fascinating to reflect on the group's original aims and see just how much has been achieved since then. The group still has around 150 members across Australia.

Their original objectives were to:

- 1. Draw attention to the attractiveness of many species within the genus, most of which were unknown to horticulture at the time.
- 2. Determine the conditions necessary for the successful cultivation of Eremophila species.
- 3. Select the most suitable species for garden culture.
- 4. Develop reliable propagation methods for easy production of stock plants.
- 5. Support one another through the free exchange of cuttings and seed.

Today, there are nearly 300 Eremophila species in cultivation—an incredible achievement. Before visiting Pangarinda, members stopped at Paul and Kaye Bartlett's home to view their impressive collection of Eremophila species. The current SA Leader, Tim Wood from Kadina, welcomed everyone. A meeting followed, discussing the lifespan of Eremophilas under garden conditions.

There was also plenty of friendly swapping of cuttings before lunch. Russell Wait, a grower and collector of over 50 years—and author of a book on growing Eremophilas—joined Ken and Tim in answering many questions.

After lunch, the group continued exploring Pangarinda before a few members departed just in time for dinner at the Wellington Hotel.

Come Drum with Us – Pat's Beats of Giving

If you've wandered down Walker Avenue on a Sunday afternoon in Mannum, you might hear it — the deep roll of drums, voices rising in rhythm, and laughter that comes when people are fully present. That's Riverbeats Drumming at work.

Led by local teacher Pat Kerkenaar, the weekly workshops bring people together in a way that's hard to describe until you sit in the circle yourself. There's no sheet music, no pressure, no auditions — just pick up a drum, join in, and let the rhythm find you. "Drumming isn't about being perfect," Pat explains. "It's about being present. Once you start, the beat carries you, and the whole group moves as one."

For many in Mannum, the sessions are more than a class. They're a release from the week, a chance to meet new friends, and a surprisingly good workout. Arms get stretched, hearts lifted, and minds find stillness in the steady pulse of the drum. One participant said, "I never thought I had any rhythm. But once Pat started teaching, something clicked. Now I look forward to it every week — it's the highlight of my Sunday." The drumming circle welcomes everyone: beginners, seasoned players, children, parents, and grandparents. Laughter often breaks out mid-rhythm when things go off-beat — all part of the fun. The group also performs at community markets, drum circles, and local events, spreading their energy wherever they go.

The Maid's Secret By: Shari J. Ryan

Totally heartbreaking and completely addictive World War Two historical fiction.

Czechoslovakia, 1942:
"Please don't take him,"
I plead to the Nazis. "I
love you, Mila," Ben says,
hoarsely. "So much. Forever.

In the mountains of Bohemia, Mila, a Romani, works as a maid for an aristocratic Jewish family. They have no idea that she and their son Ben, with his amber eyes and kind smile, are madly in love-it is expressly forbidden.

■ October 2025 (Edition 74)

There was plenty to discuss at our October meeting and condensing it all into one page is tricky!

Council unanimously voted to establish a Committee dedicated to examining the declining availability of health services in the district. The committee will provide advice and recommendations to Council with the goal of improving healthcare access and continuity of care across the region. Anyone with an interest in health care will be given the opportunity to apply to be on the committee.

Site preparation is now underway with the Coonalpyn Changing Toilets Project, with two trees removed to create space for the new toilet block and upgraded wastewater system. Upgrade works are scheduled to commence on the Meningie Toilet Block. Toilets will remain open during construction.

The Coonalpyn Pool AGM was held recently, and Elected Members (EM's) endorsed the appointments recommended by the committee. Council resolved to trial extended morning swim times (7:00am to 10:30am) during Nov and Dec to better understand when the community prefers to swim. This information will help determine the most suitable two-hour morning session for future seasons. Manufacturing of three new pool covers is underway, with installation expected in December 2025.

Council approved a \$200,000 community loan to the Meningie Community Sports Ground Inc. to support detailed engineering drawings for their proposed Sports Club project. Interest will apply to \$150,000 of the loan.

Mayor Simmons continues to be actively involved in meetings and briefings regarding ongoing drought conditions. While some areas have received small amounts of rain, many across the district remain in severe difficulty. Cr Qualman provided a written report following his attendance at the Murray–Darling Basin Conference. While the event delivered valuable insights, it remains concerning that many participants were unfamiliar with the Coorong region, a reminder of the ongoing need to raise awareness about our area's significance.

Extensive community consultation was undertaken for the Wellington East Water Supply project which will connect 220 households in the town to an SA Water pipe running along the Princes Highway. While responses were limited, as is often the case when most are satisfied, those who did contribute were mostly concerned about costs. After considerable debate, Council resolved to set a charge of UP TO \$2,750 per property, extend repayment over three years (instead of two), and apply a small, non-compounding interest fee. It remains in everyone's best long-term interest for SA Water to take over management of this service, as it will be more cost-effective than Council retaining it.

EM's supported a motion from the Northern Areas Council to the Local Government Association (LGA) calling for a united stance on current rate exemptions for large-scale energy projects, such as solar farms. These exemptions are inequitable and unfair to other ratepayers, given these companies rely on Council infrastructure funded by the broader community.

With the Terms of Reference now finalised, Council will soon invite expressions of interest from community members, particularly Coonalpyn residents, to join the Coonalpyn Hall Committee.

The Governance & Policy Committee (Cr Pietzsch, Cr Maidment and myself) are slowly working through all the Council's policies to ensure they align with rules, regulations and community expectations. These are then ratified by the Council at ordinary meetings.

A big thank you to our Community Facilities Teams across Meningie, Tintinara and Coonalpyn for their hard work and pride in keeping our towns looking great.

Council agreed to offer in-kind support to the Tintinara AS students who plan to seek grant funding to paint the Tintinara silos, a wonderful initiative that will add vibrancy and pride to the town.

EM's had the pleasure of visiting the Tailem Bend
Community Centre and speaking with CEO Tammy,
who shared the incredible range of services they
deliver, from preparing meals to transporting residents
to medical appointments. Their dedication and reach
across such a large area is truly impressive.

Welcome to this month's Unsealed Road Renewal Council update **Around the District**

Throughout the month past District Council has Coorong undertaken a range of activities, events and delivered programs across the district.

The Community Facilities team have painted the Tailem Bend Train Park's train and replaced the toddler swings. They also cleared vegetation at the Meningie Airfield to ensure safe clearances, resealed park furniture and railings in Meningie, removed storm damaged shades at Wadmore House and resealed the floors in the Tailem Bend Town Hall.

The annual patrol grading program saw 318km of unsealed roads graded across the district in September - improving road safety, accessibility, and travel conditions for rural road users.

Program

Renewal works on Buccleuch North Road at Peake are now complete.

Targeted maintenance works are now underway before commencing a 7km re-sheet of Loveday Bay Road and a 5.5km section of Jabuk South Road at Carcuma.

Carcuma Road - Final Stages

The final stage of the Carcuma Road upgrade is now underway. Cement stabilisation for the last section is complete - this process includes mixing cement with the road base, levelling it using GPS technology, compacting, and testing ensure it meets quality standards.

Final trimming and road sealing was completed mid-October. Line marking will be completed in late Community Sports Ground. October or early November.

Key Decisions

At the October Council meeting the Elected Members reviewed the community engagement findings from the proposed Wellington East Water Supply infrastructure a drinking upgrade to water standard, with the asset to then be handed over to SA Water at the end of the project. Taking into account the community feedback, the Council agreed to proceed with the project and set a separate rate for properties that will be serviced by the upgraded water supply service - payment options will include an up-front payment in full, or quarterly payments over three financial years (starting in 2026/27).

Elected Members also considered an application for a community group loan from the Meningie

The group, which is made up of five sporting clubs. local have developed a business case to build a modern sporting and community function centre that acts as a hub for Meningie and the wider Coorong district. The loan approved application was by Council at its October meeting, and will enable the group to finalise engineering plans and development approvals and bring the project to a 'shovel-ready' status (and apply for opportunities funding for the construction stage).

Council's draft Disability Access & Inclusion Plan 2025-2029 was also reviewed by members and released for community consultation, which commences on 27 October 2025. The document is available to view on Council's website.



ST PAUL...

Just after Jesus' crucifixion, the early Christians were in constant fear of arrest, persecution and even death. In Acts chapter 6 we can read the story of Stephen. He did, 'great wonders and miraculous signs among the people.'

Opposition arose against Stephen and he was brought before the Jewish Council with false witnesses accusing him of saying, 'This Jesus of Nazareth will destroy this place and change the customs Moses handed down to us.' V6.

Anger rose even more at the speech Stephen gave in his defence and he was dragged out of the city and stoned to death. One who watched and 'gave approval to his death' was a 'young man named Saul'. The stoning of Stephen led to, 'a great persecution against the church in Jerusalem.' 'Saul began to destroy the church. Going from house to house, he dragged off men and women and put them in prison.' (Acts 8 v.1-3)

Saul was 'breathing out murderous threats against the Lord's disciples', and he asked the High Priest for letters giving him permission to go to the synagogues in Damascus and arrest any followers of Jesus. (Acts 9) On his way to Damascus Saul was blinded by a bright light. He heard Jesus' voice telling him to continue his journey and he would be told what Jesus wanted him to do.

A disciple named Ananias was sent to restore Saul's sight and the disciples at Damascus spent days telling Saul about Jesus' life, death and resurrection. Saul became a Christian and began preaching. 'All who heard him were astonished and asked, 'Isn't he the man who raised havoc in Jerusalem among those who call on this name?'

Saul's name was changed to Paul and he became a great teacher of the Gospel, travelling to many countries. He wrote letters to the churches he established to encourage and teach them.

In Paul's first letter to Timothy verse 13, Paul says, 'even though I was once a blasphemer and a persecutor and a violent man, I was shown mercy because I acted in ignorance and unbelief. The grace of our Lord was poured out on me abundantly, along with the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. Here is a trustworthy saying that deserves full acceptance, Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am the worst. But for that very reason I was shown mercy so that, in me, the worst of sinners, Christ Jesus might display his unlimited patience as an example for those who would believe in him and receive eternal life.' (1 Timothy 1 v 13-16).

If God forgives sinners such as St Paul, we can also be forgiven when we repent of our sin and believe in Christ.
